Tahoka Plays Slaton Here Friday, Brownfield Nov. 11

The Tahoka Bulldogs will play the Slaton Cubs (second team) on the local grounds Friday afternoon, the game opening at 3:30 P. M.

On Wednesday, November 11, the Bulldogs will play the Brownfield team on the Tahoka grounds. Brownfield won from Tahoka 7 to 6 in that city last year, and the two teams are apparently about evenly matched again this year.

It is hoped that a large number of football fans will be present on each of these occasions to root for the home team.

COUNTY TEACHERS INSTITUTE CHANGED TO WILSON

County Superintendent H. P. Caviness announces a change in the time and place of holding the next session of the Lynn County Teachers' Institute. The Institute will be held in Wilson on Friday and Saturday, December 4-5, he says. It had been previously announced that the Institute would be held in Tahoka on Thursday and Friday, December 3 and 4.

The change was made by the county board of trustees, Mr. Caviness states, when it was learned that the teachers in the Tahoka schools would hold an institute of their own.

Cotton ginning is moving along at a rapid rate and it is estimated that a little more than half of the crop is still in the fields. The ginnings from the three gins up to Wednesday night were about 3700 bales, counting two round bales for one square. Up to Saturday night, a greater part of the cotton had been gathered by the farmers' own families, but the fact that school started Monday may retard the gathering somewhat unless enough out side pickers came in to take the place of the children and it seems most likely that will be the case. Some have estimated the crop in the Wilson territory at about 7,000 bales.

School started off in a fine way Monday morning with all the faculty present. Although the school is getting started about two months later than is usually the custom for starting, it is planned to continue in to the summer months until the full nine months school term for 1931-'32 will be finished. There was a splendid enrollment.

Rev. M. J. Saer, pastor of one of our local Lutheran churches, came near what could have easily been a serious accident. He was going to Sparenburg last Sunday to fill his regular appointment when one of his front wheels detached itself from the car and went spinning directly into the radiator of a truck being driven by a Mexican. The impact was so great that the radiator was ruined and the casing and tube on the flying wheel was rendered useless. Fortunately, he was not injured.
