Completed Cotton Crop

Approximately 75 per cent of the Bailey county cotton crop has been harvested at press date, it was estimated by agricultural observers here this week. About 42,000 bales of cotton have been ginned or are on gin yards awaiting ginning at this time, the observers reported Wednesday. The 18 gins in Bailey county are ginning more than 7,000 bales per week, and are speeding up this figure somewhat, as more and more trailers jam the gin yards.





The portion of Floyd County within the boundary of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District covers about 600,000 acres of land. (The total area of the county is 635,520 acres.) The underground reservoir in the Ogallala formation beneath the area within the district contained approximately 12,500,000 acre-feet of ground water in storage available for pumping in January, 1955. The above map was prepared from data compiled from a study of 831 logs of water wells and about 700 measurements of water levels in wells.

The map shows the thickness of the water-bearing strata be-tween the water table and the redbeds in 1938 before an appreciable amount of water had been pumped from the reservoir.


The volume of water remaining in the underground reservoir was determined by subtracting the volume of material unwatered since 1938 from the total volume of saturated material in 1938 and multiplying the re-mainder by the coefficient of storage of 15 percent.

These data show that 14,400,-000 acre-feet of water was in storage available for pumping in 1938, and that 1.900,000 acrefeet of water has been removed from storage since 1938. In other words, 13 percent of the volume of the available water has been removed from storage since 1938. In the portion of the county within the Water District, about 75% of the water removed from storage was removed from about 36% of the area.

The work of Melton Frosch, 16, of Mabank, in conserving soil and water, has brought him state honors in the 4-H Soil and Water Conservation program. His award is an allegancy trin to the Nais an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress, pro-vided by the Firestone Tire & Rubber Company.

Melton is a six-year member of the Kaufman County-Wide 4-H

For a four-year demonstration he selected 25 acres of poor grass-land, covered with trees, a creek, brush, undergrowth, etc. The first year he removed brush and un-dergrowth, leveled the land. used good fertilizer and mowed three times to keep down weeds. The second year he seeded Hairy Vetch, and killed most of the leaving only shade trees The third year he seeded King Ranch Bluestem with Hairy Vetch, fertilized and mowed twice. The fourth year he built a mall lake and terraces to con water, mowed twice and sodded the dam and outlet.

In four years he increased the grazing capacity from one cow per 121/2 acres for four months grazing to one cow per one and 2/3 acres for ten months grazing His local club leader is Mr

Delores Duerksen, 15, of Plainview, has won state honors in the 4-H Recreation and Rural Arts program. Leadership and achieve-ment in the program earned her a trip to the Club Congress, pro-vided by United States Rubber

Delores, a 4-H'er for six years, carried 11 projects. She started her recreation work in her first year of 4-H, leading songs and games. She became leader of all recreation for her County-Wide Sr. 4-H Club, led by Mrs. Elmo Ellis and Mrs. A. J. Duerksen.

She won many honors for outstanding achievements in other projects, including first place for demonstrations in baking, dairy and dairy foods, and received four blue ribbons on dress revues. Delores was elected recreation leader of the Halfway 4-H Club,






