**TRUCK CASE DELAYED**

Decision in the case of L. P. Jeffreys, Lubbock truck owner and contractor, against the Railroad Commission of Texas and its law enforcing officials and peace officers of Lubbock and Lynn counties, will not be handed down for some time, it was indicated by Judge Clark M. Mullican of the 99th district court, before whom the case was argued over two weeks ago.

"I do not know when I will announce my decision for I have not had time to study the case," Judge Mullican stated.

Some additional papers, including a supplemental brief filed by R. P. Maddox of Tahoka; personal counsel of Mr. Jeffreys and the arguments of the state as presented by Elbert Hooper, assistant attorney general in charge of work for the railroad commission, have been filed with the court.

A mass of papers, including copies of the rulings of higher courts are to be read by the court before making his decision. It was indicated it might be a week or two before the decision is handed down.

Lockhart, Garrard and Brown also represent Mr. Jeffreys. They drew the petition which in effect attacks the constitutionality of the law, house bill 335. Defendants named include Vaughn Wilson, county attorney and Wade Hardy, sheriff of Lubbock county; G. H. Nelson, county attorney, and B. L. Parker, sheriff, of Lynn county; J. H. Edwards, bus and truck inspector for the state railroad commission; Jack Reaves, highway patrolman for the state highway department, and all sheriffs deputies and constables in this section.
