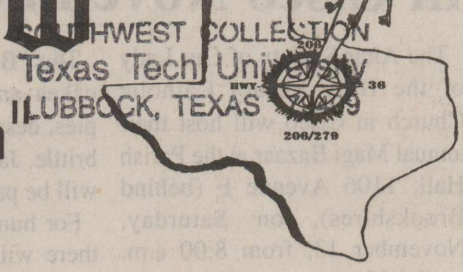

The day started at 7 a.m. with 60 plus volunteers, 25 of which were from the Key Club of Cross Plains High School.

Board members and volunteers

enjoyed a delicious breakfast prepared by more volunteers. The breakfast was a wonderful meal of eggs, bacon, sausage, gravy and biscuits.

The teams then tackled the 12 jobs that were on the agenda. Team captains were acquired in the early part of August. Those men assessed the jobs and were

prepared with workers, tools and other equipment to get the work completed.

The tasks accomplished were: installing bathroom rails; a handicap ramp; repairing a porch; building a porch; painting the eaves of a house; painting the side of a garage; cleaning gutters, installing gutters; hand rails on two porches; painting and caulking windows and trim; winterizing pipes; hanging a ceiling fan; and picking up trash on Main Street.

All the work, thanks to an overwhelming response of volunteers, was completed by noon and workers enjoyed a great meal of roast, beans, tortillas, and Mexican side dishes. Delicious cakes were served for dessert.

The day was most enjoyable and rewarding, as recipients of the efforts gave us hugs and thanks for helping them...and we did help with our HEARTS and HANDS!

After about an hour and a half of being lost and frustrated, one cowboy turned to the other and said, "If you don't find a sign pointing the way to the cattle pens, look for one that says "Express Publishing Company".

"What do you want a newspaper for," asked his companion.

"I want to go in and advertise myself in the lost and found column."

The cowboy was having the same problem as did I, years before.

Buffaloes Stomp the Bulldogs, 36-18

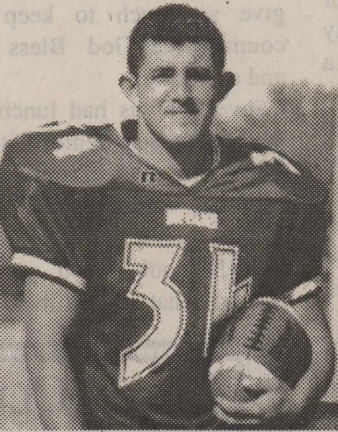

Cross Plains Junior High 2004-2005 Cheerleaders put in a hardworking year for Buffaloes

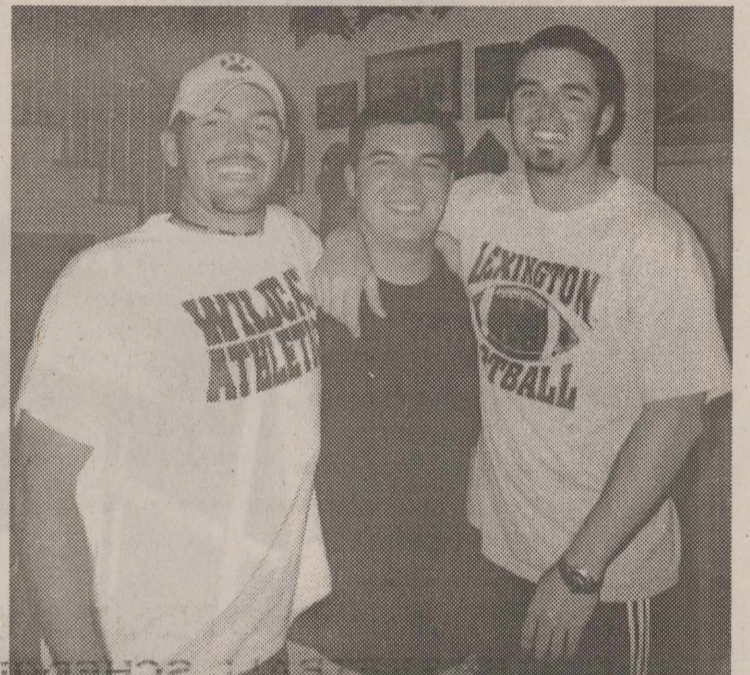
The past seven years I have worked with Jr. High, High School, or both groups of cheerleaders. This group of young ladies, by far have been the most energetic of them all.

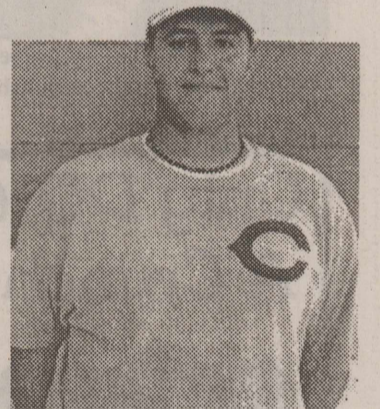
Former C. P. High School Graduates Prepare for State Football Playoffs

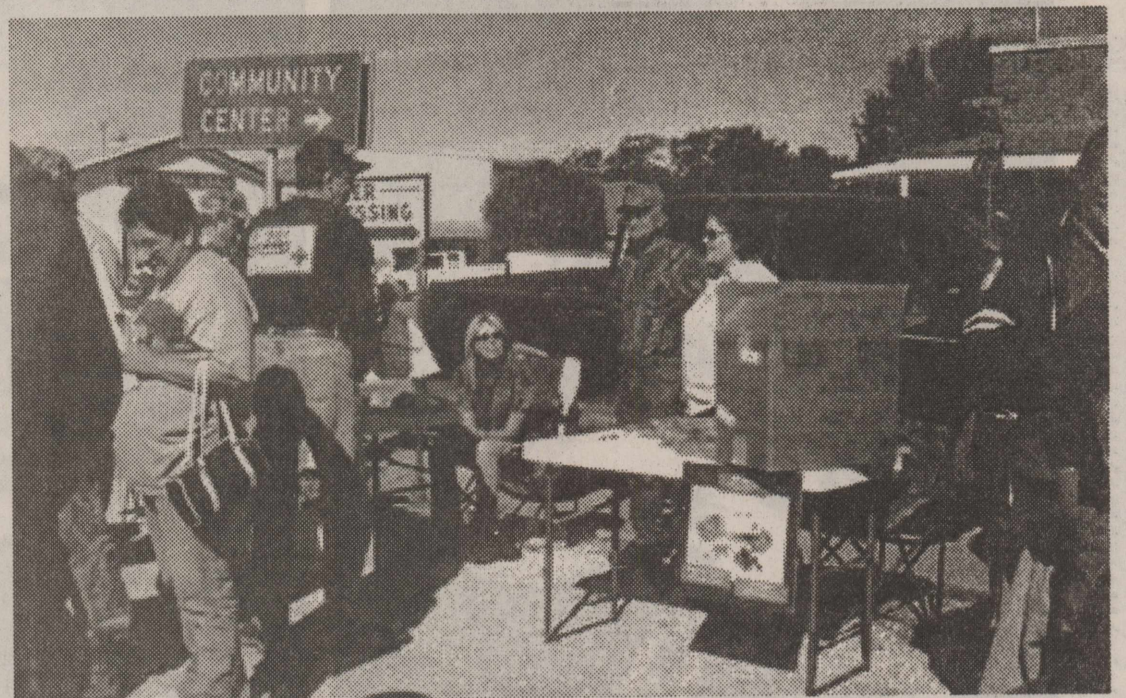

Another story from my aunts is about a red candy Easter egg, which belonged to my Aunt Earl. She had put it up to "save" it. Her brother and sisters would go and "sneak" a lick, each of them thinking they were the only ones doing that. Many years later, upon sharing memories, they were surprised to learn that they were not the only ones to lick the red Easter egg.

I love to read about the "old days" and I admire those who paved the way for me. CARES Federal Advisory Committee Named

CARES is a reorganization/realignment study to ensure veterans receive the right care, at the right time, at the right place. It is designed to objectively evaluate the best ways to provide quality health care and services, to more veterans, in more locations, now and into the future.

Secretary Principi has selected the consists of: Chairperson & Medical Center Director Phoenix VA John Fears, VA Clinician & Prescott Chief of Staff Michael Spooner, M.D., Big Spring Mayor Russ McEwen, Scenic Mt. Chief Executive Officer Mike Pruitt, TTU Professor & Chairman David L.

McCartney, M.D., Taylor Co. Veteran Service Officer Jim Defoor, Callahan Co. Veteran Service Officer Tom Ivey, Executive Director Moore Development Kent Sharp, Howard Commissioner Bill Crooker, and Midland Memorial Hospital Chief Executive Officer Russell Meyers.

The Federal Advisory Committee will work with a national contractor (yet to be named) to conduct the feasibility study to provide advice to Secretary Principi and the Department of Veterans Affairs. The FAC requirements ensure that a consistent process is followed including notice of meetings, holding open meetings, and maintaining records of public comments and their proceedings. This will ensure that all stakeholders have an opportunity to be heard in a well-structured process.

The National contractor will coordinate feasibility studies at all sites selected for further studies. Each of the facilities will have independent Federal Committees. Secretary Principi will announce the selected contractor later in the month.
