WILSON SCHOOL TRUSTEES CALL BOND ELECTION

At a call meeting of the trustees of the Wilson School district last week, it was decided to call a bond election for July 20th for the purpose of raising funds to pay for the installation of gas and steam radiators equipment, indoor toilets, painting window sills, varnishing all woodwork, calcimining the basement rooms and equipping the kitchen for the home economics department. The amount of the bond is to be \$6,000 to run over a period of ten years.

Contrary to the belief of some that this will raise the taxes some members of the board point out that it will not increase taxes. A \$3,000 bond was paid last year and they point out that the interest that has been used for this bond together with the increased valuation will take care of the bond.

Our tax rate remains at seventy-five cents, the cheapest tax rate that we know of considering the excellent school we maintain. The valuations are no higher than neighboring towns and in some instances no as high.

The board realizes that \$6,000 will not cover the expense for the above mentioned, but with the balance left from last school year they believe that sufficient funds will be had to make the improvements.

We hope the issue will go over as we need every thing they are planning on doing and we need it the worst way.

We have a good school, and we have a splendid board, a board that has not only been operating on a cash basis, but have usually finished the year with a cash balance on hand. Let's show our appreciation to the faculty and board by going to the polls and giving our approval to the \$6,000 bond.—Wilson Pointer.

ORDINANCE

An ordinance to prohibit any person selling any goods, wares or merchandise by auction or selling within certain limits within the city, fixing penalties for violation thereof, repealing all ordinances in conflict therewith and providing an emergency clause in case of emergency to enforce the same.

WHAT TWENTY YEARS HAVE BROUGHT

The starting progress in the United States of industry, wages, luxuries and conveniences is pictured by comparing some outstanding factors today and twenty years ago.

Twenty years ago the average working week was sixty hours, the average family income \$400, the average saving of ten million savings depositors \$700. Today the average working week most workmen is forty-four hours, the average family income is \$2,200, the average savings bank deposits of twenty three million persons \$1,000.

Twenty years ago there were 312,000 automobiles; today there are 24,000,000. Twenty years ago there were no radios; today there are 8,000,000 sets. Twenty years ago there were 8,000,000 telephones; today there are 17,000,000.

What is the answer? Simply that America has learned to use power in place of muscle. Twenty years ago the average wage earner was assisted by three horse power of machinery. Today he is assisted by seven horse power although the population of the country has increased only one-third in twenty years. No other nation can compare with the United States in productive capacity and power is the answer.

WOMEN WORKERS IN TEXAS REPRESENT 1-3RD OF ALL

About 20 per cent of employees in establishments of all kinds in Texas are women, according to the Texas Department of Labor, which recently compiled statistics from 2,763 concerns, including all kinds of factories, hospitals, laundries, barber shops, beauty parlors, hotels, restaurants, mercantile, publishing and printing, public utility, automobile and other kinds of establishments.

In the 2,763 concerns were employed 30,976 men, 12,935 women, and 1,151 children. Of the male employees, 67 per cent were married, of the women 37 per cent. Only 39 per cent of the women employees were found to earn as much as \$15 per week. Newspaper and printing establishments made the best showing in wages for women employees with \$1 per cent receiving more than \$15 a week and only 9 per cent receiving less than \$10 a week. Printing establishments also showed the shortest working hours with men and women working an average of 48 hours a week.

With geologists believing most of Texas' mineral wealth is still undiscovered or undeveloped, the state's mineral out-put in 1928 was valued at \$435,000,000.

In 1920 Texas had 29 cities of above 10,000 population and five above 50,000. The 1930 census is expected to show 50 cities above 10,000 and eleven of above 50,000 with three and possibly four above 200,000. Since 1920 Texas has grown in population at the rate of more than 100,000 a year, according to Census Bureau reports and estimates.
