# Over \$800,000.00 Is **Expected** For The Year's Total

#### \$92,000 In Checks Are Received Here; Others Are **Expected At Early Date**

The first government checks isued to farmers for compliance wi h the 1938 program arrived the first of this week, according to C. A. Lawrence, secretary of the Lynn County A. C. A. Three hundred fifty-eight checks amounting to \$92,215.30 had been received up to Thursday noon.

A total of more than \$800,000.00 is to be paid to the farmers of Lynn county, Mr. Lawrence says. They will be pouring into the secretary's office almost continually now for a period of several weeks. Mr. Lawrence will send out notices through the mail to the farmers as their checks arrive, and hence he requests that farmers do not call

at the office until notice is received. Compliance with this request will feciliate the work of the office and save the time of the secretary and the office force.

From a financial standpoint these payments will be equivalent to the marketing of 20,000 bases of cotton at eight cents per pound. Coming at this time of year, these checks should be of great help to the farmers and should greatly stimulate business at the different trading points in the county.

Various methods are being used in constructing terraces, Vestal says. As many farmers as can do so are obtaining the aid of the county road equipment, while others are using plows, fresnoes, V drags and small terracers with their farm

tractors and horse power. Terraces can be built economically with teams and fresnoes or by using farm-type tractors with plows, V drags or small terracers, it is pointed out.

Strip cropping on terraced fields is being carried out in this area with excellent results, the camp superintendent reports. Sudan grass or cane is planted on the terraces as a soil building crop, with cotton and grain sorghum being planted in alternate terrace intervals. These strips are rotated annually with the Sudan or cane being kept on the terraces until there is sufficient base to permit the planting of row crops.

Farmers of this area have found that the growing of soil conserving crops on terraces is more practical than the productiin of cotton, tillage of which increased the danger of wind erosion and the cost of maintenance.



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



Royal Misters




