SLATON IS PLANNING JULY 4TH CELEBRATION

Slaton, June 22—Arrangements are being made for Slaton's Fourth of July celebration, which is sponsored by the American Legion, assisted by the chamber of commerce, retail merchants' association, Rotary club members, and others.

The day will open with a street parade, starting on Texas avenue and marching around the business portion of the city square and then to the community house. The Legion, boy scouts and chamber of commerce band will head the parade.

At the community house there will be some speaking, music, a ball game between teams of juniors, a girl's bicycle race, a terapin race and other amusements. A basket lunch on the club-house lawn is planned.

In the afternoon there will be a baseball game between Slaton and Tahoka, a square dance, old fiddlers' contest and other contests.

At night a dance is promised by the American Legion.

Invitations have been sent out to surrounding communities and nearby towns. Prizes for first and second places will be awarded in each contest.

RED CROSS VOLUNTEERS PRINT BOOKS FOR BLIND

One of the most appealing services that is carried forward by women volunteers under the American Red Cross is that of transcribing popular and scientific books into Braille for reading by the blind. This work was started at Evergreen hospital, where blind veterans of the World War were sent after the Armistice.

The Red Cross now has 155 volunteer Braille transcribers, and last year they produced 442 titles in 1,549 volumes, or 175,000 pages of Braille. The majority of the books go to the Library of Congress and public libraries throughout the country, although some of the books go to schools for the blind and, in a few instances, text books are transcribed for some individual scholar in order to help him complete his course in some study.

The work is supported from the Red Cross Roll Call for members which occurs each year from Armistice Day to Thanksgiving Day.

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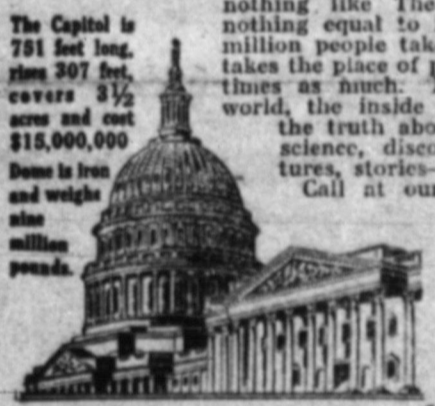
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
