LEVELLAND MEN TO MAKE "ENDURANCE TEST" IN FORD

LEVELLAND, Texas, June 20.—(Special). The flight of the ship "Fort Worth" placed not only Fort Worth but all of Texas in the spot light and now three men here at Levelland, Texas, out on the South Plains are to attempt a different kind of an endurance test that is expected to create a national interest. These men will leave June 20th on a non-stop trip in a Ford car to visit each of the 252 county seat towns in Texas. The trip is estimated to be from 40,000 to 50,000 miles and the time required will be much more than the 172 hours that the ship "Fort Worth" soared in the Texas skies. H. C. Gore, W. C. Breedlove and Walter Wright are the men to make the test. The start will be made to the north with Olton the county seat of Lamb county the first of the 252 county seats to be visited and Dallas scheduled to be the last. The "Ford Musketeers" will travel day and night and expect to create a lot of favorable attention over the nation for Hockley County, one of the youngest counties in the state, as well as for the entire South Plains, of Texas where 5,000,000 acres of virgin agricultural land awaits development on the level prairies. Information about Levelland and the South Plains will be handed out at every town visited.

"Half feed and half cotton made more cotton", J. E. Morgan declared the other day in talking with the county agent, Mr. Morgan, farm 60 acres in the Magnolia community and has followed the practice of planting half his acres in feed and half in cotton for the last seven or eight years. "I had a few acres that I planted to cotton year after year and found that it did not make near the yield that my cotton in old feed land did", he said. "I have found, too, that my land does not blow so much as it used to."

Mr. Morgan is experimenting with a number of crops including several varieties of cowpeas and alfalfa. He planted two thirds of an acre of alfalfa in lake bottom land near his house last week. His main stays of feed crops are corn, maize, and hog corn. He says he likes to grow corn to finish off his hogs, of which he has some for sale every year. He recently sold 17 head of shotes from September litters for about \$300. Seven milk cows and a flock of chickens are the other kinds of livestock used on this farm through which market the feedstuffs, very little of which he ever sells.

"It is interesting to know" says E. Shaver, county agent, "that Mr. Morgan is a brother-in-law to W. Waldrip of Knox County, the farmer who has won wide recognition in West Texas for his system of planting half cotton and half feed. Last year Mr. Waldrip made 32 bales of cotton from 52 acres of land farmed on the half cotton-half feed plan, while neighboring land across the fence made only 25 bales on 80 acres."

Hereford claims the largest single wheat field, under one fence, in the State. It comprises 6,000 acres.

SANITATION IN POULTRY YARD HELPS TWO WAYS

Care exercised in keeping poultry yards clean and in sanitary condition has a double function in keeping the flock clear of parasites that undermine the health and sap the vigor of the birds. The injury by mites, fleas, and other parasitic organisms, is sometimes obvious but it happens that some insects and other small creatures are carriers of internal parasites of poultry.

For example, according to specialists in the United States Department of Agriculture, one variety of roundworm must develop for one stage of its life outside the poultry it affects. The roundworm lays its eggs within the droppings. They will not mature if picked up by a fowl. They do mature if a water flea picks up the eggs. Then, if a hen takes in the water flea with her drinking water the roundworm parasite of the flea developed into a poultry parasite.

Many similar examples are known and others are suspected. The grass hopper, for instance, has recently been shown to transmit at least one important parasite of domestic poultry.

Sanitation and cleanliness which prevents such insects from having access to the droppings may thus break a cycle through which infection reaches the flock. The insects in themselves may not be harmful to poultry, but if they have had an opportunity to feed on contaminated droppings they may be the means of transmitting these singular parasites.

TEXTILE GRADUATES OF TECH SECURE POSITIONS

LUBBOCK, Texas, June 18.—The five graduates of the Texas Technological College, textile department,

who received their diplomas May 27, have all secured good paying positions with large companies, according to Professor E. W. Camp, head of the department. Professor Camp said he had never known textile graduate students to secure jobs with such uniformly large salaries. He describes this to the increased growth in textile manufacturing and the movement of the textile industry southward.

College officials are also very much pleased that the first graduates of the textile department have been able to secure places with nationally known concerns, thus giving evidence of the high standing which this department of the institution has already achieved in the textile world. And it is further seen as proof that the school is fulfilling its mission to stimulate the textile industry as was intended by the founders of the Texas Technological College.

Jack Maddox of Missoula has accepted a place with the Goodrich Rubber Company of Akron, Ohio, and has already commenced his duties. He is in the company's textile laboratories.

Rudd Hardesty of Abernathy will be in the knitting department of the Davenport Silk Hosiery Mills at Chattanooga, Tenn. He will begin work July 1.

DeWitt McGee of Wayside has been offered a position with the American Chatham Corporation of Rome, Ga., a five million dollar concern engaged in the manufacture of rayon.

Julie Love of Marshall and Ray Thomas of Tehama have both accepted positions with the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co. of Akron, Ohio. They will begin work July 1.

1,000 DATE PLANTS ARE PLANTED IN RIO GRANDE

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, June 18.—Nearly 1,000 offshoots from Persian date trees, gathered during an eight months tour of Iraq (Mesopotamia), have just been planted in the Lower Rio Grande Valley in the experiment program being conducted by the Experiment Station of the A. & M. College of Texas in cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture to develop the date industry in Texas. Announcement to this effect was made here following a conference between T. Ralph Robinson, plant breeder of the Bureau of Plant Industry, U. S. D. A., and Director A. B. Conner of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Mr. Robinson came here following a week at the Westcott station of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station where he assisted Superintendent W. H. Friend in planting the shipment.

The date offshoots were obtained from the native groves of Iraq by Ralph W. Nixon, of the United States Department of Agriculture, who made a special study of date production along the Persian Gulf and selected many rain resistant varieties which it is believed will thrive under the climatic conditions prevalent in the Rio Grande Valley section of Texas. The expedition for gathering the offshoots was made possible by special appropriation by Congress through the efforts of Congressman John Garner of Texas. The shipment, comprising 986 offshoots and representing twenty-seven distinct varieties, was assigned to the Texas Station by the United States Department of Agriculture for trial in the Valley country where climatic conditions are somewhat similar to that where the plants were gathered.

"This shipment of dates," said Mr. Robinson, "is the most important ever received in this country." In order to guard against the introduction of harmful insect pests with the offshoots, the latter were subjected to drastic "cooking" treatments at Washington, D. C., before shipment to Texas for planting. "Only a limited area of the United States is adapted to date production and a \$19.23 per centage of this area lies in Texas," Mr. Robinson said.

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PROHIBITION KILLINGS

The newspapers are being inundated upon by the news-gathering agencies which are reporting the bootleggers' story of killings by prohibition officers, and carefully phrasing their "stories" for propaganda effect. The Congressional Record of June 1929, is a complete list of all prohibition officers killed and all persons killed by them, with a detailed account of the facts in the case. The office has made a careful analysis of that report. The news "stories" have made the public believe that these killings were all of "innocent citizens." In reporting what Senator Brookhart said upon the Senate floor recently one agency stated it was defending the killings of "innocent persons."

The following facts taken from the Congressional Record referred to show how "innocent" they were: the 155 killed, 85 were shooting Federal officers when the officers began shooting, 10 others were gaged in shooting with the officers, 52 others pulled their guns first but the officers were better shots, others made attempts upon the life of the officer with other instruments than guns. Most of the others were endeavoring to escape. In 149 cases of the 155 the "innocent citizens" was known to be a bootlegger.

Among the six innocent persons killed, one was a boy who was aroused the still when it was being raided who was not seen till after the fight was over, and then found wounded 200 yards away. Another, when the officers were chasing a bootlegger suddenly stepped out from behind a truck in front of the officer's car. The officers had no time to stop before striking him. The third case was not killed by a federal officer but by a man who was piloting the officers to a still and who ran into another car and killed its driver. He received a prison sentence of from one year to life. A man and his daughter were killed in a boat collision and another was killed as he handed a gun to his confederate, believed to be for the purpose of killing the officer.

In 65 cases of the above killings the Grand Juries, after hearing the evidence, refused to indict the officers. In 59 instances the officers were indicted but acquitted on trial. As indication of how unfair we have treated the prohibition officers, of the four convictions had, one of them was being shot at by the bootleggers before he returned the fire, and yet he received a three year sentence for killing the bootlegger in self defense. No bootlegger in America would have been convicted under such circumstances. In numerous instances where the officers were killed by the most outrageous methods on the part of the bootleggers, the bootleggers have gone scot-free as was the case at El Paso. The fact is, we are so unfair to our officers that there is not a law upon the Federal statutes by which a man can be tried for murdering a Federal officer.

Will those who are howling about these bootleggers being killed in open defiance of our laws, permit me to call their attention to the fact that 55 of our Federal officers have been murdered by the bootleggers and several hundred of our state officers have been murdered. These 155 citizens, with six possible exceptions, were all guilty of defying the laws of their country. These officers were all innocent citizens and died in the line of duty just as much as did any American soldier who died upon the battle field of France.

As President Hoover said recently, the outlawed liquor traffic is at war with our government. And he has repeatedly called upon American citizens to show their loyalty to their government in this crisis. We have nothing against the citizens of Germany, but when their government was at war with ours, we much preferred seeing her soldiers fall, than to seeing our own soldiers fall in battle. In this war between the outlawed liquor traffic and our government we much prefer seeing the enemies of our government fall than to see our own faithful officers die in battle in behalf of our country's honor, and we believe every loyal American citizen will take the same view.

Because Hoover was elected as a dry and is honestly trying to enforce the law, the outlawed liquor traffic is doing its best to discredit both prohibition and Hoover's administration. This is the reason that our papers are filled with these gross misrepresentations concerning the killings of "innocent citizens." One well-known organization, I understand, has announced that they have 200 news reporters pledged to get their story of the news into the papers.

Let intelligent American citizens not be misled.
