Wilson represented Lynn county the past week end in the district basketball tournament. They were not so successful as in the years past. Seagraves was to be played first but did not show up so Wilson drew a forfeit. The first game was played at 7:00 Friday night with Lubbock; Wilson promptly lost the game when Crews was put out of the game early in the second quarter. "We have seen numbers of ball games but we believe that this was the poorest refereed game that we have ever seen." The game was lost by a score of 29 to 22. Water to the amount of 835,200 gallons and 1,615 tons of potatoes were part of the cargo of a vessel which recently sailed from Wales to the Antarctic, where she will serve as provision ship for the whaling fleet.

One spot in the Pacific, forty miles east of the Philippine Islands, is the deepest part of the sea yet sounded. The depth recorded there was about 5,900 fathoms, or seven miles. The deepest spot in the Atlantic is off Porto Rico, where 5528 fathoms were registered.

Bill Bounds and Stanton Thigpen each entered pleas of guilty before the court, waiving a jury, to the offense of stealing four hogs, the property of W. H. Burden of the Midway community. Bounds testified that he was 21 years of age and had lived until recently in Borden county. Thigpen testified that he was 23 and lives near Levelland. He formerly resided in Borden county. These hogs were stolen from Burden one night several weeks ago. The defendants took them to Morton, where they disposed of them. One of them had been butchered and ground up into sausage. The other three were recovered by Sheriff B. L. Parker and brought back to Lynn county. They were identified by Mr. Burden as his property. The defendants were apprehended at Portales, New Mexico. They made written confessions to the county attorney of Hockley county and went on the witness stand here and confessed fully to the crime. The court, Judge McGuire, assessed the punishment of each of these young men at two years in the penitentiary and gave them a lecture which they will probably not forget soon. It was full of biting denunciation of the crime to which they had pleaded guilty and of sound advice to them as to how they should conduct themselves in the penitentiary and after leaving the pen.

Lorenzo Watson, colored, charged with the offense of burglary, introduced evidence to the effect that he was under seventeen years of age, his own testimony and that of his mother being heard by the court on that point. After hearing the evidence, the court transferred his case to the juvenile docket and announced that it would be heard later. Watson is charged with the burglary of the store of J. T. Williams at Wilson a few weeks ago.

A companion case with Watson's was that of Frank Huddon, colored, who was also charged with the burglary of Williams' store. He entered a plea of guilty before the court and was sentenced to the penitentiary for a term of two years. Huddon made a clean confession to the crime. Quite a quantity of merchandise, consisting mostly of clothing
