VOWELL GETS LOOSE, CAUGHT

Man Sentenced From Here Stages Very Little Crime Here, Grand Jury Daring Break From State Penitentiary Farm

Six desperate prisoners escaped from the Harlem state farm near but five of them were recaptured near Hempstead Tuesday night.

One of the five was S. D. Vowell, who was sent to the penitentiary from Lynn county in the autumn of 1933 for the kidnapping and robbery of J. F. Covey, Santa Fe station year. His companion in this crime, S. D. Dick, was likewise sentenced to the penitentiary at the same term of the district court here, vicinity. each receiving a sentence of 50

The two men hailed Covey near Wilson as he was on his way from his Lubbock home to the station at Wilson, took him prisoner, abandoned their own car, and brought stolen at Slaton in Lubbock county Covey in his own car through Tahoka and proceeded down highway No. 9 to a point in Martin county near Ackerly, where they bound and released him and escaped with his car and a small sum of money.

On April 29 Dick was captured at Hugo, Oklahoma, and a few days later Vowell was arrested in Abilene. They were brought to Tahoka and placed in jail, and on June 9 they and a number of other prisoners escaped. Among them were two other desperate criminals, Dave and Luke Trammell. The Trammells were later recaptured. A brother, Stark Campbell was killed by officers. Dick and Vowell were each recaptured at Kilgore within a few weeks after their escape from the to Lubbock and kept in jail there until their trial here the following October. They were taken from Tahoka to the penitentiary immediately. Vowell was already under sentence for two armed robberies in Nolan county and several burglaries

in Taylor county. Other prisoners who escaped from the Harlem farm Monday were Walker Sarrett, Hopkins county, 50 years for murder; Eddie Vanden of Houston, 99 years for robbery; Leroy Eggleston of Nueces, 13 years for robbery; Raymond Henderson of Bowie, seven years for car theft; and Nonie Dobbs from Kaufman, six years for arson. 


