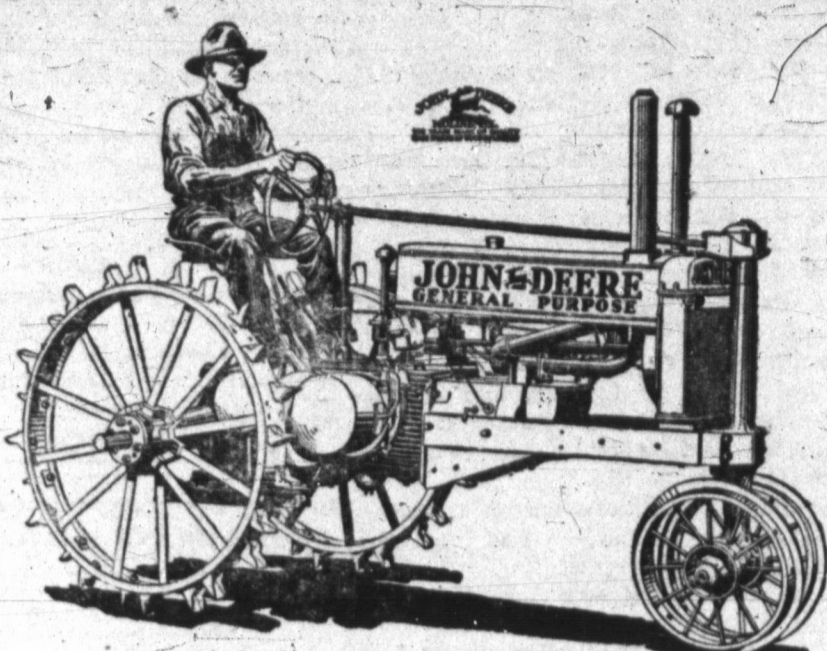

This judicial district then covered a large portion of West Texas, Mr. McDaniel said. Judge Morgan of Seymour was the judge and held the first district court here, to which Judge Bean had alluded. Joe A. P. Dickson of Seymour was the district attorney.

That was almost 32 years ago; but Judge Bean and Mr. McDaniel remembered it as if it had been but yesterday. Not much town here then. This was the real frontier and strictly a cow country.
