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# Tahoka Holds Slaton 18-20; 400 Fans Ride Special Train

About 500 Tahoka football fans witnessed one of the most thrilling games that has ever been seen in District 5-A football history last Friday night at Slaton. Three hundred and ninety Tahoka fans traveled by rail to Slaton by special train. They were very much surprised by the power that has been developed by the Bulldogs since their first game this season although they did not break the old jinx that has existed since way back and the Slaton Tigers barely nosed the Bulldogs out by a score of 20 to 18.

Collier Is Outstanding Man

Collier led the Tigers to victory by scoring all three touchdowns and the two "extra points" that beat the Bulldogs. He could plunge the line like a mad bull and it was his ball game up until the second half-Then the Bulldogs finally stopped him.

"Slingin"-"Rusty" Waldrip shot a 25-yard pass to Earl Adams for the Bulldogs first touchdown of the game. "Rusty" also passed a 20-yard bullet pass intended for "Hoss" West Out Levelland but a Slaton Boy slapped it right out of his hands into Earl Adams hands and Earl ran 45 yards for the Bulldogs final score.
