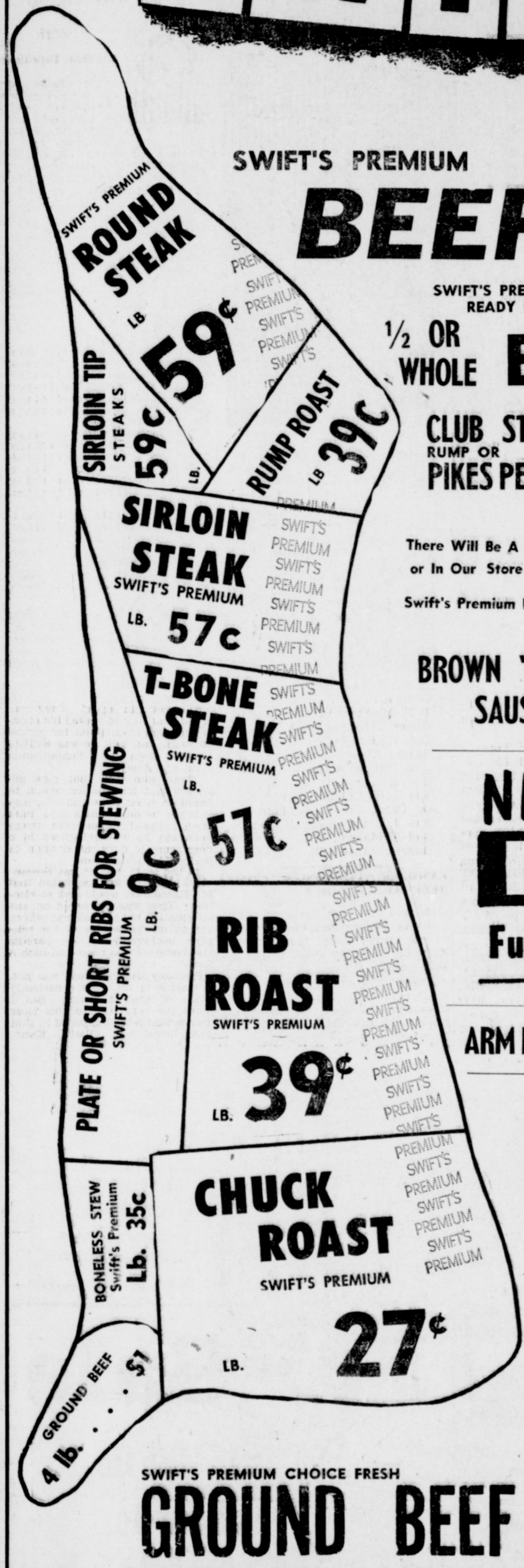

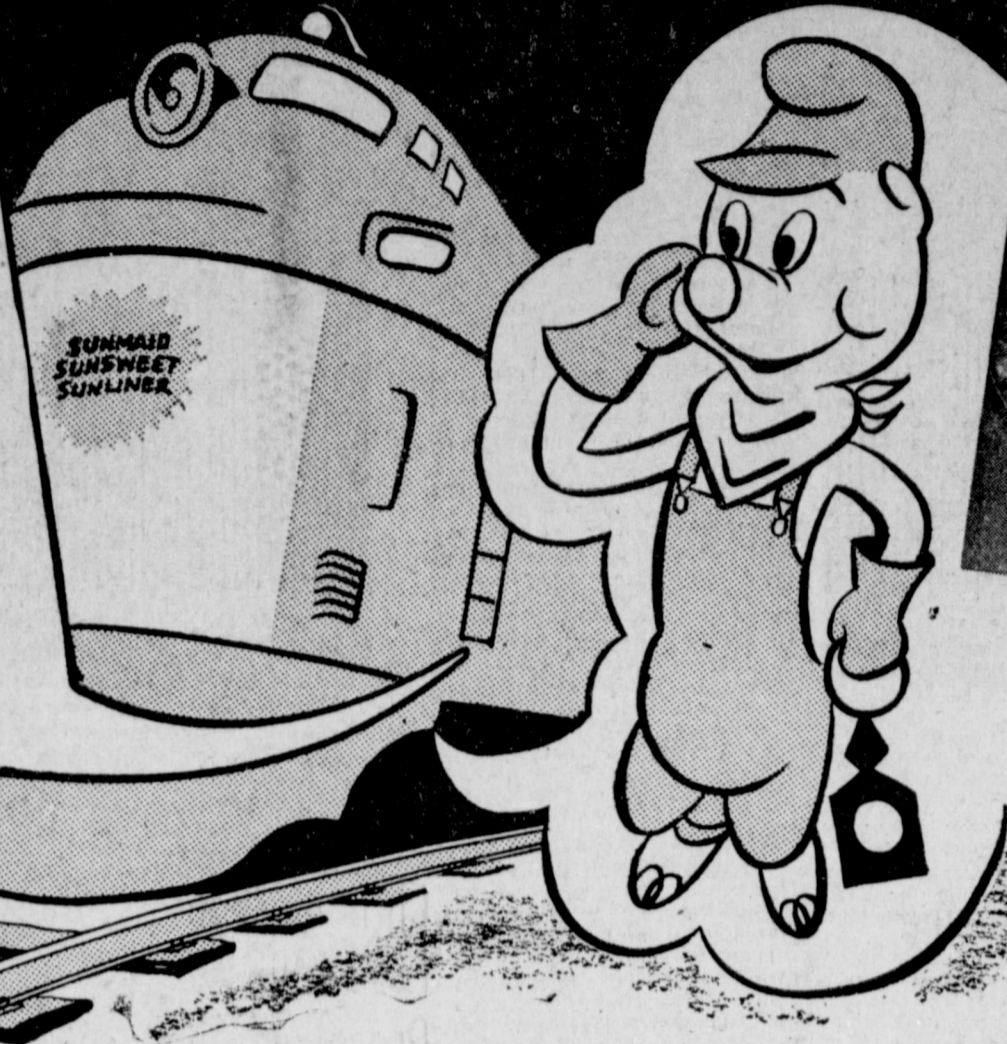

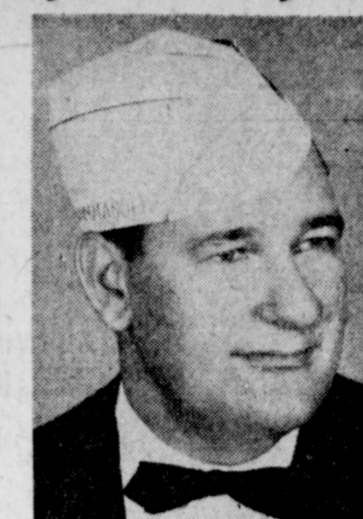
American Legion To Hold Spring Meet In Snyder Saturday

Rotarians Hear About Vegetable Growing Project

Ronald Davis, Muleshoe farmer and president of the West Texas Vegetable Council, told members of the Botany Club what has been done by the organization since its first meeting Jan. 14 when he addressed the club at its noon luncheon Tuesday.

Mr. Davis told Rotarians that two A. & M. College agricultural economists are now at work on the Plains to develop a marketing survey. In addition, an Extension horticulturist has been permanently assigned to the area.

Data on the marketing survey is expected to be ready to make public in July.

It is not the intention of the Council to entice farmers into large vegetable plantings before the marketing situation is thoroughly examined. After the survey is made, Mr. Davis said, farmers will be in better position to know when to bring their crops off and what vegetables to concentrate upon.

He urged business men to take an interest in the work of the Council, saying the prosperity of the farm population is the business man's direct concern.

Mr. Davis was introduced by Rotarian Jim Fowler, program chairman.

Lazbuddie Methodist Church Will Show Life of John Wesley On March 28 at 7:30

The motion picture "John Wesley" is coming to Lazbuddie, and will be shown at the Lazbuddie Methodist Church on March 28 at 7:30 p. m., according to the pastor, Rev. Bruce Matthews. The occasion will be a Family Night supper with each family bringing their own meal. The film is a result of the W.S.C.S.'s study of "Five Spiritual Classics," which has been under the leadership of Mrs. H. L. Ivy.

The feature-length film is in Eastman color and was produced by the Radio and Film Corporation of the Methodist Church in cooperation with J. Arthur Rank.

It brings to the screen for the first time the dynamic and colorful 18th century evangelist and educator.

John Wesley's miraculous rescue from a burning house at the age of five, at the beginning of the film, forecasts the dramatic and eventful life which unfolds in this story of a man of slight stature but of impelling influence upon his contemporaries and upon history.

The English clergyman thought his venture in America as a missionary to the Indians in the Georgia colony was a failure, but it was the king of failure which opened the door to the discovery of a religious certainty he had been seeking.

Furthermore, this discovery in which John Wesley felt his heart "strangely warmed," led him to face mobs unafraid, and to ride 250,000 miles on horseback, changing the masses of English people from a low state of moral degradation to sturdy and happy downright.

His "enthusiasm" was frowned upon by the lethargic leaders of the Church of England of that day, but it was this new-found enthusiasm which enabled him to influence so many phases of the life of English-speaking peoples.

His appeal to the common man, his establishment of schools, clinics, lay preaching and societies—finally his sending of supervisors for the movement in the new world after the American Revolution — all make the film one which will be long remembered.

The Rev. Mr. Matthews explained that while the film is being released only to Methodist churches during the initial period, the public is invited to see the picture at the Lazbuddie Methodist Church.
