STATE COTTON **REPORT LOWER**

Government Figures Show Crop Will Be Very Small In West Texas

Less than 75 per cent as much cotton was ginned in Texas prior to October 1 this year as last year, according to statistics furnished us this week by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. The figures for this the Census. The figures for this Farmers Favor 2,344,552 bales. Furthermore, most of the cotton in the heavy producing counties had been gathered prior to October 1, and the Texas crop will probably not be much more than half as large as the crop last

In West Texas the crop will fall far below a half crop, and in northwest Texas and the South Plains ction scarcely a fourth of a normal crop will be gathered. Only a small portion of the crop in this ection had been gathered prior to October 1, however.

"A stubborn fact, which must be faced sooner or later and the facing of which cannot be postponed much longer, is that neither the State nor the Federal Governments, nor both of them together, can go on indefinitely maintaining from 15 to 20 percent of the population in idleness," says the Texas Weekly. All of which must have become obvious to every thoughtful citizen. But, if direct relief is to be discontinued, employment must be furnished to the indigent unemployed. it is pointed out. There must be a gradual dropping of names from the relief rolls, and if these cannot find employment in private enterprises the State and Federal Governments may be compelled to broaden the scope of their activities in order to furnish employment. Enlarged water conservation projects, water drainage projects, irrigation projects, reforestation, highway building, and similar enterprises may absorb much of the idle man-power in this country. nobody knows what the solution will be, for it is perfectly obvious that State and Federal Governments can not continue indefinitely to maintain so many of our population without receiving anything in return.

They used to tell us that if we would repeal the Eighteenth Amendment all of our crime problems would be solved. They claimed that the crime of bootlegging was the daddy of almost all other crime, and that when prohibition was junked bootlegging would cease. Well, they repealed the Eighteenth Amendment and what have we? We have such a Saturnalia of crime as the country has never seen -not in this dry country to be sure but in all the wet centers. Murder, bank-robbing, kidnaping, and other heinous crimes are filling the front pages of our daily papers. On the front page of the staid and conservative old Dallas News last Sunday nearly half the news stories were crime stories. Moreover, car accidents on the highways throughout the country have increased at an alarming rate. Repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment has given liquor a little more rope and it is writing its record in an orgy of crime and blood and death.

As long as the Republicans were in power Democratic leaders never ceased to denounce the Smoot-Hawley tariff law. But since the Democrats have come into office we have hardly heard a chirp out of them about the tariff. We think the high tariff rates are crippling foreign trade and retarding the return of prosperity. We wonder why the Democrats are not doing something about it. If the Smoot-Hawley tariff is the monstrosity they said it was and which we believe it to be, why don't they repeal it and pass a new tariff measure? One thing that we need is foreign markets-especially we of the South who raise more than half of the world cotton supply.
