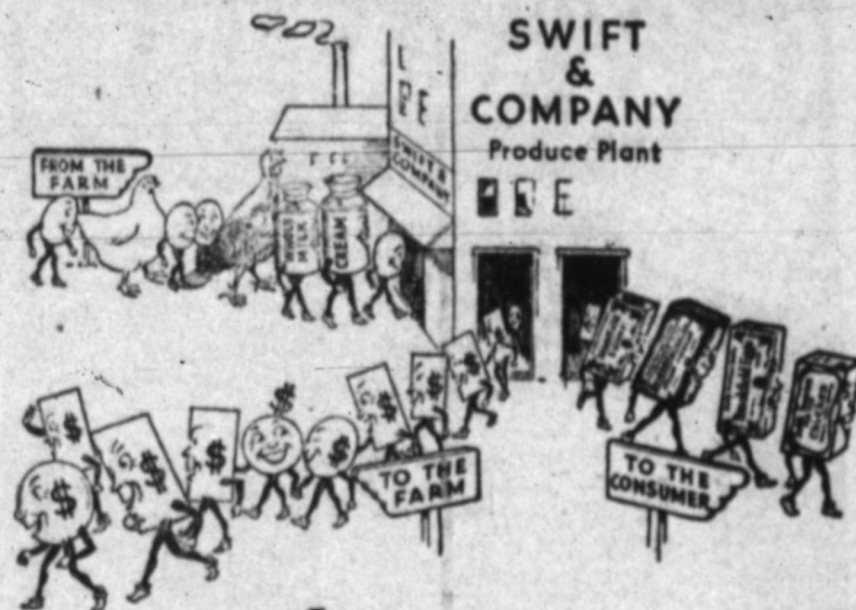

Outlines 4-H Club Program For Year

(By Miss El Fleda Harrison)
 The 4-H club girls' work as outlined for 1933 is placed in the demonstration basis with three types of demonstrations being conducted, bedroom improvement, wardrobe, and gardening.

This program of work is available to the rural girls of the county between 10 and 20 years of age. Each girl is to follow the same program of work regardless of any previous work she may have done.

In each club there will be one girl who is demonstrator in each demonstration conducted, one in bedroom improvement, one in wardrobe work, and one in gardening. "A demonstrator is a person who benefits herself and others by developing a farm or home enterprise to a better living or paying basis." The demonstrators will receive individual help from the agent and there is no limit to the goals she may accomplish in her demonstration. A girl who is demonstrator in one phase of work is a cooperator in the other two phases of work. She must accomplish all the goals set for the cooperators and more in the phase of work in which she is demonstrator. Any cooperator may achieve the same goals in all three phases of work as the demonstrators. The goals set for cooperators are always the minimum.

Bedroom improvement goals for cooperators are:

1. Make one mattress pad.
 2. Make one comfort protector.
 3. Make one pair pillow covers.
 4. Arrange furniture conveniently for room, eliminating non-essentials and undesirable objects.
- Wardrobe goals for cooperators:
1. Improve storage space by having a clothes closet equipped with rod for hanging dresses, shelf for hat, and shelf for shoes.
 2. Make one sport dress.
 3. Make one dresser scarf using decorative stitch.

Goals for cooperators in gardening are:

1. Grow two new vegetables, Cauliflower and Egg Plant—prepare these vegetables in five different ways, each to be served in the family.

2. Can 100 containers of vegetables of five varieties and exhibit one container of each variety at the County Exhibit in September.

3. Make the family supply of jelly. The method demonstrations given by the home demonstration agent are based upon the goals for the cooperators.

There is a state contest in the Bedroom Improvement work and any cooperator may be a contestant, while the demonstrator automatically becomes a contestant when she pledges herself to be a demonstrator. Demonstrators deserving honorary mention for 1932 are Faye Estes, Zelma Thrailkill, Edna Voight, Carolyn Holloway, Rosa Bell Thommarson, and Maurine Saunders.
