Returned Wednesday: Seventeen Defendants

Twenty bills of indictment charging seventeen different defendants with such crimes as theft, burglary, forgery, robbery, unlawful sale of mortgaged property, driving while intoxicated, wife desertion, possibly others, was returned into court Wednesday afternoon by a grand jury which was impaneled by Judge Louis Reid when court convened here Monday morning.

It is believed that this is the largest number of indictments ever returned by a grand jury of the 106th district court at a single sitting.

All of the defendants except one or two are already under arrest and in jail or under bond, we under-

Among the indictments is one for robbery against the young fellow who a few weeks ago is alleged to have kidnaped George Knight and taken his car.

Among the theft indictments is one charging the theft of a car and another charging the theft of chick-

The criminal docket will be taken up the second Monday in October, when, it is believed, most of these cases will be disposed of.

The court has had little to do this week other than to set the docket, render a few judgments by default, and grant two or three divorces. Jury civil cases will be taken up next Monday.



DRAW CLUB MEMBERS BAKE SUCCESSFULLY

At a recent meeting of the Draw home demonstration club, problems in making yeast breals were discussed and helpful suggestions were

'I never have the difficulty of kneading in too much flour in bread as most women," stated Mrs. S. H. Crockett, cooperator of this club. Mrs. Crockett always kneads bread on a board with cover made from a feed sack. When the sack is used only a small film of flour is necessary while kneading. This makes it possible for her to have bread which is unusually light in texture.

"It pays to have a good recipe for making a sweet yeast bread and to follow instructions carefully," said Mrs. R. R. Reagan, also a cooperator in the club. If quality bread is expected, she always uses nutritious mixes and kneads carefully and bakes at the correct temperature. The Swedish tea ring she made, using the recipe furnished by the home demonstration agent's office, met with her family's approval. "It was delicious. I wish you could have tasted it," Mrs. Reagan told her

The Flag Code

The National Flag should be raised and lowered by hand. It should be displayed only from sunrise to sun-

Do not raise the Flag while it is furled. Unfurl, then hoist quickly to the top of the staff. Lower it slowly and with dignity.

When the flag is hung as a banner across and over the center line of a street running east and west, the union should be to the north, and to the east in a street running north and south. Where the National Flag is dis-

played with State or other flags, it should be given the place of honor on the right. Display the Flag upon a staff when possible.

Place no objects on or over the Flag. Various articles are sometimes placed on a speaker's table covered with the Flag. This practice should be avoided. Always let the Flag hang straight.

Do not festoon over doors or arches or tie it in a bow knot. Use red, white, and blue bunting for decorative purposes. When flags are used in unveiling

a statue or monument they should not be allowed to fall to the ground, but should be carried aloft, forming a feature of the ceremony.

Take every precaution to prevent the Flag from becoming soiled. It should not be allowed to touch the ground or floor, nor to brush against

Before being placed at half mast the Flag should always be raised to the top of the staff. Before lowering it should likewise be hoisted to

When displayed in the chancel or on a platform in a church, the Flag should be placed on a staff at the clergyman's right; other flags at his left. If displayed in the body of the church, the Flag should be at the congregation's right as they face the clergyman.

Do not use the Flag as a portion of a costume or athletic uniform Do not embroider it upon cushions or handkerchiefs nor print it on paper napkins or boxes.

When carried in a procession, military or otherwise, the Flag should be borne to the right of regimental or other flags.




