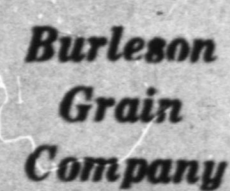

Report Shows C-C Active Past Month

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has joined the United States Chamber of Commerce in its endeavor to secure a birth registration law, which will be effective in Texas. Both these organizations have requested the assistance of the local Chamber of Commerce in Texas to aid them in securing such a law. Texas is one of the three states in the United States which does not register births of the inhabitants. This is a movement which should have the earnest consideration of our entire citizenship.

Mrs. F. H. Douthit, President of the Douthit Engineering Co., of Chicago, whose company owns the patents on the latest machinery for use in powdered milk plants was here a few days ago. He met with a committee composed of our citizens, comprising A. L. Lockwood, W. B. Slaton, Robert King and Dr. E. E. Calloway with reference to securing the assistance of the people of Tahoka and Lynn County toward the erection of the milk cooling plant at Tahoka. Mr. Douthit has recently erected a \$200,000.00 powdered milk plant at Tyler and is contemplating erecting another one at Lamesa. The above committee is working with Mr. Douthit and a Committee of Lamesa citizens on the above proposition. It is proposed to extend milk routes out of Tahoka and gather up the milk once each day. It will be cooled here and shipped to the Lamesa plant in thermos trucks. Letters have been mailed to Chamber of Commerce Secretaries in towns where the cooling stations are in operation for information as to their success and practicability. Mr. Douthit stated that it was regrettable that this country should ship out so much feed that the farmers should find a more profitable means of disposing of their feed.

Plans are going forward toward the Greatest Lynn County Fair. The catalogues have been printed and are fast being distributed to the farmers of this county. Each community has been requested to appoint a committee to prepare their Community Agricultural Exhibit and place it here for the Fair.

One or two of our merchants have mentioned that they would like to have a space at the Fair for an advertising booth. If you desire such a space you should let the Secretary or Manager know about it at once so that arrangements can be made for a tent to house such booths. It will add greatly to the Fair if we could have a number of such booths, nothing to sell, but only to advertise. If you desire such a space to advertise implements, automobiles, gas and oils or general merchandise, will you please let the Manager or Secretary of the Fair know about it within the next ten days.

The Trades Day seem to be going over in a great way. A survey of the amount of cream sold to the local dealers here last Trades Day reveals the fact that approximately 1,000 pounds more cream was marketed here on that date than on any one day this summer. In other words our produce dealers paid out about \$376.00 more last Saturday. Trades Day, then they had paid out any other one day this summer. All of their reported new customers on that day. This is the only attempted check up on the value of the Trades Day.

The Management of the Lynn County Fair are planning for a first class parade for the first morning of the Fair. Each merchant should have a decorated float or car, carrying his advertisement and boosting Ta-

hoka and Lynn County in that parade.

The proposition of securing a permanent fair ground has not met with much encouragement. It seems that Tahoka is going to miss a good opportunity to secure an annual Panhandle South Plains Poultry and Swine Show by not having the necessary grounds and building and working for it. Lubbock has the Panhandle South Plains Fair and Plainview has the Panhandle Plains Dairy Show and some town is going to start a Poultry and Swine Show. Tahoka is well located for it and with the co-operation of our citizens we can get it located here. The town is going to get it that goes for it. If you are interested and wish to see such a proposition put over, your expression of such interest should be made known to the manager or President of the Lynn County Fair.

During the month of July three Community Meetings were held. Some of them were pretty well attended by our citizens and others were not so well attended. In most instances we had good attendance from the rural people and a better feeling of friendship has been the result. This is quite noticeable by the callers at the Chamber of Commerce of people from the communities visited. Last Saturday the office was crowded with men and boys getting information relative to club work and catalogues of the fair. Tahoka could become a greater county center if the business men would make it a point to cultivate the personal friendship of their customers and especially the friendship of those who only come here occasionally.

The Highway committee of which Bill Burleson is chairman has been successful in securing the co-operation of Roswell, Tatum, Brownfield and Post in financing the building of three large highway signs. These signs, attractively painted, eight by twelve feet in size, advertising Highway No. 84 as the best highway to Carlsbad, Roswell, Lovington and Albuquerque have been placed at Post, Snyder and Roscoe. Three cars of tourists were seen to stop, read the sign at Post, back up their cars and drive via Tahoka after they had read the sign, and had headed toward Lubbock. The above was seen to happen while the signs were being braced. We should have more signs directing traffic toward Tahoka.

A letter has been received from H. C. Robertson, District Manager of the Western Union Telegraph Co., stating that Mr. Jenkins will come here in the near future to make a survey in regard to placing an up-town Telegraph office here. Each and every citizen who is interviewed by Mr. Jenkins can help put this proposition over if you will be frank and tell him of the inconvenience of the office being away down at the depot.

The Chamber of Commerce has secured forty five copies of the Report made by the University of Texas' Bureau of Economic Geology on the Potash deposit west of Tahoka and these will be mailed along with a letter from this organization to as many Fertilizer Manufacturers as are in the United States. The United States Department of Commerce has furnished the office with a list of the Fertilizer Manufacturers all of whom are rated at \$300,000.00 or more.

We are glad to report the following new members of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce since the issuance of the July number of the news letter: J. C. Woodridge Lmbr. Company, Ray E. Shaver, A. J. Glasgow and Company, and J. Wilson-sky. We appreciate the attitude of these people as shown by lining up with the only organization in town which has for its sole object the service of the entire community. There are many others here who would join if they were only solicited. Mr. Chester Connolly, chairman of the Membership Committee would be glad to receive the membership of any of your friends or acquaintances.

The Chamber of Commerce and the Kiwanis Club awarded Mrs. L. C. Crews, winner of first place in the Lynn County Tailored Wash Dress Contest with a trip to the A. & M. College Short Course.

PORTALES, N. M., will be the home of the Eastern New Mexico division of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce according to present plans. The Portales chamber of commerce plans to furnish office space and extend the services of their secretary, Sam Seay, to the regional organization.

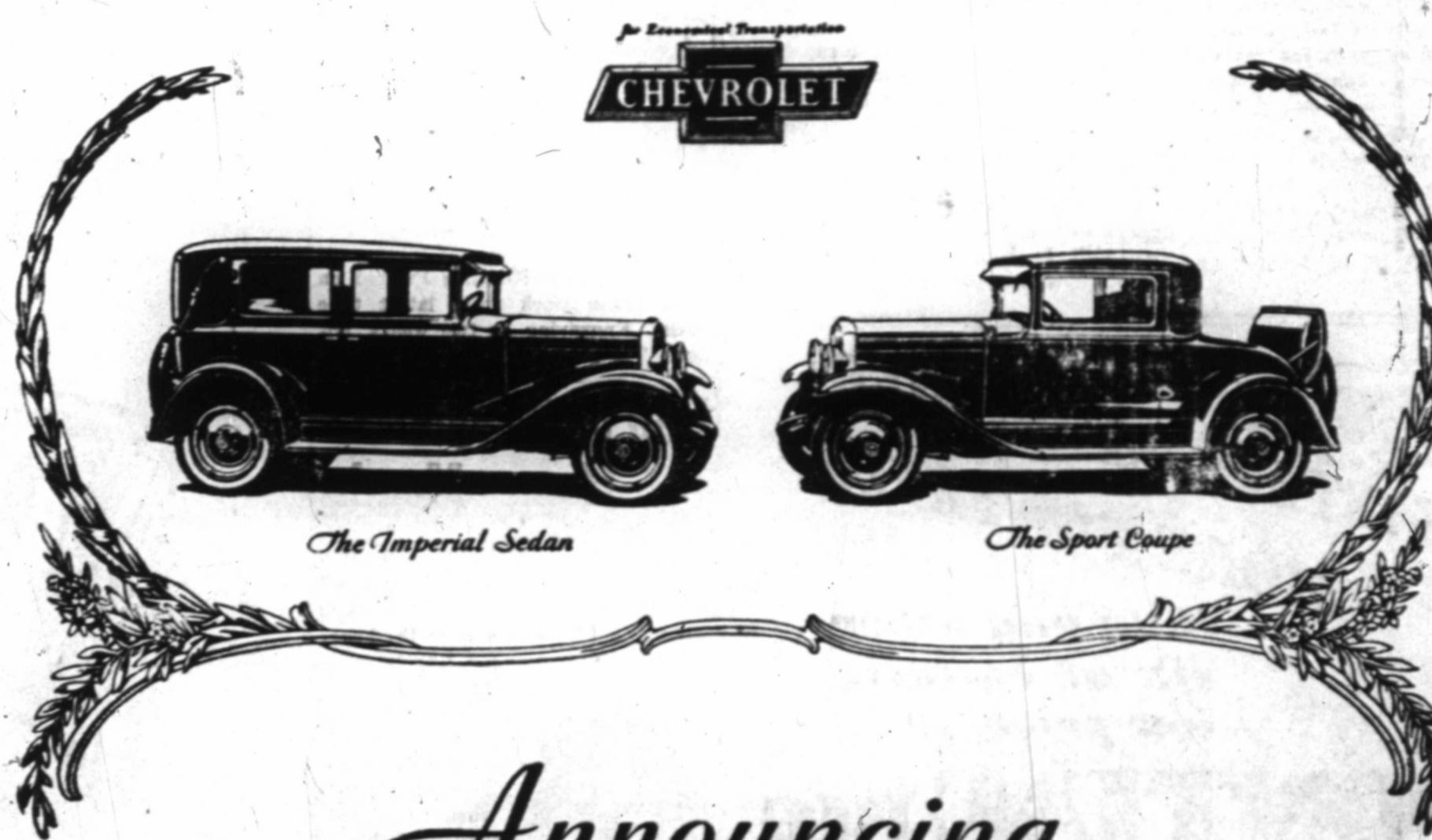

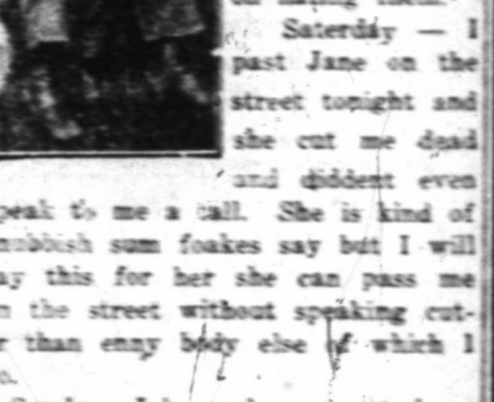

8. Rock Collection—Minerals and fossils, mounted and labeled.

Absolutely Germ-Free Milk is Impossibility

Clean milk should contain neither foreign matter nor bacteria of any kind. If milk could be obtained and stored that was absolutely free of bacteria, it would lose its nutritive value.

Dairy Hints

A balanced ration for the cow will help balance the milk account.

Give the cows all the hay they will clean up reasonably well, legumes preferred.

Get acquainted with your milking machine. It may be able to explain how the milk can be better.

The feed saved by cutting out one low-producing cow will pay the cost of feeding an entire dairy herd for a year.

The chief reason why a cow does not startle is death on pasture since it is because the summer season is too short.

Give a calf the right kind. Heifer cost too much to raise to waste time on poor ones. A good heifer poorly developed is not a good investment, either.

Many feeding experiments have fully demonstrated that the percentage of cream in milk is not materially altered either by the amount or quality of feed.

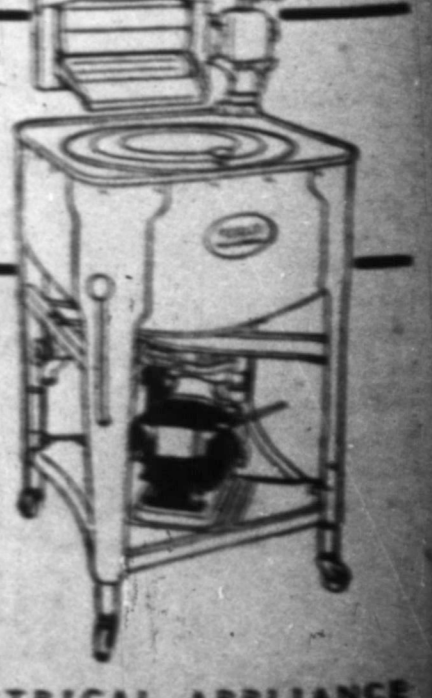
