# E. S. DAVIS IS **BURIED HERE**

Prominent Citizen : Passed Away Early, Saturday; Had Lived Here Since 1919

All that is mortal of Ed S. Davis was laid to rest in the cemetery here Sunday afternoon, following funeral services at the Methodist Church.

Mr. Davis died at 8:15 o'clock Saturday morning, after a lingering illness of almost three months. He suffered from a complication of diseases and for several weeks little hope for his recovery had been en-

The funeral was one of the most largely attended in recent years here, which attested the esteem in which the good man was held by his neighbors and fellow townsmen.

The funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. H. C. Smith, assisted by Rev. R. T. Butler of Texico, formr pastor of Mr. Davis at Desdemona, Mr. Davis having been chairman of his first board of stewards, and by Rev. Ed Stevenson of the Highland Heights Methodist Ohurch of Sweetwater, another former pastor' of Mr. Davis. Each of these spoke, paying high tribute to the character of the deceased.

Mr. Davis was born on June 24, 1866, and was 65 years, 6 months, and 15 days old at the time of his death. He' was married to Nettie Davis on December 3, 1899. To this union were born seven children, all of whom survive except one who died in infancy.
