### LYNN COTTON **RECORD IS SET**

Total Of 66,478 Bales 1933 Cotton Ginned; Lynn County Is Eleventh In State

With a production of 66,476 bales, Lynn county last year broke all previous records in the production of cotton. In 1932 she produced 59,518 bales prior to the March report as issued by the Bureau of the Census at Washnigton.

According to the report recently issued from Washington Lynn county ginned 66,476 bales during the past season and stood eleventh in the entire state. She stands third in all West Texas, only Jones and Lubbock counties surpassing her.

Ellis county leads again this year with Hill second and Jones third in the state. Lubbock stands sixth. There are 23 counties that ginned more than 50,000 bales. Eight of these 23 counties are in West Texas, 4 of the 8 being on the South Plains. We give the figures for 1933 and 1932, as follows:

# 1656 Sign Cotton

Sixteen hundred and sixty-six farmers of Lynn county signed cotton acreage reduction contracts to reduce the cotton acres planted in 1934 by 72,-784 acres, according to V. F. Jones, county agent, who has just completed final tabulation of the contracts.

The tabulation summary has been sent to the District Review Board at Lubbock for analysis, and no further work can be done on the contracts until a hearing is received from the review board.

### Road Beautifying **Committee Meets**

"Though no funds are available, much can be done toward beautifying Lynn county highways through the co-opreation of all the people with the various chairmen," Mrs. G. H. Nelson, county chairman of highway beautification, said to a committee meeting in the county court room Monday afternoon.

Mrs. Nelson suggested that each church in Tahoka appoint one member to form a committee with Miss Sylvia Robb as advisor, with a view to beautifying all church grounds in the city, as the grounds about the court house, city hall, and public schools are to be beauti-

"Where signs cannot be removed from the highways, a planting of vines or evergreens may serve to make the sign more attractive," said Mrs. Nelson, and added that native material such as yucca and cactus should be used where possible. Mrs. Nelson also explained the duties of the various chairmen.
