No. 45 A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 9-A; providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County, after a majority vote of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein, shall have the authority to levy a tax not to exceed Twentyfive (25) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for a period not exceeding fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding the outstandng warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of the County by the issuance of bonds under the provisions of the General Laws regulating the refunding of outstanding debts of the County; providing for the necessary proclamation; and appropriating funds to defray the expenses of the proclamation, publica-

tion, and election. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Article 8, Section of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another Setion to be known as Section 9-A, which shall read as follows:
