Fifty million acres of new land went into production equipped with the latest machinery. When Europe could no longer borrow from us to buy our goods, all manufacturing industries curtailed production. Why not the farmer? Let us get back on a sup-

ply and demand basis. A member of the largest firm in Tahoka told me that the 1933 crops paid old accounts and that they were in favor of control. As for me give me control and independence rather than root hog or die, no control and dependence.




