MONKEYING WITH WEST TEXAS LAND TITLES

Governor Moody vetoed the Small bill which undertook to validate the title to lands lying in the beds of streams in the Panhandle and possibly other portions of the state which had heretofore been patented by the State to private owners, on the grounds that the original patents were void and that the proposed law to validate the titles would be unconstitutional. The bill was vetoed after Attorney General Claude Pollock had furnished the Governor with a written opinion to the effect that the bill was unconstitutional. His contention is that the sale of these lands by the land commissioner long years ago was unauthorized and void and that any attempt by the legislature to validate these sales now would amount to a gift, which is prohibited by the constitution. But there are good lawyers who take a different view. They say that the legislature can ratify the unauthorized act of a state official and thus make his act valid, that the legislature has often done so heretofore, and that it

can ratify these acts now and thus validate the titles to these lands.

We do not undertake to say who is right. But, since the State patented these lands to private citizens long years ago, who have had them in peaceable possession and have paid taxes thereon for many years, we believe that the attorney general and the governor should have resolved the doubt, if any, in their favor.

The whole contention of the State, in the first place, is based on a legal fiction—a fiction which makes navigable rivers of bone-dry water courses that do not have enough water in them to wet the governor's hat. If the water courses that traverse the Panhandle are navigable streams, as the Attorney General holds, then the law is ridiculous and needs to be re-written. If these arroyos in the year and never carry royo, that are bone-dry for nine months of the year, then the law is a fiction. If the water courses that traverse the Panhandle are navigable rivers, then a little old lousy doggy is a hippopotamus and an East Texas razorback is an elephant. Law should be the embodiment of common sense and justice, and we do not believe that the Attorney General and the Governor should take advantage of an ancient statute, ridiculous and absurd in its nature, to disturb the titles of land conveyed by the State itself to its citizens and to defeat the ends of justice and equity.

This matter of monkeying with land titles, long ago granted by the State and long believed by the holders to be valid, is a serious business, which the State should not indulge in. The Governor and the Attorney General are treading on dangerous ground.

If the calendar reformers succeed in inducing the world to adopt their proposed thirteen-month year, we suggest that they create two new months and leave March out entirely. That would suit West Texas fine.

While Congress has been engaged in the wholesome task of putting teeth into the Volstead Act, the legislators at Austin have been seeking to extract the teeth of the Dean law. The Jones bill, recently passed by both houses of Congress and signed by President Coolidge as one of his last official acts, raises the maximum penalty for a habitual offender or a real bootlegger to a fine of \$10,000 and confinement in the penitentiary for five years. Light penalties may still be assessed against first offenders. Great latitude is allowed federal judges in assessing penalties, but the law now permits them to assess penalties against rich, high-power bootleggers and rum-runners commensurate with their profits and their ability to pay. In other words, the federal officers and courts can now make it "rocky" for violators of the Volstead Act if they wish to do so. It was the original intention of those seeking to amend the Dean law at Austin to so ameliorate the penalties as to make the law a joke. There are offenders against the law whose punishment, doubtless, should not be as severe as the lowest penalty fixed by the Dean law—one year in the penitentiary. But there are other offenders who would not be too severely punished, perhaps, if convicted and sent to the pen for the maximum time of five years. It would be wise possibly for the legislature to lower the minimum penalty, since it would then be easier for prosecutors to procure convictions for violations of the liquor laws, but the maximum penalty should not be lowered. The courts and officers should be left free to go after the big bootlegger and the powerful rum-runner with legal gatling guns.

In a communication published in the Dallas News last Sunday Judge C. H. Jenkins again charges that the Judiciary Committee of the House put to sleep his bills on court reform without even investigating their merits. Judge Jenkins makes out a strong case against this committee, composed of twenty-one lawyers, most of them young men. As evidence sustaining his charge, he sets forth the merits of one of his bills and the defect in our procedure which it is intended to cure. Judge Jenkins is Representative from the Brownwood-Coleman district. He is a lawyer of wide experience. For many years he was a judge on one of the courts of civil appeals. He is no mere visionary, no long-haired professional "reformer"; he is a practical man, ripe in years and in wisdom. Yet the lawyers in the House refuse to pay any attention to his counsel, they refuse to even consider wholesome measures that he would have enacted into law. We believe that Judge Jenkins himself, or some man of similar character and equal strength, should take this matter directly to the people in the next primary election. There are a few far-reaching reforms that should be wrought in court procedure, and it does not seem that any relief may be expected from the men who now constitute our law-making body.

A Dallas man has invented an airplane propeller which is said to have four times the pulling power of the ordinary propeller now in use. The device consists of two propellers mounted in a large, round metal tube, one in the front end of the tube and one at the rear. The idea was given birth some time ago when the inventor idly placed a stovepipe over a small model airplane which he had devised. The device has been patented and airplane manufacturers have become interested in it, it is said. It may greatly increase the efficiency of the already wonderful flying machine.

The Tahoka Chamber of Commerce for the first time in its history, now has a full-time, experienced, well-paid secretary. We believe that he is capable and efficient. But he can't do it all by himself. He should have the full co-operation of every business man in town. We believe he will have the co-operation of practically all of them. Things are looking better.

Political differences of the past should not enter into city politics. In fact, there should be no city politics, as that term is generally used. The very best men that can be found should be prevailed upon to offer for mayor and for the vacant place on the city council.

No sooner was Hoover assassinated than a sandstorm got busy here in Lynn county. Couldn't expect anything better. Didn't the Hoovercrats promise a dry administration?

Idealism characterized the administration of Woodrow Wilson, Economy that of Calvin Coolidge, and Efficiency promises to be the watchword of Herbert Hoover.

Earle B. Mayfield and Pat Neff have both returned from Washington—but it is not thought that they occupied the same berth on the way back.

In spite of the wild ravings of Jim Reed, who is now a private citizen of Missouri, the United States Senate and House recently amended the Volstead Act, but they amended it so as to make it more severe on the powerful and the wealthy violator of the law. In other words, the law was amended by the dry forces in favor of better enforcement. We are wondering if this would have been possible had Al Smith instead of Herbert Hoover won the Presidency. Suppose Smith had gotten 444 electoral votes and Hoover 83, we opine that the Volstead Act would have been amended all right, but it would have been amended by the "wets" so as to make it easier to procure liquor. Time is justifying the course of the "Hoovercrats."

WHAT OTHERS THINK

TEXAS MAKES A BEGINNING

Texas now has a marriage law which should prove of great moral worth and cut down our divorce rate within the next five years. The new law provides that three days notice must be given before the issuance of marriage license, and that the prospective grooms under twenty five years of age must file a hygienic certificate from a physician showing him to be free from social disease. Under this law Texas will be free to a great extent from hasty marriages of the "sweet daddies" and the flappers, marriages on a bet, and so-called "whiskey weddings." These three classifications will cut off hundreds of divorces and Governor Moody's signature to the new law is the first step Texas has made to correct a growing evil since the days of the republic. While some feel that the law is a little bit comical in assuming that disease under twenty-five years of age is more serious than disease after twenty-five years, we must admit it is a step in the right direction, and there is every hope that the age limit will be removed after a few years' observation of the workings of the act.

Yes, Texas is beginning to take cognizance of the welfare of people and children, as well as hogs and sheep and cows and horses, and we have just cause to congratulate ourselves. It means a better, stronger race and a happier citizenship—Clarendon News.

GOVERNOR'S SALARY

It looks like the people of Texas may vote on a constitutional amendment raising the salary of the governor from \$4,000 to \$12,000. A bill providing for an election in July, 1930, has been given legislative sanction. It would become effective January 1, 1931.

Twelve thousand dollars a year would be a fair salary for the governor of Texas, though New York pays her governor \$25,000.

It is a shame that Texas now pays only \$4,000. The services of a governor are worth more than that, and it works an unnecessary hardship on a poor man, or man in moderate circumstances. Any man capable of being governor could earn three times that much in private life without half trying—Post Dispatch.

LAMESA LAWYER LAMBASTS LEGISLATURE

The News has received the following communication from N. R. Morgan, an attorney of Lamesa, in which he takes a whack at our lawmakers for various shortcomings.

"The lawmaking mill at Austin continues to turn out its daily grist. Already more than 2,000 bills have been turned into the hopper, and the various 'Honorable' from various parts of the state are grandiloquently posing as modern Solons in behalf of the 'uninterrified Democracy.'

"Already more than two weeks have been consumed in an effort to bar out Hoover Democrats, and the 'Al Smith breed' appear to be, at Austin, in the majority. Old Sam Houston, a patriot and a statesman, said 'Give the buck plenty of rope and he will break his own neck,' and we opine that is about what the Primary and Secondary-Primary and run-off bunch will accomplish. It is only essential for the substantial citizenship of Texas to ignore that bunch of self-selected would-be political Solomons and quietly get together, select suitable men for the various offices—state and county—and at the regular-legal-November election defeat the 'Nominee' made by the so-called regular Al Smith democrats; otherwise poor old Texas will continue to wallow in the mire of rotten partisan politics.

"There is a general cry for Judicial Reform" in Texas. When the legislature meets, the first thing to do is to select—select—a 'Mr. Speaker,' who proceeds to appoint his political fence-makers as chairmen of the various committees to carry out 'Platform Demands, including a Judiciary Committee. It appears that the present Judiciary Committee is composed of about twenty members, all lawyers, and what, if anything, have they accomplished?"

"We now have one supreme court, one court of criminal appeals, and about a dozen intermediate courts of Civil Appeals, the latter a real nuisance; and we have many men occupying the office of county judge who know no law.

HOOVER STRESSES PRO ENFORCEMENT & WORLD PEACE

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Herbert Hoover entered on the presidency today with a solemn promise to enforce the prohibition and all other law to the extent of his abilities and with a declaration that he coveted for his administration a record of having further contributed to advance the cause of peace among nations.

Tersely he told the world that the measure of success the government could maintain in law enforcement

would depend upon the moral support which they extended.

Citizens Have Duty

"The duty of citizens to support the laws of the land is co-equal with the duty of their government to enforce the laws which exist," he said. "No greater national service can be given by men and women of good will—who, I know, are not unmindful of the responsibilities of citizenship—than they should, by their example, assist in stamping out crime and outlawry by refusing participation in and condoning all transactions with illegal liquor.

"If citizens do not like a law, their duty as honest men and women is to discourage its violation; their right is openly to work for its repeal."

With a hope of improving present conditions, President Hoover announced he would appoint a commission to investigate the whole question of law enforcement and to make such recommendations for reorganization of the administration of federal laws and court procedure as may be found desirable."

Stresses Word Peace
The chief executive devoted even more of his address to world peace than he did to law enforcement. He expressed hope that a way could be found for the United States to become a member of the World Court,

declaring that its reservations to the protocol of adherence should not be misinterpreted, and that no more potent instrumentality for the settlement of international differences was practicable.

Declaring that the acceptance of the recent treaty for the renunciation of war should pave the way to a greater limitation of armament, President Hoover said "We sincerely extend to the world" an offer of such limitation.

"Surely civilization is old enough" he said. "Surely mankind is mature enough so that we ought in our own life time to find a way to permanent peace."

Call Special Session
Turning to domestic affairs, Mr. Hoover, reiterated that he would call a special session of congress for enactment of farm and "limited" tariff revision legislation. He declared that neither could be postponed in justice to our farmers, our labor and our manufacturers."

He said the election again had confirmed the determination of the American people that regulation of private enterprise and not government ownership and operation was the course rightly to be pursued in relations to business. He also proposed a continuation of the relations of federal assistance of collective self-help by industries.

Other mandates of the November elections he held to be—continuance of economy in public expenditure, continued regulation of business to prevent domination in the community; the avoidance of policies which would involve the United States in the controversies of foreign nations; expansion of public works and the promotion of welfare activities affecting education and home.
