> They tell us that if the people will repeal the Eighteenth Amendment the Federal Government will protect the states that desire to remain dry against the importation and sale of intoxicating liquor. But already the Federal government is issuing liquor licenses authorizing the sale of beer in dry states. Is this protection? It is true that these licenses do not auhorize the licensees to sell liquor in violation of state laws but the effect of it is about the same as if they did so. Law breakers are already taking advantage of the fact that Uncle Sam has issued them liquor licenses in defending against prosecution for violations of state laws. But most of us suspected all the time that this promise of protection to the dry states was the flimsiest kind of camouflage. It is the purpose and determination of the liquor interests to make this whole country as wet as the Atlantic Ocean if possible.


