

Unnessary Loss

A recent issue of the Dallas Morning News carried an article on the practice of dumping cotton on the ground of a farmyard and leaving it there uncovered. As baled cotton that has become wet will mildew and decay, the farmer suffers far beyond his realization.

On a practical test made by the United States Department of Agriculture at Little Rock, Ark., between date November 25, 1918, and June 7, 1919, during which time a rainfall of 30.69 inches was recorded, the oss to baled cotton caused by weather damege varied from 2 per cent where bales were stored in a warehouse to 47.2 per cent where bales were allowed to lie flat on the ground without covering and without turning for the entire six months period. Other tests were made at different places, all of which bear out the above results.

A bale of cotton does not take up much space. It is valuable property. The farmer who builds a small platform, piles his cotton on it, and covers it with a roof, or, in the event that such is prohibitive, with a tarpau'in, makes a wise and highly profitable investment.

The farmer makes every effort possible, and naturally so, to get the highest price for his cotton. It is right that he should: shouldn't he also make every effort possible to prevent his cotton

from being weather damaged? If a Kansas farmer left his wheat standing in the field until it sprouted in the shock, could be complain because he did not get more for it? The case is the same with the practice of storing cotton in the mud. There is no accounting for the carelessness with which many,

though not all, farmers handle their cotton. At almost every gin plant instances daily occur illustrating anwagons are awaiting their turn to be unloaded. sults in an inferior sample as compared to ginning dry cotton. Manufacturers study to eliminate waste and cut costs. It they don't they go into bankruptcy. It is time for the farmers to also study their business so as to eliminate all possible loss. The proper housing of baled cotton offers a good chance to begin right now.
