and Federal funds would be available at the ratio of two to one for the paving of highway No. 9. State funds would be furnished in an equal amount 'with local funds to pave highway No. 84, and if it shou'd be designated as a Federal highway, as has been promised, two to one would be allowed for the paving of this highway.

There has heretofore been a strong sentiment throughout Lynn County against voting highway bonds. But, since the proposal to issue state bonds has fallen through, the voting of local bonds is the only alternative if we expect to pave any time soon. Many people who have heretofore opposed county highway bonds are now ready to support them, we have been told.

The News is not undertaking to initiate a campaign for highway, bonds. We are willing to leave that to others. At the suggestion of others, however, we are calling attention to these facts, and if there should seem to be sufficient favorable sentiment to justify the calling of an election, we would be glad to support the movement.



That the cotton co-operative marketing movement is sweeping the State of Texas is indicated in deliveries already this year of more than 400.000 balas of cotton, according to S. L. Leathers, local representative of the Texas Cotton Cooperative Association.

Mr. Leathers stated that he had just received word from the State Offices of Dallas that the 400,000 bale mark was passed with Monday's receipts, and at the rate deliveries continue to be made from all sections of the State, the half-million bale mark will be reached by November 1st. Mr. Leathers also stated that similar reports of substantial progress were being received from other cotton co-operative marketing associations throughout the cotton belt.

"The bulk of deliveries are now being made to the Seasonal Pool," Mr. Leathers said, "through which pooling plan the member receives a final return on the actual grade and staple of cotton delivered by him based on the season's average sales prices for each particular quality; In this manner, he does not receive either the season's high price or the seaseon's low price, but rather the average price throughout the year."

The Association's 90 per cent initial advance on the market value of classed cotton continues, it was said. Deliveries to the channels of co-operative marketing this season are already 150,000 bales greater than As Judge G. C. Grider and son, at any time during the past ten



One piece of agricultural work which the organization sponsored in the fall of 1929 gives promise of bringing many thousands of dollars to the farmers of Lynn County, through the assistance of the introduction of the Misdale cotton, a better staple, into Lynn County.
