Strange pet in Iowa

An Iowa family has a new pet and it has a wing span of more than 3 feet.

John and Margaret Majerczyk of Floyd said they have seen all kinds of animals wander onto their property in the 26 years they've been in rural Floyd County, but they had never befriended a turkey vulture before.

The birds are often called buzzards, so the Majerczyks named him Buzz.

Margaret Majerczyk said she was "a little shocked" when Buzz started following her around the yard. At first, "I didn't know what to think," she said. "I was leery. At first I thought it was injured and couldn't fly, but then it does fly."

Students left scrambling

"Please don't hang up! This is an urgent message." The automated phone call from East Los Angeles' Garfield High School senior class president alerted classmates last month that the prom was not happening as scheduled.

City council sets priorities for Muleshoe

Members of the Muleshoe City Council established the city's priorities for the next few years during a special meeting Monday.

After a spirited three-hour meeting, they agreed that the most urgent focus should be on employee salaries — particularly those at the lower end of the scale — and drilling a new city water well.

City Manager David Brunson asked each member of the council to name what they considered the top issues facing the city.

Councilman Jerry Hicks spoke up first and said personnel — both retaining and attracting, "because great infrastructure isn't worth much without people to run and maintain it."

Other topics were agribusiness and

water (Mayor Victor Leal), "something to occupy youth" (Juan Chávez), "how the public views our police department" (Sharon Grant) and maintaining infrastructure (Clifford Black).

Brunson struck a nerve by mentioning the need for a water well. He said the city used 2 million gallons of water Saturday and "our wells can't pump a whole lot more than that."

Parks and recreation (notably a fishing pond) and a new police building also had big support.

Cemetery marker set at Maple

MAPLE — In near 100-degree weather, about 75 people turned out to dedicate a historical marker Sunday at Maple Cemetery.

Honored guests were the children of Minnie Darieck and James Gentry, two of those buried at Maple.

Channel 6 filmed the dedication and interviewed many of the guests. The interviews will be aired during the next few weeks.

Boy Scout Troop 620 of Muleshoe presented the colors and Bailey County Judge Marilyn Cox spoke on the importance of preserving county history.

Cox thanked Sammie Simpson and other residents who were involved.

"This is a very special day

pay proper respect to our
loved ones laid to rest here,"
said Bailey County Commissioner Joey Kindle, whose
grandmother, Minnie Darieck,
is buried at Maple.

He introduced the Darieck and Gentry children attending, and unveiled the marker.



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'Furman's Red' really takes the salvia cake

A few weeks ago, I wrote about autumn sage (Salvia greggii) and how one variety seems more drought-tolerant than the others I've grown.

Well, I've been experimenting, and now I can tell you that 'Furman's Red' is so much more adaptable that I really wonder if it isn't a hybrid. Santa Fe's High Country Gardens identifies it as S. greggii, so I guess I have to accept that.

Anyway, my experiment has been simply not watering any of the autumn sages at the farm since sometime last winter. With just about zero rainfall and temperatures into the 90s for several days, 'Furman's Red' is a bouquet while all the other varieties have either a scattered flower or two or, as in most cases, nothing at all.

I don't see how this sage can bloom the way it has without being watered in two months; desert cacti do it by storing up water, but I don't

Autumn sage is available just about anywhere, but High Country Gardens is still the only place I know of that sells 'Furman's Red.' (2902 Rufina St., Santa Fe 87507-2929, or view it on the Internet at www.highcountrygardens.com.

Kevin Smith of Muleshoe suggests a method of marking plant varieties that sounds like a good, economical idea.

Smith's idea is to take one of the knives that come in plastic cutlery sets (such as you'd use on a picnic) and write the plant name on it, then stick it in the ground next to the plant.

The knife's serrated edge should be a big advantage if your soil has a tendency to harden like so much of our area (that condition can be corknow where this flimsy- rected with the addition

of organic matter for a few years, by the way).

This could be lowcost solution that most families would already have around the house. I prefer to use metal markers, but recently I have been using some plastic ones that are too brittle and easily broken. The knives are sturdier.

As for the metal plant markers apparently are made mainly by two manufacturers, and the one that sells mainly direct (rather than through garden centers or mailorder nurseries) also fails my test.

If you aren't familiar with how these markers are made, it's simple: A thin sheet of metal is crimped over a frame of wire (similar to coathanger wire).

This little sheet of metal is usually fairly flimsy and tends to work loose and fall off, but in my experience the ones sold direct (by Paw Paw Mfg. Co.) are even more prone to fall off. If you don't spot this pretty soon, critters may carry off your name tag - or it may even get buried.

I ain't a happy planter

when that happens.

Another point about using these markers: The "permanent" marking pens that you buy for this purpose are not permanent for more than a season or two in our scorching sun, so you eventually have to "remark" things. Some of the pens fade so fast, however, that they don't deserve the term "permanent" at all.

Turning the written side of the marker to the north helps keep the writing clear for a little longer, since it keeps the direct sunlight off of your writing.

As for finding the most permanent ink, you just have to experiment with different brands of pens. I haven't found one that I'd call permanent, but Kevin Smith is testing a new type and he's optimistic about it. I'll pass along the verdict on that.

Exemption allows Spartan to be applied on sunflowers

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Agriculture has issued an emergency exemption to allow the use of sulfentrazone (Spartan Herbicide) on sunflowers to control broadleaf weeds.

The exemption was issued after the U.S. Department of Agriculture approved the move earlier this year; the exemption expires June 30.

Spartan Herbicide, manufactured by FMC Corp., may be applied following all applicable directions, restrictions and precautions on the EPA-registered product label, as well as restrictions outlined in the specific exemption approval notice.

· It will be applied only by certified applicators, by licensed applicators or by persons under the direct supervision of licensed applicators. All applicators must have a copy of the EPA approval notice in their possession prior to any appli-

 Spartan Herbicide may be applied by ground in a

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· One application may be made, up to 30 days prior to or three days after planting sunflowers.

 Spartan may be tankwith Prowl mixed (pendimethalin) at labeled rates for control of other grass and broadleaf weeds.

• A maximum of 90,000 acres of sunflowers (reduced tillage, conservation tillage and no-tillage acres only) may be treated in the High and Rolling Plains of

CAJUN SEAFOOD SEASONING

1/3 cup salt

1/3 cup paprika

1/4 cup garlic powder

1/4 cup freshly ground pepper

3 Tbsp. onion powder

2 Tbsp. cayenne pepper

2 Tbsp. thyme

2 Tbsp. oregano

1 Tbsp. sugar

Combine all ingredients, mixing thoroughly. Store in a tightly covered glass jar.

Pour into a 9-inch pie tin and press across the bottom and up the


If the pie is to be baked, add the filling and bake according to the filling recipe.

"You may be the parent, but the child has complete control over this process," said Dr. Teri Turner, assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine. "Toilet training fails when parents forget who's in charge."

Toddlers learn the responsibility of using the toilet when the time is right for them. A child doesn't magically become ready at age 2, Turner said.

Incentives can be helpful in motivating a child to become responsible, but frequent re-

Parents can begin toilet training when the child is able to stay dry for several hours and can communicate the need to use the toilet. The child will be looking for independence and will want to please.

Turner, also an attending physician at Texas Children's Hospital, offered these suggestions for successful toilet training:

- Encourange your child to imitate siblings or parents.
- Be sure all care-givers are
- using the same methods. · Teach a boy to sit to uri-
- nate before standing. · Keep the child in loose,

- pants too soon.
- Read with the child age-appropriate books about toilet training.
- Don't punish or criticize for accidents.
- · Provide choices instead of demands. Use incentives.

"Parents should not be overly concerned about when a child is able to use the potty and should not expect perfection," Turner said. "Setbacks are to be expected."

Pediatricians should be consulted when the child is over the age of 4 and has no interest in training or if there is significant parent-child conflict in toilet training, she said.
