To the Hon. Judge of Said Court: We, your grand jury, for the February term of District Court, Lynn county, report to you that we have carefully inquired into all matters of law violations brought to our attention and have returned into court 28 felony bills of indictment.

The illicit distillers, he said, having no tax to pay, are putting out a grade of alcohol comparable with the best grade of legitimate alcohol at \$8 for a five gallon can. The tax alone on five gallons of legiti-

mate alcohol, he pointed out, is \$19. Furthermore, he said the alley distillers have improved their product to compete in quality with licensed distillers, even going to the extent of putting their liquor in charred

kegs and aging it. The result, he said, is that the bootleggers are purveying a better grade of cheaply priced Lquor, some of it at 75c a quart, than the lowpriced liquor in the State stores.


