





MAMD Board approves nursing school, lets Chaisson go

The Muleshoe Area Medical District board members began their monthly meeting Thursday night with a tour of the Radiology and Laboratory Departments and their new equipment. Radiology now operates on a filmless system that records patients' x-rays digitally. The board members were also treated to a demonstration of their new 3-D ultrasound. According to Brenda Kirk, the quality of images they produce is better than the more sophisticated and expensive machines that are out there. The Laboratory replaced their chemistry analyzer with three new machines that will serve to expand their services.

Upon returning, Mike Miller called for an open forum, affording the opportunity for questions or comments. There were none to be discussed.

One of the major issues discussed was the approval of a new nursing school. According to Ray Mason, in five to six years the nation will see the worst nursing shortage ever. Through an agreement with South Plains College-Levelland, the district will be able to train their own nurses. Mason also said the classes would be held in what is currently the home health building, and with Five Area's donation of a T1 line, this can be done at virtually no added monthly cost to the

Ronnie Dent stated, "I think it's a very good opportunity for Muleshoe. We need to be able to grow our own (nurses). I'm all for it." The motion to go ahead with the program was made, seconded, and approved.

Another major issue covered was the status of the hospital's computer system. Bobby Turner gave a presentation explaining how serious the problem has become. According to Turner the computer system is experiencing many problems due to new, updated software being run on machines as old as 11 years old. "It's like we are running

a multimillion dollar business like a candy store," he said. Turner said this can cause anything from long waiting times, which ultimately costs the district money, to computer

crashes. Other problems ranged from multiple viruses to wiring inadequacies. Lack of control of the system and its users is a huge contributing factor to the problem, he explained. Turner went on to say that "You cannot save money by not upgrading. No person has any say as to whether or not you upgrade. It is all up to the software."

Mason said, "We had an opportunity to get 16 computers through Dell for \$400 and some change per month on a lease. It will be put in the fiscal budget to replace the rest."

Turner told the board that they can purchase a \$30,000 network system for \$11,000 by buying a refurbished system.

Dent asked how soon can this be done to which Turner answered that the new Dells should be here next week, and a new server and software could also be here within a week.

The motion to go ahead with replacing the computer network and server was made, seconded, and approved.

Next, the board considered a proposal from Covenant Home Health Agency.

AN ORDER CALLING A MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION TAX ELECTION AND A BOND ELECTION TO BE HELD BY THE MULESHOE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, MAKING PROVISION FOR THE CONDUCT OF THE ELECTION, AND RESOLVING OTHER MATTERS INCIDENT AND RELATED TO SUCH ELECTION

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees (the Board) of the MULESHOE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT located in the Counties of Bailey and Lamb, Texas (the District) hereby finds and determines that an election should be held to determine whether the District shall be authorized to issue bonds of the District in the amount and for the purposes hereinafter identified; and WHEREAS, the Board hereby finds and determines that the necessity to construct various capital improvements within the District that it is in the public interest to call and hold a bond election at the earliest possible date to authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds for the purposes hereinafter identified; and

WHEREAS, the Board hereby finds and determines that the District's maintenance and operations tax rate limit should be in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 45, as amended, Texas Education Code;

WHEREAS, the Board hereby finds and determines that the holding of the bond election and maintenance and operations tax election on the date set forth below is in the best interests of the citizens of the District; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE MULESHOE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT THAT: SECTION 1: An election shall be held on the 13th day of May, 2006, a uniform election date, in the MULESHOE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, which date is sixty-two (62) or more

days from the date of the adoption of this order (the Order) for the purpose of submitting the following propositions to the qualified voters of the District: **PROPOSITION NO.1** "Shall the Board of Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District be authorized to levy and cause to be assessed and collected annual ad valorem taxes for the further maintenance of public free schools therein at a rate not to exceed \$1.50 on each \$100 valuation of taxable property in the school district, as authorized by Chapter 45, as amended, Texas

Education Code, including Section 45.003, as amended, Texas Education Code?' **PROPOSITION NO.2**

"Shall the Board of Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District be authorized to issue and sell bonds of the District in the principal amount of \$25,000,000 for the purpose of constructing, renovating, acquiring, and equipping school buildings in the District, and the purchase of the necessary sites for school buildings, such bonds to mature serially or otherwise in accordance with law; any issue or series of such bonds to bear interest per annum at such rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable, or otherwise) as may be determined within the discretion of the Board of Trustees, provided that such rate or rates of interest shall not exceed the maximum rate per annum authorized by law at the time of the issuance of any issue or series of such bonds; and shall the Board of Trustees of the District be authorized to levy and pledge, and cause to be assessed and collected, annual ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the cost of any credit agreements executed in connection with the

bonds? SECTION 2: The school election precincts hereby established for the purpose of holding the election, the polling places hereby designated for holding the election in the school election precincts, and the Presiding Judges and the Alternate Presiding Judges hereby appointed for holding the election in the school election precincts are identified in Exhibit A to this Order, and his exhibit is incorporated by reference for all purposes.

The Presiding Judge named above in Exhibit A shall appoint not less than two (2) resident qualified voters of the District to act as clerks in order to properly conduct the election. To the extent required by the Texas Election Code, as amended, or other applicable law, the appointment of these clerks must include a person fluent in the Spanish language to serve as a clerk to render oral aid in the Spanish language to any voter desiring such aid at the polls on election day If the Presiding Judge appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall serve as one of the clerks. In the absence of the Presiding Judge, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall perform the duties of the Presiding Judge of the election precinct.

On election day, the polls shall be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. The Muleshoe City Hall, 215 South First, Muleshoe, Texas 79347, which is a public place within the District and is hereby designated as the main early voting location. Pamela Thomason (whose mailing address is Muleshoe City Hall, 215 South First, Muleshoe, Texas 79347) is hereby appointed as the Early Voting Clerk to conduct such early voting in the election. The Early Voting Clerk shall appoint the Deputy Early Voting Clerks. This office or place shall remain open to permit early voting from 8:00 o'clock a.m. to 5:00 o'clock p.m. each day with the exception of Saturdays, Sundays, and official State holidays. In addition, early voting will be conducted on May 2, 2006 and May 9, 2006 from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m. Early voting shall commence on the 12th day before the election and continue through the 4th preceding the date of the election all as provided by the provisions of the Texas Election Code.

Additionally, temporary branch offices for early voting by personal appearance shall be established and maintained in accordance with the Texas Election Code. The locations, dates, clerks, and hours of operation for early voting at these temporary branch offices are identified in Exhibit B hereto and this exhibit is incorporated by reference for all purposes.

An Early Voting Ballot Board is hereby established for the purpose of processing early voting results. Kerry Moore is hereby appointed the Presiding Judge of the Early Voting Ballot Board. The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) resident qualified voters of the District to serve as members of the Early Voting Ballot Board.

SECTION 3: Voting machines may be used in holding and conducting the election on election day; provided, however, that if the use of voting machines is not practicable, then in that event, electronic voting devices may be used in conducting the election on election day; provided, however, in the event the use of such electronic voting devices is not practicable, the election may be conducted on election day by the use of paper ballots (except as otherwise provided in this section). Voting machines or paper ballots may be used for early voting by personal appearance (except as otherwise provided in this section). Pursuant to Section 61.012, as amended, Texas Election Code, the District shall provide at least one accessible voting system in each polling place used in the election. Such voting system shall comply with Texas and federal laws establishing the requirement for voting systems that permit voters with physical disabilities to cast a secret ballot. Paper ballots may be used for early voting by mail.

SECTION 4: The official ballot shall be prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code, as amended, so as to permit voters to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid propositions which shall appear on the ballot substantially as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 1

"MAINTENANCE TAX AS LIMITED BY THE PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 45 OF THE TEXAS EDUCATION CODE, AS AMENDED."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 "THE ISSUANCE OF \$25,000,000 OF SCHOOL BUILDING BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

SECTION 5: All resident, qualified voters of the District shall be permitted to vote at the election, and, on the day of the election, such voters shall vote at the designated polling places. The election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code, as amended, except as modified by the provisions of the Texas Education Code, as amended, and as may be required by law. To the extent required by law, all election materials and proceedings shall be printed in both English and Spanish.

SECTION 6: A substantial copy of this Order shall serve as proper notice of the election. This notice, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be published at least one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the District, and the publication of this notice of election shall occur in such newspaper not more than thirty (30) days and not less than ten (10) days before the day of the election. Additionally, this notice shall be posted on the bulletin board used for posting notices of District meetings not later than twenty-one (21) days prior to election day. SECTION 7: The recitals contained in the preamble hereof are hereby found to be true, and such recitals are hereby made a part of this Order for all purposes and are adopted as a part

of the judgment and findings of the Board. SECTION 8: All orders and resolutions, or parts thereof, which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Order are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Order shall be and remain controlling as to the matters ordered herein.

SECTION 9: This Order shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas and the United States of America.

SECTION 10: If any provision of this Order or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held to be invalid, the remainder of this Order and the application of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall nevertheless be valid, and the Board hereby declares that this Order would have been enacted without such invalid provision.

SECTION 11: It is officially found, determined, and declared that the meeting at which this Order is adopted was open to the public and public notice of the time, place, and subject matter of the public business to be considered at such meeting, including this Order, was given, all as required by Chapter 551, as amended, Texas Government Code.

SECTION 12: This Order shall be in force and effect from and after its final passage, and it is so ordered. PASSED AND APPROVED, this the 3rd day of March, 2006.







"I am willing to serve and will be a member that will speak my mind in a positive and caring way," he said. Pierson works as an investment representative at Edward Jones Investments. An active member of the Rotary Club, he is married with two children.

Robert "Bob" Donaldson is married with two sons. He moved to the Muleshoe-Lazbuddie area in 1954 and for 21 years was manager of Pay and Save Grocery store in Muleshoe until retirement.

"I know how a business should be run," Donaldson said. "I also know how employees, customers, people in general should be treated.'

Donaldson said he will be completely committed to making the hospital and nursing home places the citizens can be proud of. The most valuable assets both have, he said, are the people who work there.

The biggest problems the hospital and nursing home have are getting doctors and nurses to come to Muleshoe. "We need to talk to any and all doctors who are willing to look at us," he said. "Without doctors, we don't make money and without those funds we can't upgrade the hospital's needs."

Miller lists his qualifications as 10 years on the board of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District, including serving as vice-president and currently as president. He also has 24 years as an elected member on the Board of Directors for the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District, where he served as vicepresident and is currently presiding President. He was appointed member of the 100 Man Committee for the Texas Soil and Water Conservation District and served two terms on the Lazbuddie School Board, including holding office there as vice-president.

Miller said his experience qualifies him for the position. That experience, specifically on the hospital board, gives him "an in-depth knowledge of how the hospital district functions and what it needs to survive and grow.

"I have worked closely with extremely knowledgeable people from Covenant Health Care Systems and I know what it will take to not only bring new growth to our district, but to also ensure the quality and attitudes remain positively high," Miller said.

Miller said the hospital's greatest assets are its employees.

"Without quality people that include doctors, nurses, therapists, pharmacy, personnel, supportive technical personnel, business personnel, administration and auxiliary, the hospital is merely a building," he said. The biggest problem the district faces, he believes, is adequate staff.

"We now have wellqualified personnel, but as our district grows, we will need more practitioners and

Miller moved to Muleshoe in 1954. He is married with four children.

Zona Gatewood has lived in the Muleshoe area all her life. She is equipped to be a board member because of her education at ENMU and the hands-on experience of having a business for 16 years when she and her husband had Irrigation Supply in Muleshoe.

"I am experienced in business procedures," Gatewood said. "We also had employees, so I learned about employee employer relationships as well as relating to our customers and their needs."

She said she can work well with the other board members.

As for the greatest asset the Park View. hospital has, she lists "the facilities in conjunction with the doctors and employees.

asset, along with doctors and employees," Gatewood said. The facility, without a doubt, is a wonderful asset with its beautiful surroundings overlooking the park. The nursing home, where her mother resides, has a problem because "residents that are not in a state to fully for themselves sometimes do not get the hands-on care they need, which includes personal grooming and dental hygiene.

Another problem Gatewood listed is that the "food wagon" is used to transport residents to the hospital "and should not be."

She suggests the board, administration employees work together to address these issues and would be in favor of interviewing residents and their families to see what measures can be taken to improve the conditions at

Gatewood and husband have three children. Mason is a lifetime resident

Park View are its greatest. He and his wife have a stepdaughter and a son. He farms and raises livestock.

His interest in the continued operation and development of the hospital that serves his community is one reason he feels qualified for the position.

"Success is achieved by hard work and dedication,' Mason said. "One should not expect to be paid for doing nothing; and those who do their job well should be compensated accordingly. There are times to make decisions and implement changes, even though they are not popular or well received. It is also important to ask the opinions of those most knowledgeable about a subject in the process of looking for the answer to a problem.

Mason lists the employees of the hospital district as the greatest assets.

"It is important to recognize the efforts of all levels of staff. not just those who maintain high visibility and patient contact," he said.

The biggest problems, he said, are the continued skyrocketing costs as reimbursements get smaller. "In addition, the overall morale of the employees who serve the community through the hospital should be the highest possible," he said. "Happy employees will better serve the patients in the community when they are in need of services.

"I believe it is essential that the overall operation of the hospital be streamlined to ensure that the hospital district maintains a stable financial future."




