Measurements in still other wells in the sand hills south and southwest of Muleshoe show that the water table has declined about one foot since 1953. Study of these measurements leads to the conclusion that during the past 20 years pumping of large quantities of water for irrigation in the



Plans that have been prepared by the City of Lubbock show that along the New Mexico State line and along the northernmost boundary of city property in the sand hills wells are to be spaced about one mile apart and at least half a mile back from the property line. At no place on city property is a well to be drilled closer to the property line than a quarter of a mile. The plans further show that when the sand hills project is fully developed by 1990, the annual withdrawals should be less than the present annual withdrawals for irriga-

tion in the Muleshoe Valley.

Salt grass grows profusely on several thousand acres along Blackwater Draw from the New Mexico Line eastward to Lamb County. Salt grass is a phreatophyte, a plant that uses ground water as well as soil moisture. An acre of salt grass will use several acre-feet of ground water each year and may use all or nearly all the annual recharge that moves from the sand hills toward the Muleshoe Valley. 



Since it takes from 65 to 85 days for cotton to mature from square to open boll it is necessary that the maturity not be delayed by late watering Over a period of years, King said. we believe you will make more cotton a lower cost of production with better grade if you stop
