



LOCAL POSTAL RECEIPTS

Postal receipts at the Tahoka post here on out, he says. office during the past six months show quite a substantial increase over-the receipts for the corresponding six months last year, according to postmaster D. A. Parkhurst.

The receipts for March, April and May of this year show an increase of 13 per cent over the receipts for the same months in 1927. June this year brought an increase of 5 per cent over June of 1927, while July shows an increase of 32 per cent. But the most marked increase is shown for August, the receipts for August 1928 being 72 per cent above those for August 1927. The three months of June, July and August taken together show an increase of 31 1-2 per cent over the same months in 1927. The receipts for these three months this year were \$2141.03 against \$1627.06 for the same three months last year. August receipts were \$801.26 against \$473.17 for August 1927.

The Tahoka post office is now serving a total of 227 miles daily by her four rural routes. Postmaster Parkhurst tells us that his next ambition is to secure delivery service for our city. Preparations for this service are in progress and Mr. Parkhurst says that if given the usual co-operation and assistance he will again win, and that in the near future he will be able to secure this very desirable service. Every home owner will assist by having his house numbered when called upon to do so.
