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Insects Reported Light In District

reports that weather conditions have been favorable over the area for growth and fruiting of cotton during the past week. While fruiting was generally satisfactory some very rapidly growing cotton was slow in setting

Aphid infestation increased in many fields thoughout the area. While some cotton showed redustions in populations due to increased beneficial insect activity, other fields had sufficient infestations to show honeydew on plants. Control applications have been made in limited areas.

Damaging fleahoppers infest. ations were reported in some fields of late planted cotton. In practically all cases such populations were found on cotton where insecticides had not been used.

Bollworm activity increased somewhat over last week. Heaviest infestations were reported in Dawson, Garza, Howard, Martin, Mitchell, Terry and Scurry Counties. Infestations were sufficient to require control in a number of fields in Crosby, Cochran, Hale Lubbock and Swisher Counties. Since bollworm moths are appearing in larger numbers in cotton fields and since conditions are favorable for development of those of past year, says the speinsect, frequent checks should be make for presence of eggs and small worms. As damaging infestations develop, good control can be secured when plants are throughly sovered with proper dosages of recommended matter in the soil; nitrogen insecticides.

Lygus bugs were found in light to occasional fairly heavy infestations on cotton in Bailey, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Garza and Lamb counties. The insects were generally found in greater numbers n cotton near alfalfa.

ion and growth. Another, sulfanilamide one of the wonder drugs slows down an insect's metabolism.

None of the experimental chemicals act as insecticides, which are almost immediately deadly to insects. But in some instances, the larvae-to-adult development period is being extended so as to prevent maturity

One of the most interesting of these experiments concerns the Some flies have a resistance to DDT. Against others, the insecticide is still effective.

Experiments have proved that the cases of the DDT-resistant lies, the growth-stunting chemcals are more effective than with those flies that are non-resistant Therefore, stunting chemicals pick up where DDT leaves off.

The chemicals used in these fly larvae-development tests is piperonyl butoxide, a non-toxic compound which appears to be one of the most promising of all the experimental drugs. By adding this chemical to other inecticides, tests indicate that lar vae development can be markedreduced.

In the case of DDT-resistant lies, only 3 per cent of the resistant flies became fully developed whereas 16 per cent of the ormal flies survived.
