LARGE SYSTEM Improvements To Light Lines And Service Are Expected When

Deal Is Completed By a vote of 164 to 58 the qualified voters of Tahoka last Tuesday authorized the sale of the municipal light plant and ice factory to the

Texas Utilities Company for a cash consideration of \$100,000. As soon as the result of the election can be legally declared and the necessary papers prepared and signed, these properties will pass into the hands of the Texas Utilities Com-

> This is the third time that the people of Tahoka have voted on the proposition to sell these properties.

On October 17, 1925, a proposition was submitted to sell these properties of C. M. Thompson of Amarillo for a consideration of \$66,000, the sum of approximately \$6,000 being paid cash and \$60,000 indebtedness to be assumed by the purchaser. At the election held on that date the proposal carried by a vote of 81 to 58. Mr. Thompson took charge and operated the properties until May 1, 1926, when he surrendered them back to the City.

On March 31, 1927, another election was held to determine whether or not these properties should be sold to Messrs Samples and Malsby of Matador for a consideration of \$80,-000, of which \$30,000 was to be paid cash and \$50,000 to be paid in 10 equal payments through a period of ten years, bearing six per cent interest. This proposition was defeated by the decisive majority of 152 to 60.

At the election Tuesday the above figures were almost exactly reversed the vote being, as stated, 164 to 58, favoring the sale by almost 3 to 1. The vote Tuesday perhaps would have been considerably heavier had the weather been favorable, but a heavy mist of rain fell throughout the day, which made the streets wet and sloppy, and possibly quite a number were kept at home on this account. 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



The 1927 cotton preeding block and fields a firm have been inspected by a duly authorized inspector and to be of a high degree of varietal purity and uniformity, o ing with the standards promulgated by the State Board Breeder Examinners. The ginning and warehouse facilities has so met the State requirement. The seed from this firm w fore bear on each container thereof a certificate tag from t Departmet of Agriculture showing that such seed are State fied Seed.

The purpose and intent of this inspection and certification provided for by the Pure Seed Law, is to protect the farmer purchase of good cotton seed and to assure the public a se pure bred seed true to varietal name. Breeders who produce Registered or Certified cotton seed are not permitted to other cotton planting seed, and their record and transactions accessible to State inspection and supervision at all times.

I am enclosing our bulletin No. 80 which will give you detail the purpose of this law.

Our old report and minute books were lost when the old church was torn down, preparatory to building our splendid new church. No one seems to know

what became of them. Mrs. Oscar Gore, pastor's wife and Mrs H. C. Crie organized the first missionary society in the summer of 1905 with five members, with Mrs. Crie president and Mrs. Gore Sec'y .-Treas. Tahoka at that time was only a lit le bunch of shacks and the population very sparse. Our only place of worship was the court house, which we shared with the young folks. They danced and had parties here through the week, shows held forth, and any other ga hering of a public nature assembled there. Saturday nights and Sundays we occupied the court room for Sunday School and church. Our membership soon grew to the breath-taking number of ten.

Brother Gore, the first paster, was living in the back of a little office occupied by Judge Perryman. When the felding bed was let down the Judge could not practice law, as there was room for only one pursuit at a time. Our first care was a parsonage. It was a small two-room house, boxed and stripped, with three windows and two doors. Our first share in the new house was to buy the hardware. We could never understand what they did with all the nails we bought. The labor was all donated and the work was done mostly on bad days when the men could not be out very long at a time. The labor being mostly amateur, the progress was naturally slow. The women gathered at some home and cooked dinner for the workers, some coming several miles from the country in drizzling rain or snow. When we got to the floors and inside work, our husbands worked after supper, and the Missionary Society, all who could get away from home, held

We paid a hardware bill of the \$25.00 and put in a well-casing flue, which cost \$15.00, a cook stove from Mon gomery at \$25.00, the freight bill donated by some brother in the church, as most of our men freighted either as a business or for their own wants. We helped pay the note on the parsonage and a lot of small incidental expenses. We bought some furnishings for the parsonage. During the last two years of Brother Gore's pastorate, we made over 800 sick visits. In those days a visit to the sick meant work of some kind, there being no laundry facilities nor help to be had of any kind. In desperate cases the friends and neighbors relieved the family of all possible cares. It was a point of honor not to let the bread-winner lose any ime from his work. In cases of need our doctors called on the Woman's Society for help, both work and finanical. We cared for a number of charity cases during a typhoid epidemic in 1906. Our work comprised house work, laundry, nursing, and donations of cooked food, loan of bed linen, and necessities of the sick
