
thing is well circulated. Ruby felt that others might like to help send some paperback books, cards, or hand games to these heroic individuals who are defending our country during these perilous times.

Each brown bait, which measures 1 1/4 inches by 1 1/4 inches by 4 inches, is marked with a DSHS toll free number, 1-877-722-6725, that people may call for information.

## **National Weather Service Report for the Year 2004**

West Central Texas received rainfall that far exceeded what is considered normal for this region. Most of the 24 county area received above normal rainfall for the first time since 1997. We are thankful for the rain, and for the excellent network of nearly seventy NWS Cooperative Observers who report rainfall amounts along with high and low temperatures to the National Weather Service on a daily basis. In addition, we are also grateful for the nearly 70 NWS Rainfall Observers that report rainfall to us after each and every rainfall event. On the next sheet are some of the yearly rainfall totals they have reported to us through the end of November. As far as records are concerned, this will be the 4th wettest year for the city of Abilene, and the 15th wettest year for the city of San Angelo. Our cooperative Observer in Woodson reported the most rainfall with 51.48 inches. If additional rainfall occurs in December, then we could set new records.

Heavy rain during the second week of June was concentrated over Mason, San Saba and Eastern in Brown Counties. Isolated areas in these counties received as much as 10 inches of rain in less than 24-hours.

16. One of the last tornadoes of the year struck Santa Anna in Coleman County and another end of Lake Brownwood in Brown County in early December causing damage. About 18 tornadoes were reported for the year which is about normal. Thankfully most of the tornadoes were weak at F1 or below.







The town of San Saba received 1-inch to 2-inches per hour rainfall rates over several hours on the morning of June 9th. This heavy rain caused flooding throughout the community. Several homes and businesses received water damage and numerous city streets were scoured. Nearby, the San Saba River at San Saba flowed out of its banks to cause minor flooding. Minor flooding also occurred nearby on the Colorado River near San Saba. Most of the damage caused by river flooding was to ranch land and farm land. Many bales of hay were lost to the swollen river and fences were down due to debris. For a period of time on the 9th, the community was stranded as water covered all the main roads (Hwy 16 and Hwy 190) to the town.

On March 4th an intense low pressure system moved rapidly across West Central Texas during the middle of the day producing significant damage. It spawned 9 tornadoes along with straight line winds of 60 to 80 mph across much of the area. Several manufactured homes were damaged or destroyed. Roofs of permanent homes also received damage. Jim Ned High School in Tuscola received damaged from the strongest tornado of the year which was rated an F2 on the Fujita Scale.

There were significant hail storms that did extensive damage during the year to many cities, towns, and communities in West Central Texas. Albany, Sweetwater, Glen Cove an Ballinger were hard hit by golfball to softball size hail breaking window, windshields, stripping paint, and causing extensive damage to automobiles and homes. The largest hailstone, measuring 4.25 inches, or up to softball size, occurred 2 miles southeast of Glen Cove in Coleman County and damaged vehicles and dwellings near Hoards Creek Lake on April 30th.

The first tornado that occured in the U.S. in 2004, touched down in Novice in Coleman County on January

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

#### Winter with the Mandan January 13-19, 1805 By Steve Kniffen

January 13, 1805 dawned clear and cold, 34 degrees below zero at sunrise, warming to 20 below at 4:00 p.m. Clark noted about half the Mandan nation moved south of the fort to hunt buffalo along with some hunters from the fort. He remarked that they had a custom of sharing the meat among the tribe rather than keeping it for the family of the man who killed it. While this spread the meat around, they still were without meat more than half the year. Fear of attack from the Sioux kept them from ranging too far to hunt or from going hunting without a large party. Clark also noted they saved their corn, beans, and other vegetables for summer and for a reserve in case of Sioux attack. Charbonneau and another Frenchman visited the Hidatsa villages. They returned with their faces so badly frostbitten that the skin sluffed off. They also brought word that the Hudsons Bay Company was speaking unfavorably toward the they had feared. Americans and the Northwest Company was threatening to build a fort among the Hidatsa. On January 14th, more Indians moved south to hunt. Clark

When his journal was rewritten into a "fair copy", probably with the help of a ghost writer, he said "one of the party had his feet so frost bitten that he could not return to the Fort". That night there was a lunar eclipse. Clark tried to accurately track this eclipse, but passing

clouds hindered his observations. He noted the times for the beginning of total darkness, middle of the eclipse, end of total darkness, and end of the eclipse. Temperature varied from 16 degrees below zero to eight below

It was only 10 degrees below zero on January 15th, and eventually warmed to a blistering 3 degrees above. Sergeant Ordway noted the snow melted off the cabins. That evening, four hunters came back, including one who was frostbitten. This was Joseph Whitehouse. The hunter who had come back to the fort the day before brought horses to haul meat and Whitehouse. Sergeant Gass noted that Whitehouse's feet were not frostbitten as badly as

The warming trend continued overnight. On January 16th, they woke to a temperature of 36 degrees above zero, but a northwest wind cooled the day sent Sergeant Pryor and five and by 4:00 p.m. it was down to 16 degrees above zero. Thirty Mandan, including six chiefs, came to the fort. The Hidatsa Americans would kill them. The Hidatsa would not believe the the primary war chief. He came

with his wife. Clark noted she was there "to wate on him". The Captains demonstrated the air gun and fired the cannon twice. These impressed him. He told the Captains he planned to go to war with the Shoshone in the spring. They warned him that this would displease his great white father in Washington and the Americans would not protect his nation if he went to war. They also spoke of the advantages of trade for all the tribes. He agreed that he had enough horses and would not go to war. Sergeant Ordway reported that several Indians came to the fort, their wives loaded with corn, to pay for blacksmith work.

The warming trend ended on January 17th. At dawn the temperature was 2 below and dropped throughout the day to 12 below. The wind continued hard from the north, but neither cold nor wind kept the Indians from visiting the fort. None of the journal writers noted anything of importance other than the cold and the wind.

The cold continued on January 18th. High for the day was 7 degrees above zero. Clark noted Mr. Larocque and Mr. McKenzie from the Northwest Company came to the fort. Joseph Whitehouse noted two hunters came back to the fort and reported they had killed four deer, four wolves, and a badger. Sergeant Ordway wrote that these men brought in four wolf skins and reported that a large wolf had taken off with one of their traps. They tracked it, but were unable to find either the wolf or the trap.

January 19th had a dawn temperature of 12 degrees above zero. Clark called it "a find Day". The men from the Northwest Company returned to the Hidatsa village. Clark sent three horses to the hunting camp to retrieve the meat. Sergeant Ordway wrote that this camp was approximate 30 miles from the fort.


