Mr. Garner seems to be a disappointed if not a disgruntled man. He was keenly disappointed that he made such a poor showing in his attempt to unhorse his chief, President Roosevelt, in the latter's ambition to smash a precedent by being elected to a third term.

And yet, if Mr. Garner had been elected President at the last election he would have smashed a precedent, or something, almost as hoary with age as the No-Third-Term precedent.

It has been 104 years since any man was elected to the Presidency of this country while serving as Vice-President. The last man to accomplish this feat was Martin Van Buren, who, while serving as Vice-Presi-

Does anybody today remember who the Vice-President was under Martin

Well, the books tell us that it was Richard M. Johnson, the first Kentuckian ever to be elected to this

Johnson was a man of considerable repute, having served in Congress for twelve years before he was nominated for Vice-President as the running-mate of Van Buren. But it was doubtless due to his reputed achievement as a soldier rather than as a statesman that he was placed on the Presidential ticket. He is the man who is reputed to have shot and killed the noted Indian chief, Tecumseh, at the battle of the Thames in Ontario, Canada, in the War of 1812 with Great Britain. Tecumseh had joined the British forces and was making plenty of trouble for Uncles Sam's boys, Johnson distinguished himself in this battle and was given the credit as having personally fired the shot that killed Tecumseh. This was while he was a member of Congress. It made Johnson a sort of military hero, and evidently was thought that he would add strength to the Van Buren ticket.

Johnson encountered a hitch in he electoral college, however, after was thought that he had the office in a bag. When the Virginia electors met, they refused to vote for Johnson, casting their votes instead for an Alabama gentleman named William Smith, although they voted the ticket according to instructions as far as the head of the ticket was concerned. The next Vice-President after Johnson, if we except John Tyler, who became President when his died after being in office only one month, was George Mifflin Dallas of Pennsylvania, who was elected on a ticket with James K. Polk of Tennessee. He is of special interest to Texans for two reasons: first. because he and Polk were elected on a platform favoring the annexation of Texas as a state in the Union, and second because the city of Dallas in this state was named in

Although a Pennsylvanian, born in Philadelphia, Dallas was a Democrat. Born in 1792, he graduated at Princeton College in 1810 and was admitted to the bar in 1813. He was elected to the United States Senate from Pennsylvania in 1831. He was United States minister to Russia for two years under the Van Buren administratoin, 1837 to 1839, and was elected Vice President in 1844. He was United States minister to Great Britain under James Buchanan from 1856 to 1861 and died in December 1864.

Elected on a platform advocating the annexation of Texas, he lived to see this state secede from the Union and died before it was forcibly brought back. On Monday of this week the first Vice-President of this Republic ever elected from the State of Texas concluded his tenure of eight years in this position and returned to spend the remainder of his days in his beloved native state.

Much water ran over the dam between March 4, 1849, when George M. Dallas ceased to be Vice-President, and January 20, 1941, when John N. Garner yielded the gavel to his successor.

Miss Davis is the daughter of a pioneer Kent county couple, and Miss Lasater has been employed ' for some time at Lubbock in the office of Judge Homer Pharr and in the office of a land company. Both are experienced stenographers.
