### Jones Proposes Stronger Farm **Credit Program**

Washington, Nov. 12 .- Creation of a permanent farm credit system as powerful as the Federal Reserve and stripped of private profit will be proposed to the Congress by Chairman Marvin Jones (Dem.), Texas, of the House Agriculture Committee program.

The Texan disclosed the plan in its general outlines Thursday, but said details remained to be worked

Essentially, the set-up would be broad enough to afford permanent credit facilities to agriculture in all its operations-credit to be given at cost, plus a fractional charge to build up a reserve and protect against losses.

The system would be operated through the existing Farm Credit Administration. It would be empowered to issue currency-farm credit notes similar to Federal Reserve notes-and thus save interest charges resulting in financing through bond.

It would make use of existing facilities of intermediate credit banks, the Production Credit Corporation and land banks.

The capital to start the farm reserve system, Jones said, would come either by earmarking gold now in the Treasury or by direct approprition of Congress. He declined to estimate how much would be needed. The rate of interest to the farmer has not been determined, but it probably will not be more than 3 1-2 per cent.

Powerful backing for the plan already has been obtained. Actual drafting of the bill will not begin

# **RED CROSS AGENCIES** SAFEGUARD HEALTH

First Aid Life Saving, Nursing Care, Promote Health and Safety

Five outstanding services make up the health-conservation program of the American Red Cross, according to the annual report just issued in Washington. These services are first aid and life saving, which together have trained more than a million persons; nursing, with an active enrollment of 36,133 registered nurses; Public Health Nursing, conducted by 750 nurses in 424 chapters last year; and Home Hygiene, which has taught more than 700,000 men and women simple ways of caring for the sick at home.

"The achievements of the Red Cross in public health nursing place it among the leaders in this field," said James L. Fieser, vice chairman in charge of domestic operations. "This service was organized in 1919 to meet needs developed by the World War and the ravages of the flu epidemic which in 1918-1919 took so great a toll of life.

"Since that time Red Cross nursing services have been ploneers in more than one half of the countles in the United State. Many services we established were taken over later by civic. state and federal agencies, and the Red Cross continues to establish servtes in other new fields. Red Cross nurses made more than a million visits to patients last year, and 629,025 children in schools were inspected.

"Red Cross courses in home hygiene and care of the sick are especially imortant in times of depression, because they teach families to maintain hydenie conditions in their own homes the enterior e troms of illness

early enough to prevent serious consequences. "Our courses in first aid have been

instrumental in saving lives of the injured; in safeguarding the accident victim until the physician arrives, and in reducing time lost by workers in factories, mines and other industries. We are also giving the course extensively to police and fire departments throughout the country, and to state highway patrols."

Everyone is invited to join the Red Cross during the annual membership roll call which continues from Armistice Day to Thanksgiving, to have a part in the health program and the other humanitarian services of the Red
