The WPA reported Sunday that
there were too many young persons
on American farms to support
themselves comfortably in agri-
cultural pursuits, says a Washing-
ton press report. It is our observa-
tion and information that there
are also too many young persons in
the cities and town to support
themselves comfortably in indus-
trial pursuits. Furthermore, thou-
sands of people are being driven
from the farms to the cities and
towns each year by the constant
introduction of improved farm
machinery and, as many believe,
by the agricultural policy of this
government during the past few
years. The only remedy the Wash-
ington news dispenser, Corrington
Gill, assistant WPA administrator,
offers for this situation is increased
WPA work among rural people,
which means increased govern-
mental appropriations.

The new year brought with it
two new members of the President's
Cabinet, Harry L. Hopkins and
former Governor Murphy of Michi-
gan. Hopkins, former WPA admin-
istrator, was sworn in a couple of
weeks ago as Secretary of Com-
merce, succeeding Daniel C. Roper,
who resigned, and Murphy took the
oath of office Monday as Attorney
General, succeeding Homer S. Cum-
mings, who also resigned. Both ap-
pointments, of course, must be
confirmed by the Senate. A search-
ing investigation of the record of
each will doubtless be made, espe-
cially that of Governor Murphy, but
it is generally believed that both
will be confirmed. Murphy has re-
ceived much criticism on the one
hand and much praise on the other
for the manner in which he hand-
led the sit-down strike in some of
the automobile plants in and near
Detroit several months ago. While
we have no sympathy for the sit-
down strike, it is probable that
Governor Murphy handled this
situation most wisely under the
circumstances. But we'll hear much
more about it a little later.

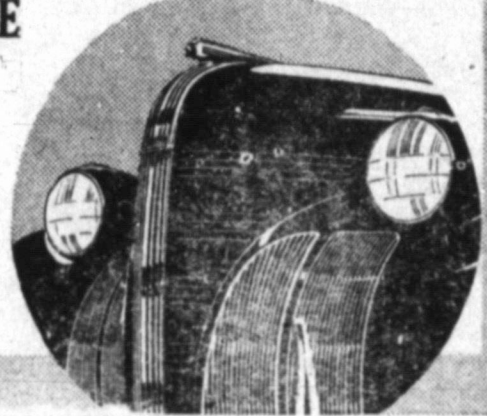

League Meet Plans Made

The Lynn County Executive Committee, University Interscholastic League, at a meeting held in Tahoka December 7, made the following rulings:
The County U. I. L. Meet will be held at Tahoka beginning Thursday night, March 23 and running through Saturday, March 25.
The program is to be arranged by Mr. Hanes and Mr. Dodson of Tahoka.
The Director General was instructed to make arrangements with an adjoining county to trade judges as in the past.
The rules on Tiny Tot Story Telling are the same as for the last three years.

Quadrants for play-off contests will be determined strictly by the Lubbock-Lamesa and Brownfield-Post highways.
VOLLEY BALL: Class "A", Class "B", both Ward and High School champions and Rural school champions will be selected. The various class champions will, in the week following the County Meet, play for the Championship of the County.
TENNIS: Dates for Quadrant play-off and Finals will be set by Mr. Dodson, Athletic Director, soon after Christmas.
PLAYGROUND BALL: The ball to be used in 1939 contests in Lynn County will be the 14 inch in-seam ball. Only Class "A" High School, Class "A" Ward, Class "B" High and Class "B" Ward, and Rural championships for each boys and girls will be determined. All Rural Playground Ball contests will be held in Tahoka during the County Meet. Quadrant play-off for Class "A" and "B" will be arranged by Mr. Dodson.

Mrs. C. L. Liles Of New Lynn Dies

Mrs. C. L. Liles, the mother of Mrs. P. K. Fleming, who lived with the Fleming family in the New Lynn community, passed away December 11, 1938 in the home with heart trouble and pneumonia.

Mrs. Liles was born in Limestone county on April 1, 1875 making her 62 years and 8 months and 21 days old. She was married to C. L. Liles at Bryant, Texas on July 25, 1889. To this union was born 14 children, of which seven are living at the present. Mr. Liles died in 1917.

year ago; Dickens was eighth with 26,370 bales, tenth a year ago.

All counties showed decreases from a year ago which was a record year. However five counties showed totals close to those of the 1937 crop, with increases that were less than half of the total. Dickens, Floyd, Hale, Motley and Scurry counties were the five counties that did not show heavy reductions.

For the 1937 crop Lubbock county led, with Lynn second, Dawson, third; Lamb, fourth; Crosby, fifth; Hockley, sixth; Scurry seventh; Terry, eighth; Hale, ninth and Dickens, tenth.
