1929 ALMANAC BOOSTS CITY

Tahoka's Population Estimated at 3,500; County's At 13,200; Wealth Is \$20,000,000

The 1929 Texas Almanac, compiled and published by The Dallas News and The Dallas Journal, which has just recently come off the press, is very complimentary to Tahoka and Lynn county, and the rest of the South Plains country as well.

Among many statements we find this on our county:

"Lynn County—Location, South Plains, population, 1928, 13,200. Area, 864 square miles. Population per square mile, 15.3. Rainfall, 22 inches. Total wealth, about \$20,000,000.

"Physiography: Level plain, being almost entirely tillable. Loam soils largely and very fertile. No native timber.

"Crops: Total value, about \$6,000,000. Cotton production about 45,000 bales annually. Large grain sorghum acreage and Sudan and other forage crops grown. Wheat and oats grow well. Truck crops. Apple and peach orchards being planted throughout county.

"Live Stock: Cattle raising, though in last few years ranches have been broken into farms. Swine, poultry and dairying are growing industries. "Tahoka, the county seat, has about 3,500 population and is the principal trade center. O'Donnell in extreme south part serves a trade territory in Lynn and Dawson counties."

The Almanac bases Tahoka's 1928 population figure of 3,500 on the scholastic population, number of rated commercial concerns, utility connections, and rate of increase from past censuses. An item of interest is the fact that the 1900 census gave Lynn county a total population of 17, in 1910 she had 17,13, and in 1920, 4,751, and the 1928 estimate of 13,200. Tahoka had 786 people in 1920.

The total population of Texas is given as 5,487,000, nearly 824,000 more than the 1920 census total of 4,663,228.

Commissioners' Court In Busy Session; Contract New Roof; Plan To Buy New Tractor For Grading

(By Congressman Marvin Jones) About 900,000,000 pounds of jute is being used in the United States annually and it is gradually increasing.

It is imported principally from India.

About 150,000,000 pounds of jute is used for cotton bagging, but as about one-half of this covering is renewed, about 80,000,000 pounds of new jute is used each year for cotton bagging. In other words, about ten times as much jute is shipped into this country every year as is necessary to cover the entire cotton crop of the United States. The other 90 per cent is used for other purposes, for sacks, bags, wrapping material, for the body of carpets and linoleum and various other purposes.

If cotton were substituted for all of the jute that is now being used for all purposes in the United States, it would occasion the use of more than a million additional bales of cotton, which, according to the estimates of the Department of Agriculture, would very greatly increase the average price of cotton, and thus increase the returns of the cotton

New Hatchery Is Running At Capacity

The Tahoka Hatchery is running at full capacity, according to Taylor White. Three hatches have already been made this season, each one being a 77 per cent hatch, which is about 15 or 20 per cent above the average.

Moody Okes News Court For Plains

AUSTIN, Feb. 11 — Governor Moody today signed bills creating two judicial districts and reorganizing a third. The 110th district composed of the counties of Briscoe, Floyd, Motley and Dickens was created.

Under one bill the 109th district was created and the 70th district reorganized. The district attorney for the 70th will be prosecutor for the 29th and the judge of the 70th will continue in his capacity, it being necessary for the governor to appoint a judge for the 109th and an attorney for the 70th. The 70th district will be composed of Midland, Ector, Andrews, Martin and Glasscock counties, with Reeves, Ward, Winkler, Crane, and Loving counties comprising the 109th district.

Free Farmers Auction Sale And Special Prices Will Be Feature Of First Event

Tahoka will sponsor a Trades Day. The first big monthly event will be held on the fourth Monday in this month, February 25, and trades days are expected to be held throughout the coming months.

The day is being sponsored by the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce, the business houses of the town and Col. Joe Skale and Col. W. P. Casey, auctioneers, of Lubbock.

One of the main features of the day will be a free auction sale starting at 10 o'clock in the morning to which farmers are asked to bring their stock, implements, poultry, household goods, or anything else that they do not need. Substitution Of Cotton For Jute Would Increase Demand; Jones Fights For A High Tariff On Jute

In a busy session of the Commissioners' Court Monday and Tuesday of this week, a contract for re-roofing the court house was let to Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Co., at a price of \$1024. The roof will be guaranteed for twenty years.

A jury of view was appointed to secure the remainder of the right-of-way on Highway 84 east of town. Seven or eight miles have been completed from the Garza county line this way, and is reported to be an excellent grade. A new catpillar tractor will be purchased by the county for use on the lateral roads.

The First National Bank of Tahoka, the only bank to place a bid, was given the county depository contract. A contract was signed with the sewer company to connect the court house with the system.

The court will on March 11 grant a hearing to audit companies for the auditing of the county's books.

The commissioners will meet again on Monday, February 17 to appoint road overseers and election judges for the coming school trustees elections.

COTTON FARMERS WILL HAIL COTTON ROADS

The cotton growers should be glad every time a new use for cotton is discovered, for it means just that much greater demand for their product. Experiments have been conducted recently with cotton roads, laying a heavy strip of duck saturated with asphalt over a dirt road, and have been particularly successful with lateral roads over which the travel is not heavy.

Another experiment has found that cotton can be used instead of silk for insulation of electric wire, as all the objectionable qualities disappeared after the cotton was washed in pure water.

As these experiments continue, there is sure to be an increased demand for cotton, which is the crying need of the South today.

PAYS TO FEED GROWING PULLETS

The value of proper feeding of growing pullets has been amply demonstrated to the folks in Blackland community near Roscoe in Nolan county by A. G. Faust. Last summer his eight hundred White Leghorn pullets began laying, but eggs were cheap and he did not feel able to feed them a laying mash. But C. H. 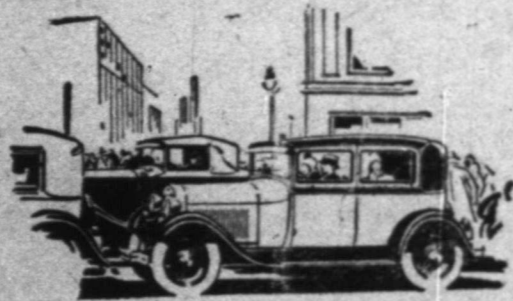

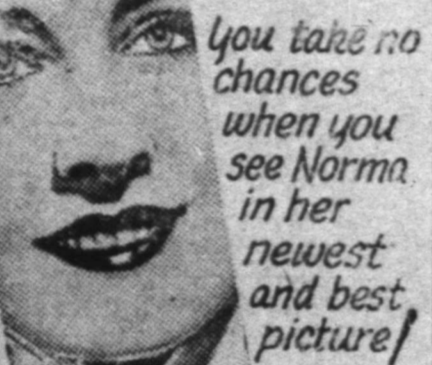

Senate Committee Approves Pat Neff

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11—Approval of the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee today was given to the nomination of Pat M. Neff to be a member of the United States Board of Mediation, and Senator Hays, Republican, Ohio, was named to make a report asking confirmation of the nomination by the Senate.

The former Texas Governor's nomination had been opposed strenuously by Senator Mayfield, Democrat, Texas, who, as a member of the Interstate Commerce Committee, voted with five other members against a favorable report.

Eight members of the committee voted in favor of Neff.

Floor Fight Expected

Although a fight against Neff's confirmation is expected when it comes up on the Senate floor, the opposition made no announcement of who would carry it on. Senator Mayfield declined to make any public statement of his intentions and Senator Wheeler, Democrat, Montana, who on several occasions supported Mayfield during committee hearings, contented himself with the announcement that a floor fight would be made.

Neff had been serving on the board and the nomination would continue him for another term.

Labor Groups Oppose Neff

During the hearings on Neff's re-appointment, labor organizations testified in favor of rejecting Neff on the ground that he had acted in a "way unbecoming to a mediator", in

one or two labor disputes. Neff, testifying in his own behalf, maintained that he had striven to protect the rights of working men and employers equally and denied charges that he was "temperamentally" unsuited to be a mediator.

IN MEMORIAM

(Chris L. Adair)

Charles Benton Gregg was born January 18, 1869 near Asheville, N. C. and as a civil engineer in his younger days was engaged in several large mining projects in several of the adjoining mountain states as well as in his native state. He came to Texas in 1911 and settled near Thalia in Ford county where his first wife, whom he married in the early nineties as Miss Margaret Pilkington of Judson, N. C., was buried awhile before he moved to Lynn county, in 1916. To this union were born the nine sons and two daughters who survive him. Early in life Mr. Gregg joined the Baptist church and at the time of his death was a member of the Central Baptist Church near his Grassland home. He was for many years a Mason and an Odd Fellow and the latter fraternity performed the final rites at the grave. On July 14, 1920 at her old home near Judson, N. C., Mr. Gregg was married the second time to Miss Gazza Enloe, the Mrs. Gregg who survives him and who attended him in his last illness.

For the past two years Mr. Gregg had been bothered with heart trouble, to which malady he succumbed at 5 o'clock p. m. on Thursday, January 31, 1929. The funeral services at the home near Grassland were conducted by Rev. Horn of that place and at the Rayland Baptist Church in Foard county by Rev. Foster of Vernon. At 3 o'clock p. m. on Sunday, February 3rd Brother Gregg was finally laid to rest in the cemetery at Thalia by his brother Odd-Fellows, many of whom were his former neighbors when he lived there. The floral tributes were many and of beautiful design, fitting expressions of the good taste and final devotion of the friends who sent them.

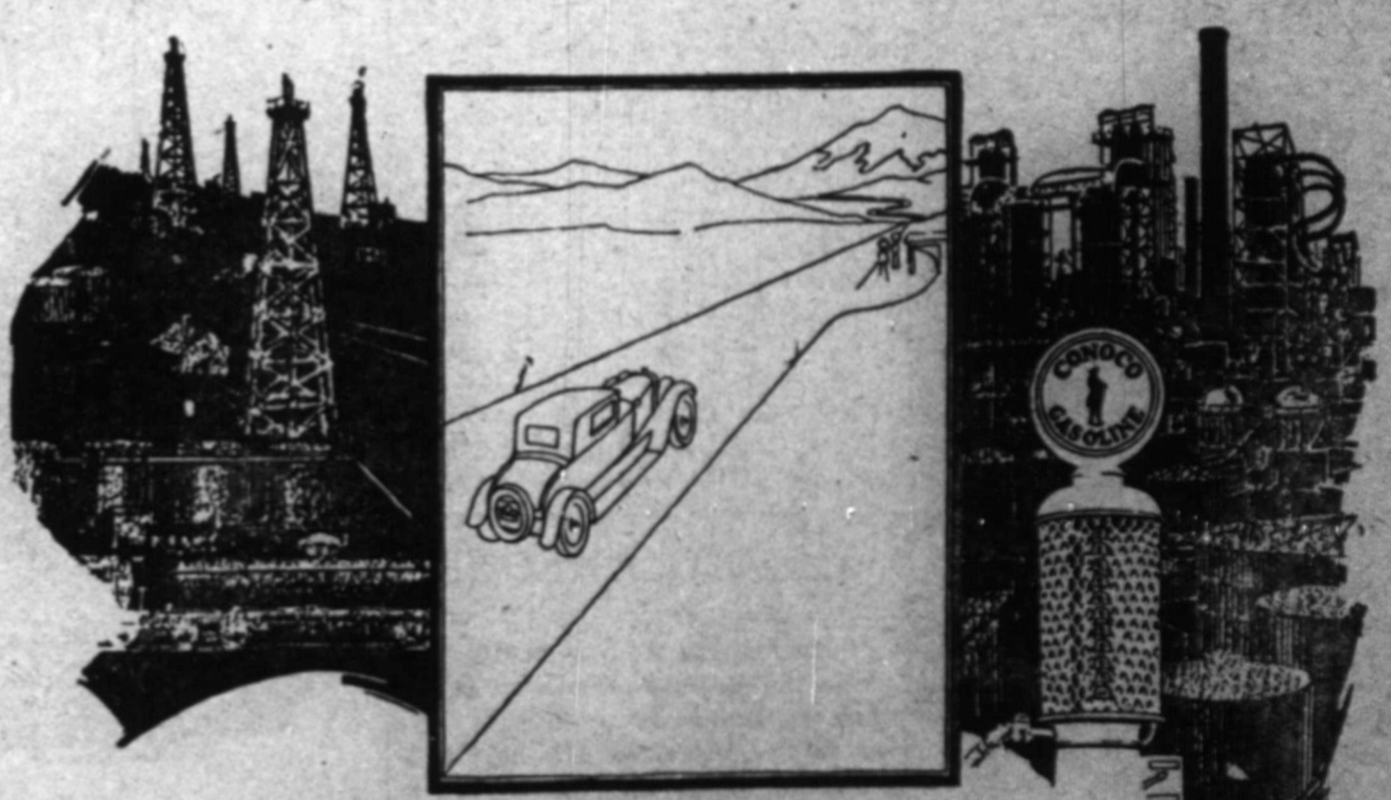

M. V. Brownfield, Plains Pioneer Dead

BROWNFIELD, Feb. 11.—Funeral services have been tentatively set at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon for M. V. Brownfield, 75, Plains pioneer, rancher, and founder of the town of Brownfield, who died suddenly today at noon. Surviving him are his widow and a daughter, Francis, 14; another daughter, Mrs. Roscoe Wilson, of Lubbock; three sons, A. M. Brownfield and A. R. Brownfield of Brownfield; and A. E. Brownfield of El Paso; and one sister, Mrs. Cal W. Loughby of Bardy. All of these relatives will be on hand for the funeral services. The Rev. E. V. May, Brownfield Baptist pastor, will be in charge of funeral services and interment will be at the Brownfield cemetery, under direction of the Mahonic lodge. Mr. Brownfield succumbed to a heart attack suffered at 12:30 Monday. He was driving his car to his residence from the downtown district when he suffered the attack. He drove into a filling station and was dead in a few minutes, before medical aid could be obtained. Mr. Brownfield had been a resident of the South Plains country since 1898, when he moved from Nolan county to Terry county. He founded the town of Brownfield in 1902 and was ever interested in development of the town and section. Numerous philanthropic acts are credited to him. Had Large Land Holdings At the time of his death Mr. Brownfield was considered one of the largest land and cattle owners in the lower South Plains country. His holdings included land in both Terry and Yoakum counties. He had several large ranches near Brownfield. Mr. Brownfield was one of those hardy pioneers who fought the battles incident on colonization of this great country when the Plains was a new and undeveloped region. In the early days he drove cattle over the long trail to the Kansas markets and many were the tales that he afterward told of these journeys. He was one of the first seven charter members of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association and was ever prominent in that organization. Mr. Brownfield was a Mason and a Shriner and a member of the Lutheran church.

Planting Of Western Bred Pecans Advised

Fort Worth, Feb. 13.—(WTCC) A warning to West Texas farmers contemplating pecan planting, that trees which have been bred to high rainfall conditions will not develop properly in West Texas has been issued by Col. R. L. Penick, chairman of the Agricultural Committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The West Texas organization, conducting an extensive pecan planting campaign at this time, advises planters to be constantly on their guard against any trees which were not developed for comparatively dry climates. Col. Penick stated that many West Texas farmers have been interested in planting pecans to the extent that they have bought a few trees for

experimental purposes and were very much disappointed when they died. This failure of the trees to live was because they had been raised in a climate where from 60 to 70 inches of rain fall each year and were planted in a climate which averaged 20 inches of rainfall per year. The western varieties have smaller leaves than the eastern varieties and require less water. Reputable nurserymen sell no other kind. Originally the West Texas Chamber of Commerce undertook to distribute one thousand trees at very nominal prices but a new deal was made by all orders for trees during the season can be filled has been made. 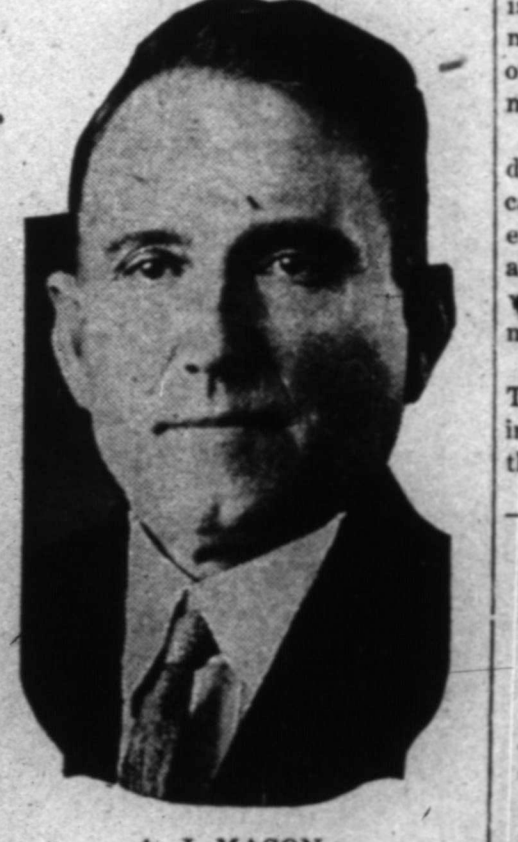
