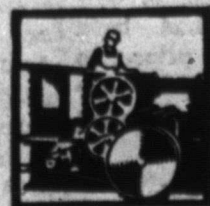

THE ROAD HOUSE EVIL

Dr. W. D. Bradfield, who was re-
cently appointed chairman of the
State Liquor Control Board, put his
finger on a sore spot when he point-
ed out the folly and the terrible
consequences of the policy which
permits the operation of beer joints
and liquor houses along the public
highways of the state outside cities
and towns. These contribute great-
ly, no doubt, to the evil of drunken
driving and the consequent auto-
mobile wrecks and collisions that
result in so many deaths and in-
juries.

Dr. Bradfield immediately jump-
ed to the conclusion, therefore,
that the Liquor Control Board
should no longer issue liquor permits
to persons conducting or intending
to conduct such businesses along the
highways. The right of the Board
to refuse such permits being called
into question. Dr. Bradfield im-
mediately put the matter up to the
attorney-general Gerald Mann, for
an official opinion.

Mr. Mann promptly gave a written
opinion holding that the Liquor Con-
trol Board has no such authority.
He pointed out that no such author-
ity was given it by the liquor con-
trol act and that no board could
assume authority that was not
clearly delegated to it. To do so
would be to assume the functions
of the legislature, the law-making
body. Mr. Mann, clearly, was right.

Which illustrates the point that
we have often made that it is bet-
ter to have good men who are
also able lawyers in responsible
places in the government rather
than to have merely good men in
these positions. Dr. Bradfield is a
good and able man, but he does not
have a broad grasp of the principles
of law which must guide us in the
making of laws and the interpre-
tation and application thereof. He
is a minister of the gospel and has
been president of S.M.U. Gerald
Mann is a graduate of that institu-
tion but, though a young man, he
is also an able lawyer, and so he
was able to point out to Dr. Brad-
field at once the fallacy of under-
taking to stamp out this evil in the
manner that the Doctor proposed.

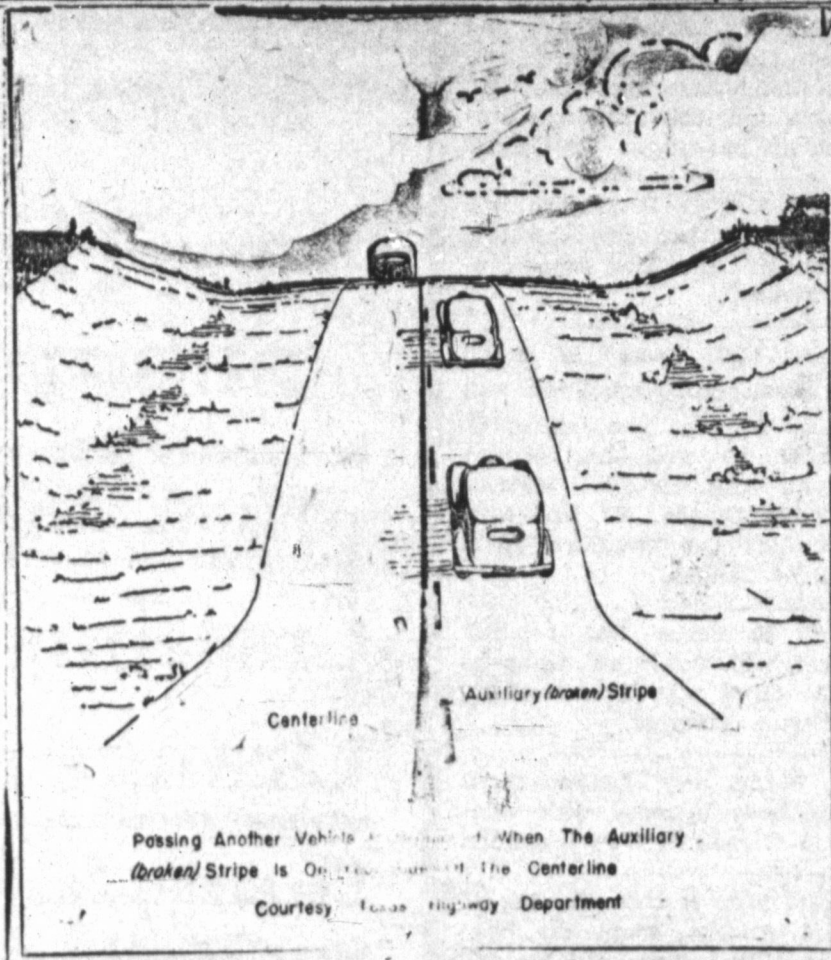
The remedy would be for the
legislature to amend the act so as
to prohibit the operation of such
places of business within a stated
distance of a federal highway out-
side incorporated cities and towns.
That would diminish, though it
would not cure the evil, and by all
means it should be done at the next
session of the legislature.
