### **Oklahoma Firm Is** Low Bidder On **Big Project**

Construction Of Lyntegar Lines **Expected** To Be Started At An Early Date

Contracts were let Tuesday by the board of directors of the Lyntegar Electric Corporative, Incorporated for the construction of approxiately 320 miles of electric light and power lines in Lynn, Garza. Terry, and Hockley counties, and also for meters and meter sockets.

Construction contracts were in two sections, one comprising 133 pole miles on the Meadow substation extending from the John ward, and the other comprising 137 pole miles on the Hackberry Sub-The program at Tahoka is being etation and extending eastward and soutrward from Wilson.

candlemaking was developed, the candles were placed on candle beams-a rude chandelier of crosssticks of wood or strips of metal with sockets or spikes, in sliding stands, in sconces, which were also called prongs or candlearms.

The candles were made of tallow, permaceti and bayberry, the latser obtained from bayberries which grew plentifully in New England and was noted for its pure, sploy fragrance. In a letter written by Robert Beverly in 1708, he states that "nice people often put them out on purpose to have the mosne of the expiring snuff."

All the lighting devices in the American colonies for the first 200 years were generally the work of individual workmen. They were made by blacksmiths, themiths, pewterers, glass-blowers, carpon-ters or whatever the orafisman might be. Each of these oreated his own designs which were made for local distribution as necessity demanded and of which no two wors exactly alike.

Candlesticks were made in wood tron, brass, pewter and later silver and glass. As the Colonies became more prosperous and trade with the mother country increased many beautiful examples in silver, glass, pottery such as delft, and later in the Eighteenth century percelains such as Chelsea were imported.


to Minister te Indians Jacques Marquette, one of the most noted of the pioneers of France in the New World, was bern in France in 1637, because a James priest in 1658 emigrated to Cas-ada to establish missions and etplore new lands for his country.

At that time, writes Loslie East-ley in the Washington Star, the French settlements were more trad-ing posts, widely scattered, and Pa-ther Marquette was forced to tran-el hundreds of miles in his eases to preach to the Indians and estab-lish mission houses along the Great Lakes. Lakes.

In the spring of 1078 Margaette joined Jeliet in an expedition by cance by way of the Illinois to the cance by way of the Illinets to the Mississippi river and down that stream to Arkansas. Do Soto had discovered the Mississippi more than a hundred years before but nothing came of his discovery. Mar-quette, however, who had endured much suffering on the journey, pre-pared excellent maps and wrote de-scriptions of the new country which resulted in others following and de-veloping the Mississippi valley.

Two years later Father Marquette started on a missionary journey along Lake Michigan, was taken ill from exposure and died May 18, 1675.

### **Meteorites** Worth \$1.00 Per Pound

Austin, Texas, Nov. 30 .- Dr. E. G. Keller, professor of applied mathematics and astronomy at The University of Texas, recently said that he frequently receives letters from Texans asking how much they can get for meteorites they have found. He said the price is one dollar a pound for metal meteorites and but little more for rock meteorites. He explained that the chief use of meteorites is in scientific exhibits in museums.

"One of the chief deposits of meteorite fragments in the world is located about 160 miles from the McDonald Observatory near Odessa, Texas," Dr. Keller said. "There are but few meteor craters in the world, and the one in Texas is comparatively large, being about six hundred feet in diameter."

The South Plains region in Hale and adjacent counties is also a fertile field for surface meteorite fragments and many fine specimens have been found there.







#### "How Old Is Ann?" Gave **Puzzle Sharks a Problem**

The question, "How old is Ann?" refers to an old mathematical problem which had a wide vogue at the beginning of the Twentieth century. On October 12, 1903, the New York Press, in its column "On the Tip of the Tongue," printed the following letter submitted by a correspondent who signed himself John Mahon and gave his residence as Brooklyn: "Mary is twenty-four years old. She is twice as old as Ann was when she was as old as Ann is now. How old is Ann now? A says the answer is sixteen; B says twelve. Which is correct?"

Mark Sullivan, in Our Times, says that this letter "started people sharpening pencils over the entire country, and for half a dozen years remained a subject of dispute and means of pastime." The imperfect manner in which the problem was stated (both the answers given were incorrect) not only confused those attempting to solve it, but also contributed to the fascination of the task. Several persons, it was reported, went insane trying to find out how old Ann was. All sorts of "Ann problems" (some of them entirely new and some of them merely modifications of the original) were published for the amusement of the public. From what source the writer of the letter printed in the New York Press obtained the original problem is not known. That it antedates 1903, in one form or another, is probable. Some people have attributed the original Ann problem to Sam Loyd, an inventor of puzzles and brain-twisters, but there is no evidence to support the claim. The problem as stated in the paper presents no particular mathematical difficulties and is readily solved by algebra. The answer is that Ann is eighteen years of age, says a writer in the Indianapolis News.




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#### San Marino

Largest park in the United States is Yellowstone. It exceeds in size the state of Delaware, is mostly in Wyoming, but extends into Montana and Idaho. Its creation as a park, at the suggestion of a Montana businessman, Cornelius Hedges, in 1870, was the start of our national parks system. more than 2,500 bales since that date. It is probable that the entire county has ginned not less than 10.000 bales since that date, which

would place the total now at more than 53,000. It seems very probable that the total crop this year will fall somewhat below 60,000 bales. Lynn county again stands second among the counties of the plains. According to the report of ginnings cently in the Lubbock Avalanche, Lubbock county at that time led Lynn county by nearly 5,000 bales.
