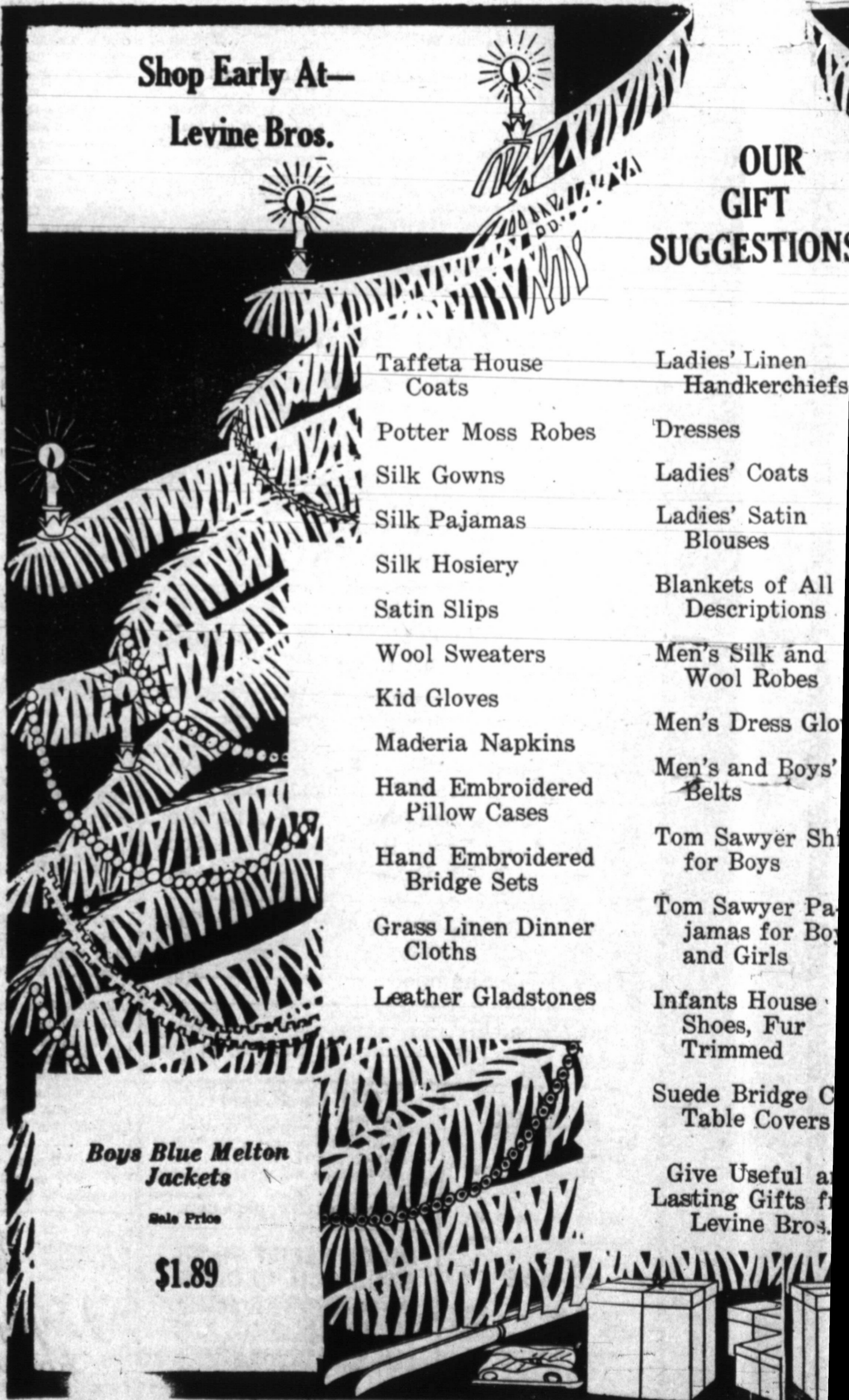

Clifford B. Jones Tech President

The board of directors of the Texas Technological College in session in Fort Worth Saturday chose Clifford B. Jones of Spur as president of that institution.

His name had been mentioned frequently among those being considered for the position, and his election seems to have brought satisfaction to faculty and students of the institution alike.

The selection of Mr. Jones was unique in that he had never taught a day in his life and is not a college graduate. In fact he never attended college as a student, but he is a graduate of a high school in Kansas City, where he resided until he was 26 years of age. He is now 53. He came to Texas in 1911 and entered upon the career of a ranchman and business man. He has attained much success in these lines and has held many responsible positions in the business world.

He began as assistant manager of the Spur interests of S. M. Swenson & Sons of New York. In 1913 he was made manager and has held this position practically ever since. He was one of the organizers of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and was its third president. He has been street commissioner and mayor of Spur, president of the Spur chamber of commerce, first president of the Spur Rotary club, president of the Spur Cattle Loan Company, regional advisor for Texas, Louisiana and New Mexico of the Public Works administration, with headquarters in Fort Worth, president of the Spur Security bank, director of the Stamford & Northern Railway Company, the Wichita Valley Railway Company, Wichita Falls & Oklahoma Railway Company, and other business and civic organizations.

He is a member of the Episcopal Church, Scottish and York Rite Masons, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, and Sons of the American Revolution.

He succeeds Dr. Bradford A. Knapp as president of the Texas Tech, who died last spring. He has been a member of the board of directors of the Tech since it was founded in 1923 and for several years has been chairman of the board.

He has indicated his acceptance of the presidency which was tendered him by unanimous vote of the board and will move to Lubbock and enter actively upon his duties about February 1.

Meteorites Worth \$1.00 Per Pound

Austin, Texas, Nov. 30.—Dr. E. G. Keller, professor of applied mathematics and astronomy at The University of Texas, recently said that he frequently receives letters from Texans asking how much they can get for meteorites they have found. He said the price is one dollar a pound for metal meteorites and but little more for rock meteorites. He explained that the chief use of meteorites is in scientific exhibits in museums.

"One of the chief deposits of meteorite fragments in the world is located about 160 miles from the McDonald Observatory near Odessa, Texas," Dr. Keller said. "There are but few meteor craters in the world, and the one in Texas is comparatively large, being about six hundred feet in diameter."

The South Plains region in Hale and adjacent counties is also a fertile field for surface meteorite fragments and many fine specimens have been found there.

T. W. Montgomery, a member of the faculty of the Roosevelt consolidated high school in Lubbock county, visited relatives here Saturday and Sunday. Mr. Montgomery was a formidable but unsuccessful candidate for Representative in the legislature from this district last summer, his home at that time being at Wilson.

White, Superintendent of the Tahoka High School; J. B. Walker, Deputy Sheriff; D. A. Parkhurst, Proprietor of the Broken Dollar Store; Paul Miller, Cotton Buyer; and Miss Minnie Kever, Clerk in her father's store and an ex-postmaster from Oklahoma.

ONE THOUSAND BALES GINNED IN TAHOKA

Lynn Is Second In 1938 Cotton

Up to Wednesday night, November 30, the five gin plants in Tahoka had ginned 12,750 bales of cotton according to reports given the News.

Only 776 bales had been ginned since our report last week as against nearly 1,400 bales ginned the preceding week and more than 1,900 bales ginned during the week preceding that. This would indicate that the ginning season is just about over, as do also the blackened cotton fields over the county.

While we have no report from the other gins, it seems certain that 52,000 or 53,000 bales have been ginned in the county. The Government report showed that 43,308 bales had been ginned in the county prior to November 14. The five gins in Tahoka have ginned more than 2,500 bales since that date. It is probable that the entire county has ginned not less than 10,000 bales since that date, which would place the total now at more than 53,000. It seems very probable that the total crop this year will fall somewhat below 60,000 bales.

Lynn county again stands second among the counties of the plains. According to the report of ginnings prior to November 14 published recently in the Lubbock Avalanche, Lubbock county at that time led Lynn county by nearly 5,000 bales.

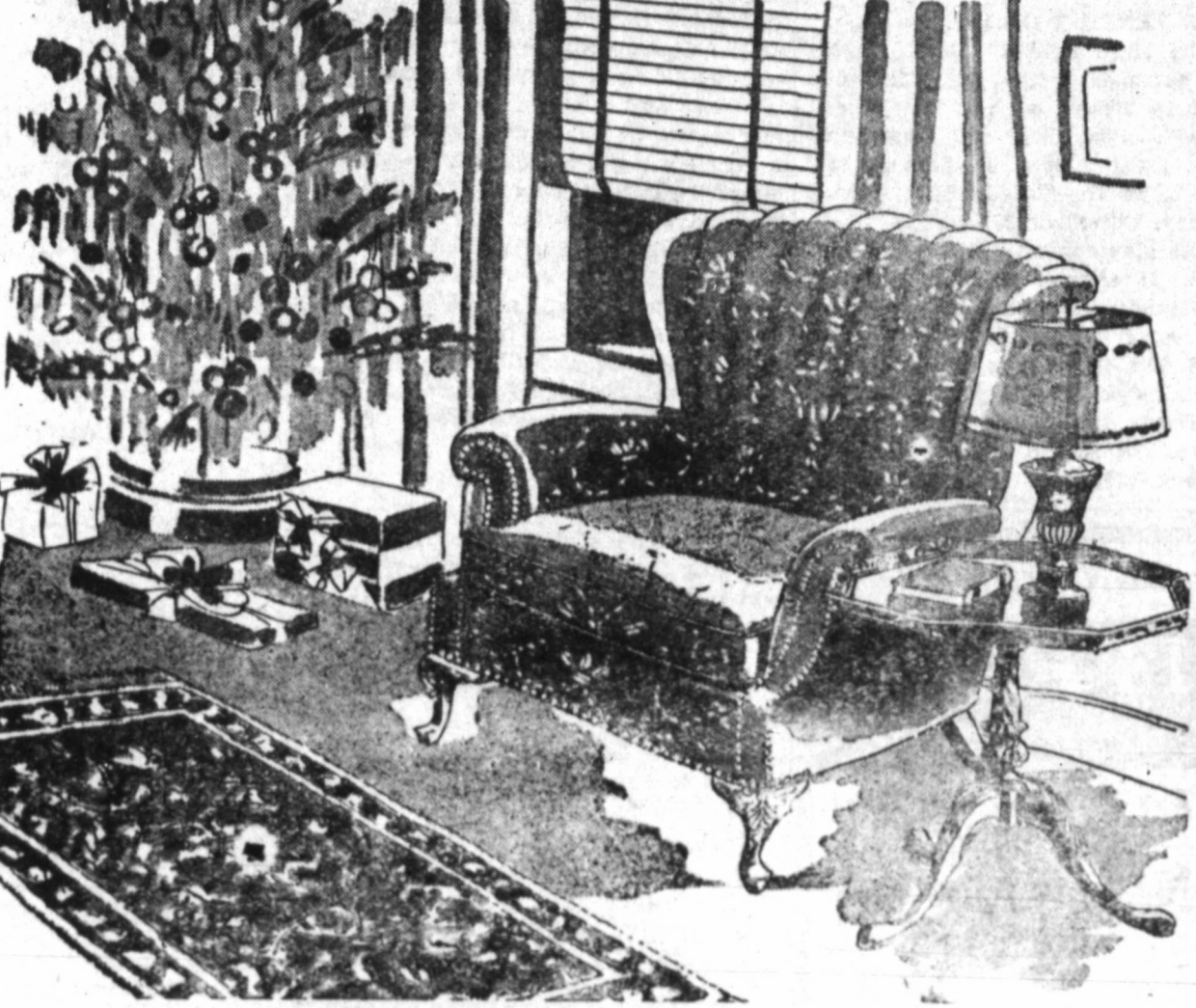
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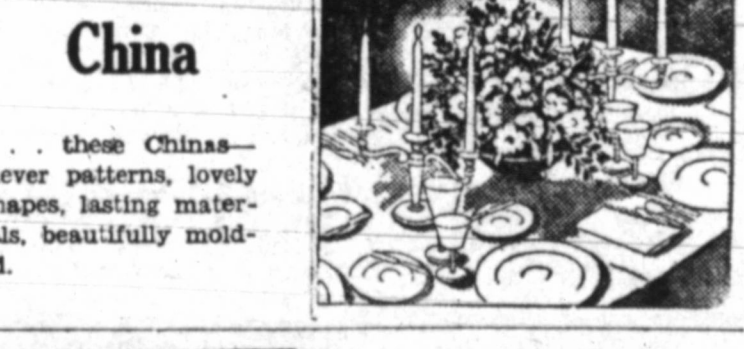
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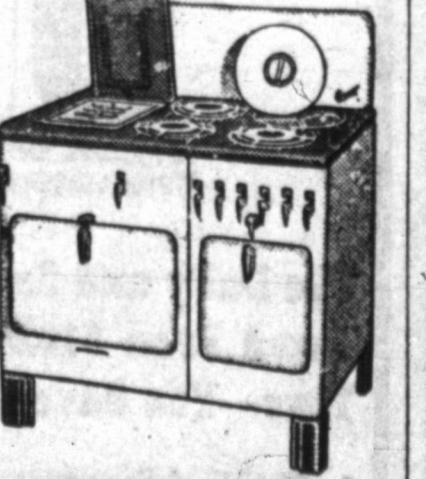


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
