**Many Candidates File For Places
On Ticket For Texas State Offices**

Later we expect to publish the entire ballot in this paper, but we are giving below a list of the candidates in most of the State races. There are eight candidates for governor, as follows: James V. Allred, attorney-general for the past three years. His former home was Wichita Falls, where he served as district attorney. Maury Hughes of Dallas, elected two years ago as chairman of the state executive committee and served until he announced as a candidate for governor a few weeks ago. He also served as district attorney of Dallas county. C. C. McDonald of Wichita Falls, long prominent in Texas politics and an ardent supporter of the Fergusons. He has the Ferguson support in this campaign. Clint C. Small of Amarillo is another. Small was a candidate four years ago and made a remarkable showing. He has served several years in the state senate and prior to that time was county judge of Collingsworth county. Tom Hunter of Wichita Falls was in the race for governor two years ago and received a surprisingly large vote. He is a lawyer and is in the independent oil business. Edgar E. Witt, now Lieutenant-Governor, and has been serving in the state senate since 1918. He has practiced law in Waco for thirty years, and is a native of Bell county. Edward K. Russell of Annona in Red River county, a business man who has never before run for office. There are three candidates for the United States Senate: The Hon. Tom Connolly of Falls county, who is now closing his first term of six years as senator. Mr. Connolly defeated Earl B. Mayfield for this exalted position in a spirited contest six years ago. Joseph W. Bailey Jr., son of the late senator Joseph Weldon Bailey, of Dallas county. Young Bailey is now serving as Congressman-at-large from Texas. Guy B. Fisher of San Augustine county is the third candidate. He is unknown in Texas politics. There are eight candidates for Congress in the 19th district. Two of these are residents of Lubbock: Judge Clark M. Mullican and Judge Homer Pharr. Judge Mullican was formerly district judge of

the old 72nd district when it included Lynn and all other counties now embraced in the 108th district. Since the division of this district, he has been serving as district judge of the 99th judicial district in Lubbock. Judge Homer L. Pharr is judge of the 72nd district which includes Lubbock, Crosby, Hockley, and Cochran counties, and has been serving in this capacity several years. George Mahon of Colorado is district attorney of the 32nd judicial district, serving his fourth term in that capacity. Taylor White of Tahoka was for five years a teacher of vocational agriculture here. Fred C. Halle of Spur was candidate for state representative two years ago. He is engaged in the real estate and insurance business. Joe Thompson, the mystery candidate, a lawyer formerly of Tulsa, recently removed to Plainview. J. S. Johnson of Dawson county is a farmer. There are two candidates for state representative for this district: John N. Thomas of Tahoka, the present incumbent, and J. Doyle Settle of Abernathy, former postmaster at Texas Technological College. For lieutenant-governor there are six candidates: Walter F. Woodul of Houston, Ben F. Berkeley of Alpine, John Hornsby of Austin, R. M. Johnson of Palestine, Joe Moore of Greenville, and J. P. Rogers of Houston. Woodul, Hornsby and Moore are now serving in the state senate. There are three candidates for attorney-general: Walter Woodward of Coleman, William McCraw of Dallas, and Clyde E. Smith of Tyler county. Woodward is state senator and has long been prominent in Texas politics. McCraw served for three terms as district attorney of Dallas county and made a remarkable record as a prosecutor. Clyde E. Smith has been a successful district attorney over in an East Texas district. For state comptroller of public accounts there are four candidates: George H. Sheppard of Sweetwater, the present incumbent, J. J. Patterson of Dallas county, Dolph D. Pillison of Henderson county, and Manly H. Clary of Fort Worth.

For state treasurer there are likewise four candidates. Charley Lockhart, the present incumbent, is a brother of Judge G. E. Lockhart and for many years was county treasurer of Scurry county. His opponents are Dennis B. Waller of Trinity county, Kay Griffin of Fort Worth, and Geo. B. Terrell of Dallas. Terrell's real name is Butler. He recently procured a change in his name for the evident purpose of winning votes, believing the name Terrell would attract many voters. For commissioner of agriculture there are four candidates. J. E. McDonald, formerly of Ellis county, is now holding this position. Fred Davis of Austin, former commissioner of agriculture, is one of his opponents. Others are K. E. Terrell of Floyd county, and C. C. Connelly of Willacy county. There are two candidates for commissioner of the General Land Office. J. H. Walker of Travis county is the present commissioner and is running for reelection. Walter E. Jones of Gregg is his opponent. Lon A. Smith of Travis county has long been a member of the state railroad commission and is a candidate for re-election. Former state treasurer W. Gregory Hatcher of Dallas county is one of his opponents. James L. McNees of Dallas and John Pundt of Dallas, and H. O. Johnson of Houston are other candidates. A list of the county and precinct candidates may be seen each week in our regular announcement column. Mr. and Mrs. Henry L. **MAY SALES OF CHEVROLET
SHOW LARGE INCREASE**

A total of 83,839 units was delivered by Chevrolet dealers during May, according to figures released today by William E. Holler, general sales manager of the Chevrolet Motor Company. This total includes Canadian, export and domestic deliveries and represents a substantial increase over the same period of 1933 when 69,125 units were delivered. "Deliveries of commercial cars and trucks were especially significant," said Mr. Holler. "The commercial car and truck total for May of 15,134 units over-shadows the excellent figure reached in May, 1933, when 10,879 units were delivered. Sales of both passenger cars and trucks improved greatly during the last ten-day period of May and accounted for the impressive retail sales total for the month. Retail sales the first five months of this year now total 364,872 as compared with 253,263 for the same period a year ago, an increase of over 110,000 units. Do-

estic truck deliveries for the five months nearly doubled last year's figure, 68,207 units delivered against 34,372 units in 1933.

ORDER DECLARING RESULT OF ELECTION

The State Of Texas, County of Lynn.

On this the 6th day of June A. D. 1934 the Commissioners' Court of said County being called and convened in special session for the purpose of canvassing the votes and certifying the results of an election, heretofore held on the 2nd day of June A. D. 1934, to determine whether or not the sale of beer containing not more than three and two-tenths per centum (3.2%) of alcohol by weight should be permitted in the City of O'Donnell, a political subdivision of Lynn county, Texas, hereinafter called "Election District"; and a quorum being present this court proceeded to canvass the votes and certify the results of said election; and it appearing to the court that said election was in all things held in conformity with law, and in accordance with an order, heretofore and on the 14th day of May A. D. 1934, made by this court ordering said election; and it further appearing and being satisfactorily shown to the court that copies of said order were posted by the County Clerk of said county in the manner and form and for the length of time required by law, this court does hereby make and enter its order declaring the result of said election and finds upon canvassing the votes thereof, the voters at said election voted and cast their votes as follows, to-wit: 116 to permit and "For the sale of beer containing not more than three and two-tenths per centum (3.2%) of alcohol by weight."

129 to prohibit and "Against the sale of beer containing not more than three and two-tenths per centum (3.2%) of alcohol by weight." and as a consequence the court declares that said election has resulted in the sale of beer containing not more than three and two-tenths per centum (3.2%) alcohol by weight, upon this order's becoming effective as provided for by law, shall be prohibited in said election district.

It is therefore declared, ordered, and decreed by this court that said election has carried and a majority of the voters, who cast their ballots and voted therein voted "against the sale of beer containing not more than three and two-tenths per centum (3.2%) of alcohol by weight," and upon this order's becoming effective as provided for by law, the sale of beer containing not more than three and two-tenths per centum (3.2%) of alcohol by weight shall be prohibited in said election district and if it is further ordered that this decree be entered of record as the law requires and a copy of this order be published in The Lynn County News, a newspaper of general circulation, for four consecutive weeks as required by law.



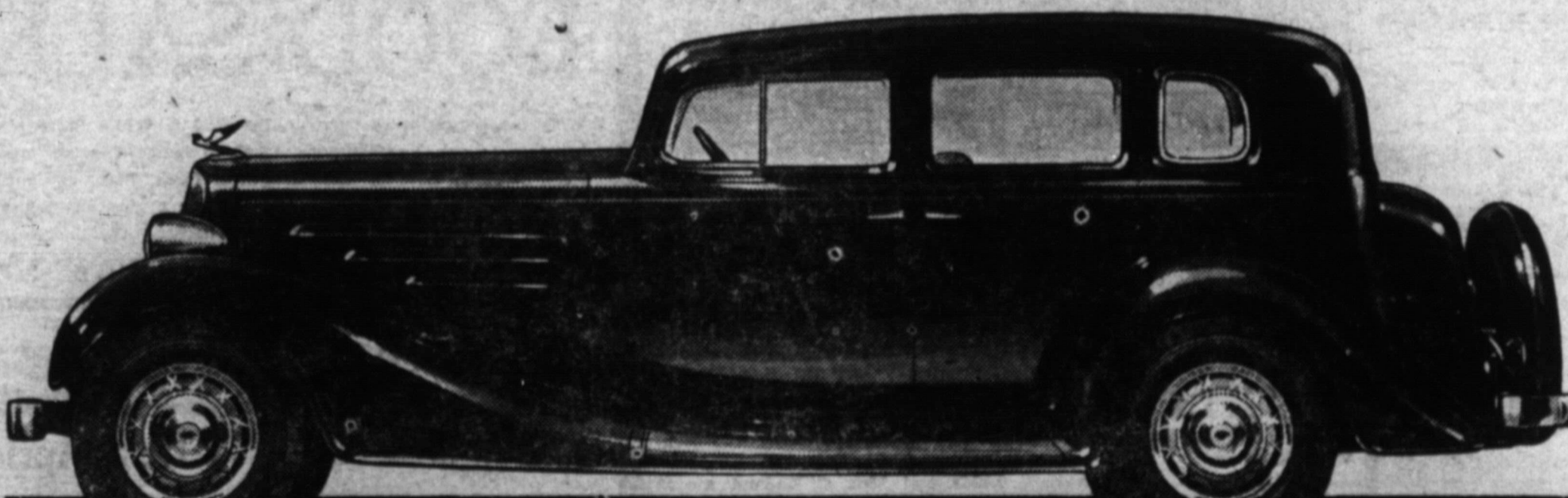

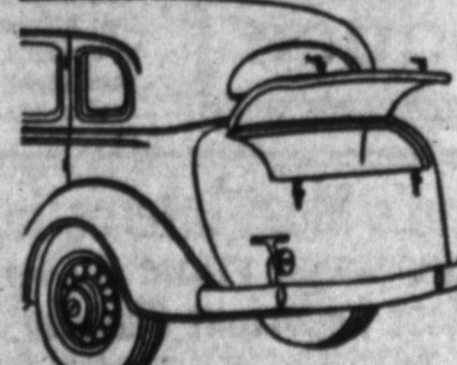
