# **Report Says That** Bindweed Can Be Controlled

College Station, June 28-Bindweed can be controlled on large acreages of cropland through competitive cropping, intensive cultivation and the use of 2, 4.D. These practices are recommed

ed as a result of experiments conducted in the Texas Pan-haldle since 1949 by A. F. Weise, agronomist for the Amarillo Experiment Station, and H. E. Rea, agronomist for the Main Stat'/n at College Station.

Wheat was the best competitive crop used. Sorghum was not easily established during the summer when the weeds were growing vigorously.

A fallow-wheat system, using intensive cultivation during the ow periods, eliminated 92 percent of the weeds in three

The 2, 4-D was applied in the fall before the wheat was planted or in the spring when the wheat was fully tillered.

Patches of bindweed up to half an acre in size were eradicated with applications of soil steril ants, such as sodium chlorate, Concentrated Borascu, Atlacide, Polybor chlorate and Karmex W at rates of 5, 16, 7, 12 and threeeighths pounds, respectively, per square rod. One application of a soil sterilant seldom completely eliminated bindweed; retreatments usually were necessary for complete eradication.

"Jerked" beef, not to be confused with dried or corned beef, is a cured meat which is still very

much in evidence around cow camps, even in this era of refriger-

ation. During round-up time, cow hands feast on the forequarter cuts the first few days after killing an animal, after which they rely on "jerked" beef for their meat supply.

To preserve freshly killed beef by the "jerking" technique, it is boned and stripped in one-half inch lengths, seasoned and stretched over wire or rope to dry in the sun. The sun-cooked beef, called "jerky," keeps indefinitely.
