Rosemary Nelms Is Re-elected City Secretary

Rosemary Nelms was re-elected city secretary Tuesday, with a margin of 89 votes over her opponent. Mrs. L. E. Turrentine, Miss Nelms received 283 votes while 194 were

cast for Mrs. Turrentine. Dr. K. R. Durham and N. C. Rainey were renamed aldermen without opposition, receiving 384 and 343 votes respectively.

The total votes cast, 477, was the largest number cast in a city election since 1932, when six candidates ran for city secretary. At that time, 480 votes were recorded. In 1934, 392 votes were cast, and at that time Miss Nelms was elected to her first term. She has served since. In 1936, only 143 votes were cast, with no opposition. In the mayor-city marshal election last April, 332 votes were tabulated.

This column will be in the Lynn County News for several weeks. If you are interested in the whys of Radio, follow it. Most people take Radio for granted, more or less. They look at it and say, "Oh well who cares what makes it work?" But when a very important program is on and just at the critical moment; Biff! Boom! Zip! Bang! And the listener loses the best part of the program. Then right away, he wishes he knew what to do to stop such interference and in most cases he would gladly pay any reasonable price for an attachment to filter out

You say, "So what? In the first place. I don't know what causes this unholy interruption, and in the second place. I don't know where it is coming from, and in the third place, I couldn't do anything about it if I knew the first and second place." So, round and round we go and nothing ts done about it.

Now, as I have promised to put you wise to the whys, I will give you a few of the many causes. So, drag in your feet because somebodies toes are bound to get stepped on.

After a thorough survey of Tahoka. I find that about 90 per cent of the man made static is caused by electrical appliances. Now this does not mean that 90 per cent of the appliances are defective. Not at all. It means that 'due to the necessity of construction, most appliances have devices such as; automatic cutoffs, switches, brushes, etc. Each of these cause interference in radios Other troubles often experienced are, defective wiring, loose fuses, naked wires running through trees, and in some rare cases, the transformers that distribute the juice. 


