**ABOUT WET-DRY EDITORS**

"A great many of our editor  
friends are now busy writing dry  
editorials, and some of them we  
know write as dry as Sahara and  
drink as wet as the Atlantic when  
they cross the border into Old Mex-  
ico," says Jack Stricklin of the Ter-  
ry County Herald in a recent issue  
of his most excellent paper. "The  
Herald is also aware of the fact that  
there are a great many members of  
the fourth estate that are teetotalers  
at home for the benefit of their pas-  
tors and other members of the town,"  
Mr. Stricklin continues.

Mr. Stricklin may be right. There  
may be a few editors who "write  
dry," for one reason or another, and  
"drink wet," just as there are a few  
other people who sometimes talk dry  
and drink wet.

But our opinion is that the number  
is greatly exaggerated. It is the  
habit of the wets to raise a great  
hullabaloo about dries who do not  
practice what they preach. They  
seem to think that they are making  
a great point against prohibition by  
calling attention continually to the  
inconsistencies of some dries. There  
are a few men who have become ad-  
dicted to the drink habit and occa-  
sionally take a drink who yet realize  
that the saloon is a bad thing for  
the country and therefore they vote  
dry. These men may be subject to  
criticism for drinking but they are  
not to be criticised for voting dry.  
They are to be commended for it,  
for in spite of their personal lapses  
occasionally, they are patriotic  
enough to vote for the good of their  
country as occasion arises.

But the truth of the business is  
that nearly every editor, as well as  
nearly every other citizen, who likes  
to take his "nip" and who patronizes  
some bootlegger every time he gets  
a chance to do so, is in fact a wet,  
politically as well as personally.  
Some of them try to camouflage the  
fact but with little success. They are  
continuously putting out wet propa-  
ganda, either insidiously or openly.  
They claim to be dries but "admit"  
that prohibition has been a failure—  
which is not the truth. They claim  
to favor temperance, but they have  
"become convinced" that the return  
of beer would promote temperance—  
a statement that has absolutely no  
foundation in fact. This class of wets  
may think that they can make sense-  
sible people believe that they really  
favor temperance but they fool no-  
body.

As a matter of fact, there are few  
real dries who drink. Nearly all the  
editors and other citizens of our ac-  
quaintance who have really been  
fighting for prohibition are dry per-  
sonally as well as politically. We  
don't know many of the type that  
Mr. Stricklin describes. Like him we  
have a contempt for them but we  
think they constitute an insignificant  
minority of the newspaper fraternity.

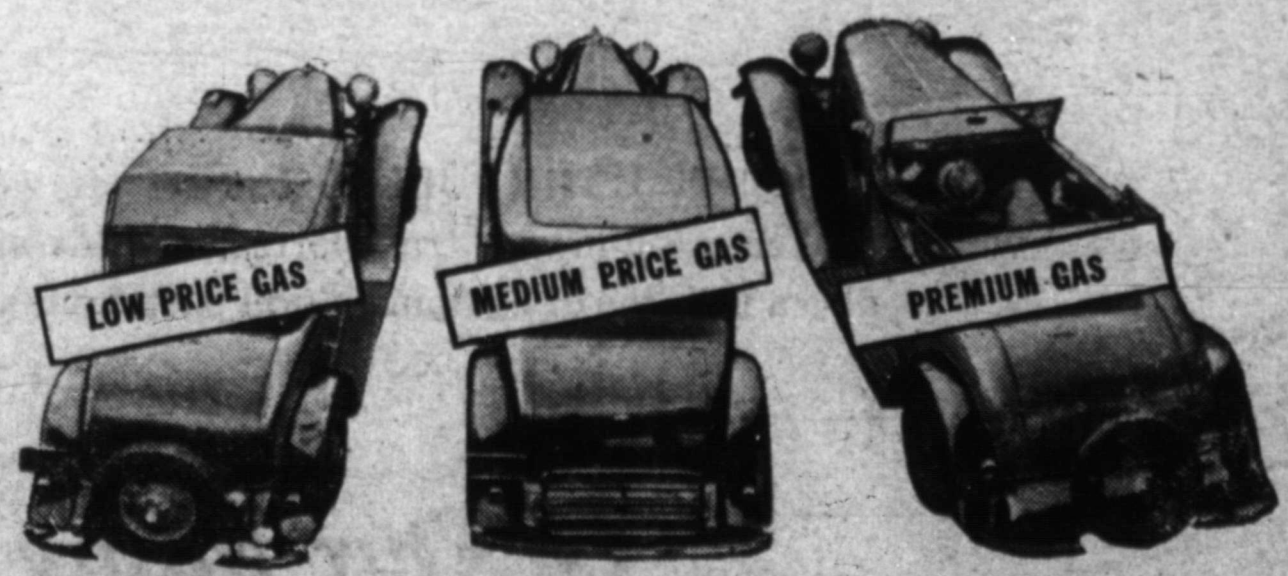

## Government Now Uses Cotton Twine

Washington, June 7—The policy that the post office department has followed for many years in buying jute twine for use in all the post offices throughout the nation has been abandoned and henceforth cotton will be used, Silliman Evans, fourth assistant postmaster general, has informed Senator Tom Connolly.

For many years Senator Connolly has been advocating the use of cotton twine. Previous administrations have failed to heed his request, but this year, as soon as the Roosevelt administration took office, he called the matter to the attention of Mr. Evans and cited to him the act passed at the last session of Congress requiring the government to purchase American made goods. Mr. Evans, whose home is in Fort Worth, promptly advised the senator that cotton would be used by the depart-

ment from now on.

Two orders, totaling 47,000 pounds of cotton twine, have been placed by the department. These meet all present requirements, Mr. Evans said, and in the near future the department will be in the market for much greater quantities of the twine.

Leading cotton men and state officials in Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi and other states have expressed their appreciation to Senator Connolly for the fight he has made to increase the use of cotton.
