Seek Improvement Of Turkey Market

College Station.--How to feed and fit turkeys to meet the United States grades which will be used in buying and selling at many Texas points this year is the object of a series of one-day turkey schools for farmers, inaugurated recently by the A. & M. College Extension Service through county and home demonstration agents in co-operating with local dealers and co-operative associations. Beginning in South Texas with Cuero as a starting point, Paul A. Cunyus, assistant Extension poultry husbandman, and H. L. Shrader, Extension poultryman, United States Department of Agriculture, are helping local Extension agents in thrilling turkey raisers in the essential points in the new grading system outlined at the recent Southwest Turkey Grading School at San Angelo.

Farmers are told that because turkeys wait until real cold weather to put on fat and to mature their feathers, it is very hard to produce high grade Texas turkeys for the Thanksgiving market. Lack of finish and excessive pin feathers cause the early season Texas product to sell at a disadvantage many times. Furthermore, it is pointed out that in seven out of ten years the Christmas market is higher in price than the Thanksgiving market, and that half the time the January market is equal to or better than the Christmas market. Systematic feeding and watering during several weeks of cool weather prior to selling is recommended to producers as a means of making turkeys take the prime or choice grades which top the market.

Other important factors lowering the grade of Texas turkeys are careless handling, poor bleeding, and late forced feeding, farmers are shown in these schools. Tying wings or feet, loading in shallow coons, or any kind of rough handling from farm to market or in the dressing plant will produce bruises which materially reduce the grade. Feed left in the crop quickly sours, and unless the crop is carefully removed at the dressing plant, the grade may be lowered as much as two or three cents per pound. Even if removed such turkeys cannot make the highest grade, prime. Other U. S. grades are choice, medium and common, all four grades being further qualified by age and sex.

WOMEN EXCHANGE FLOWERS

COOPER--Women's home demonstration clubs of Delta county are planning a flower exchange for the month of November and again in the spring. The members will list with the home agent the foundation planting or small plants that they need and will bring to her office the plants that they have to spare for her to distribute according to the listed requests.

Terraces Land For 12 Seasons

COMANCHE--Twelve years cropping terraced land has established the value of this practice to the satisfaction of J. B. Irwin, Swan Hill farmer. Thirteen years ago he terraced 30 acres of his farm and the yields from this land have improved year by year, he says. "This year I made 23.4 bushels of oats per acre on that land while I only made 15.7 on some other land of the same kind except that it has not been terraced, a difference of 7.7 bushels or \$2.31 per acre." Mr. Irwin further states that he thinks the terraced land is easily worth \$20.00 more an acre than the unterraced land and that he intends to terrace all of his farm as fast as he can get to it.

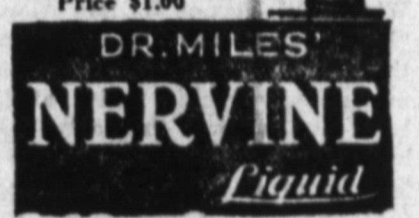
