County Field Gets Producer

Alan R. Morgan, Cisco, has finalized a producer in the regular field four miles north of Putnam.

No. 50 Loule Williams is spotted 680 feet from north and 2,022 feet from east lines of Section 1, Block E, T&P Survey.

Daily potential was 15.39 barrels of 37 gravity oil plus 50 per cent water, pumping through an open hole.

A 4 1/2-inch casing was set at 265 feet, with total depth of 269 feet. The pay was topped at 240 feet.

Laco Oil Co., Abilene, has filed application to drill No. 6 Mrs. Max L. Logan Estate in Callahan County Regular Field.

Located 15 miles southeast of Abilene, the test spots 1,860 feet from south and 700 feet from west lines of Section 28, BBB&C Survey.

It is 600 feet from south and 700 feet from west lines of a 100-acre lease.

Operator will test the Moutray Sand, drilling to 1,600 feet with rotary.

Laco Oil Co., Abilene, has completed No. 5 Mrs. Max Logan Estate in the regular field 15 miles southeast of Abilene.

The producer is spotted 2,980 feet from north and 700 feet from west lines of Section 28, BBB&C Survey.

Daily potential was 22.68 barrels of 40.5 gravity oil, plus 10 per cent water, pumping from four perforations per foot at 1,464-69 feet.

Dixon Drilling Co., Abilene, has scheduled re-entry of a wildcat in Callahan County.

Located five miles east of Abilene, No. 1-B Oscar Rose spots 2,247 feet from south and 2,310 feet from west lines of Section 7, Block 8, SPRR Survey. It is on a 160-acre lease.

Operator will test the Gardner, drilling to 3,900 feet with rotary. The test was originally drilled by West Central Drilling Co. and plugged and abandoned in August, 1957, at total depth of 3,252 feet.

S. L. McElroy and Mrs. Lee Ivey were recognized in an awards ceremony at the meeting of the Baird Lions Club.

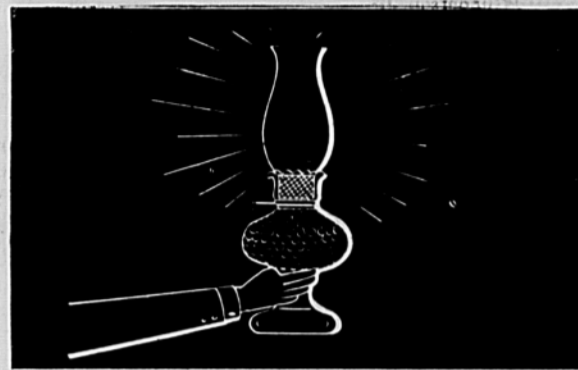
Howard E. Farmer a member of the board of directors of Texas United Fund, represented Frank H. Heller, president of

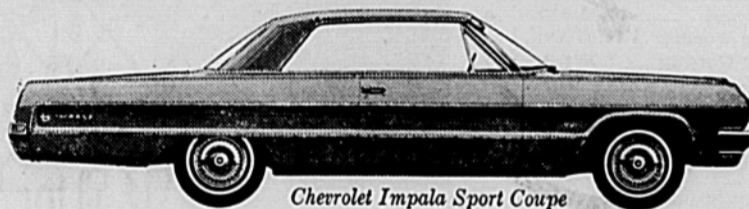

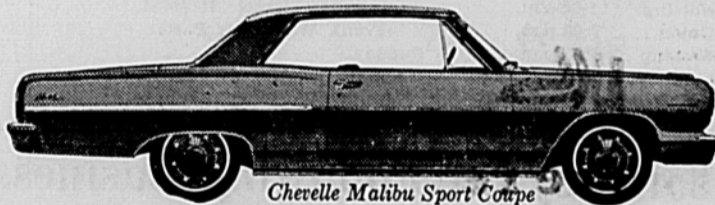

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an Amendment to Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-2; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such medical payments; providing that the amount paid out of state funds shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing that certain amounts relating to the correction or remedying of abnormalities of vision shall be included within such medical service or assistance; providing for the necessary action, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-2, which shall read as follows:

Subsection 51a-2. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws to make payment for, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and are unable to pay for

needed medical services. The payments for such medical assistance on behalf of such needy individuals shall be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature; provided, however, that the amount paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States, such financial aid in the form of medical assistance on behalf of the needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services, as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and pro-

viding that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and providing that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.
