The first time he came by the Review I didn't recognize him immediately and he said, "Vanda, you don't know who I am?" I told him to take off his dark glasses and I might. When he removed the shades I realized it was Joe. He remarked, "I thought you would surely know my voice." It had been a long time since I had seen him.

Over the years he came by the office regularly to make copies and we visited. Only last week he called and we had a great conversation. He wanted to see how I was, and I should have called to see how he was. He was recuperating from recent hip replacement surgeries. He had the surgeries one week

Joe had fought a courageous battle with cancer for 13 years. He had been told that he wasn't going to live thousands of times, but he kept beating the odds because he had a strong desire to live. His son was in the fifth grade when he was first diagnosed and he battled health issues to see Joseph through his second year of college.

His sister, Star Recker, remarked, "Joe loved life. He wouldn't give up, when the rest of us probably would have." Star demonstrated her love for her brother when she donated the bone marrow for his transplant in See Down Home Page 3


