RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Apple Cake Pie

4 cups thinly sliced, pared apples 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1 1/2 cups sugar 1/2 well-beaten egg
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 cup Fat
 1/2 teaspoon Evaporated Milk
 1 cup sifted, all-purpose flour 3 Tablespoon water
 1/4 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 cup melted butter or margarine

Put apples into bottom of a greased round 9-in. cake pan. Sprinkle over the apples a mixture of 1/2 cup sugar and the cinnamon. Let stand. Sift together into a 2-qt. bowl the flour, 1 cup sugar, the baking powder and salt. Mix in another bowl the rest of the ingredients. Add all at once to flour mixture and mix until smooth. Pour over apples in pan. Bake in 325 oven (low moderate) on rack slightly below center 1 hour, or until top is brown. Cut into pie shaped wedges. Serve warm or cold.

Millen Explains Farm Bureau Work At Rotary

Bill Millen, president of the Bailey County Farm Bureau, described the work of his organization before the Rotary Club at its noon luncheon Tuesday.

Right now, the Bureau is holding public meetings in the various communities, at which farmers discuss their desire and what they think the U. S. farm policy ought to be. The Agriculture Department and Congress welcome the suggestions of farm organizations like the Bureau, and their ideas go a long way when policy is being formulated.

Mr. Millen said the Bureau welcomes and would appreciate the attendance of business men and anyone else who is interested in national farm policy at these meetings.

He said it is hard for him to understand why more farmers do not belong to the Chamber of Commerce here in Muleshoe, and at the same time why more business men do not belong and take an interest in the Farm Bureau, for farm prosperity is the basis for sound business in the cities. No one in this area can, he thought, be indifferent toward farm problems.

Mr. Millen reminded that the Bureau is bringing the film Carol Jones made on his trip to Korea for showing to the public in the high school auditorium the

Towns Family One Of Eleven Picked For Honors By 'Progressive Farmer'

Eleven Texas farm families were today designated as "Master Farm Family" award winners by the Progressive Farmer magazine. The highest honor yet conferred in America upon working farm families, the award is based upon distinguished accomplishments in farming, home-making, and community service.

"For a great many years the Progressive Farmer has had the conviction that we could render no greater service to Texas agriculture than to seek out and honor farm families of outstanding merit," says Eugene Butler, president and editor. "In almost every line of human endeavor distinguished accomplishments are recognized and publicly honored. This has not been the reward of farmers. Many notable

farm families have gone unnoticed, unhonored, regardless of their splendid records. It was to honor at least a few of our finest farmers that inspired the Progressive Farmer to make the Master Farm Family Award."

The Master Farmer Award was first made in Texas in 1926. It continued in 1927, 1928, and 1929. During the depression the program had to be put aside. In 1937, it was decided to make it a "family" as well as "farmer" honor, and awards were made in 1937, 1938, and 1941. Then World War II interrupted the program a second time. The Progressive Farmer resumed the program in 1953. A total of 87 Texas families have been placed on the Master Farm Family Honor Roll through the years.

"The Master Farm Family program is not a contest," Butler declared. Families compete only against the Master Farm Family standards. There are certain minimum requirements. The family must take good care of the land, while making it pay a reasonable profit on farming operations. There must be a good house with attractive surroundings. The family must take an active part in community life. And they must show interest and leadership in good schools, farm organizations, Voc. Ag., 4-H clubs, soil conservation, and all those group activities that are so vital to a happy, prosperous farm life.

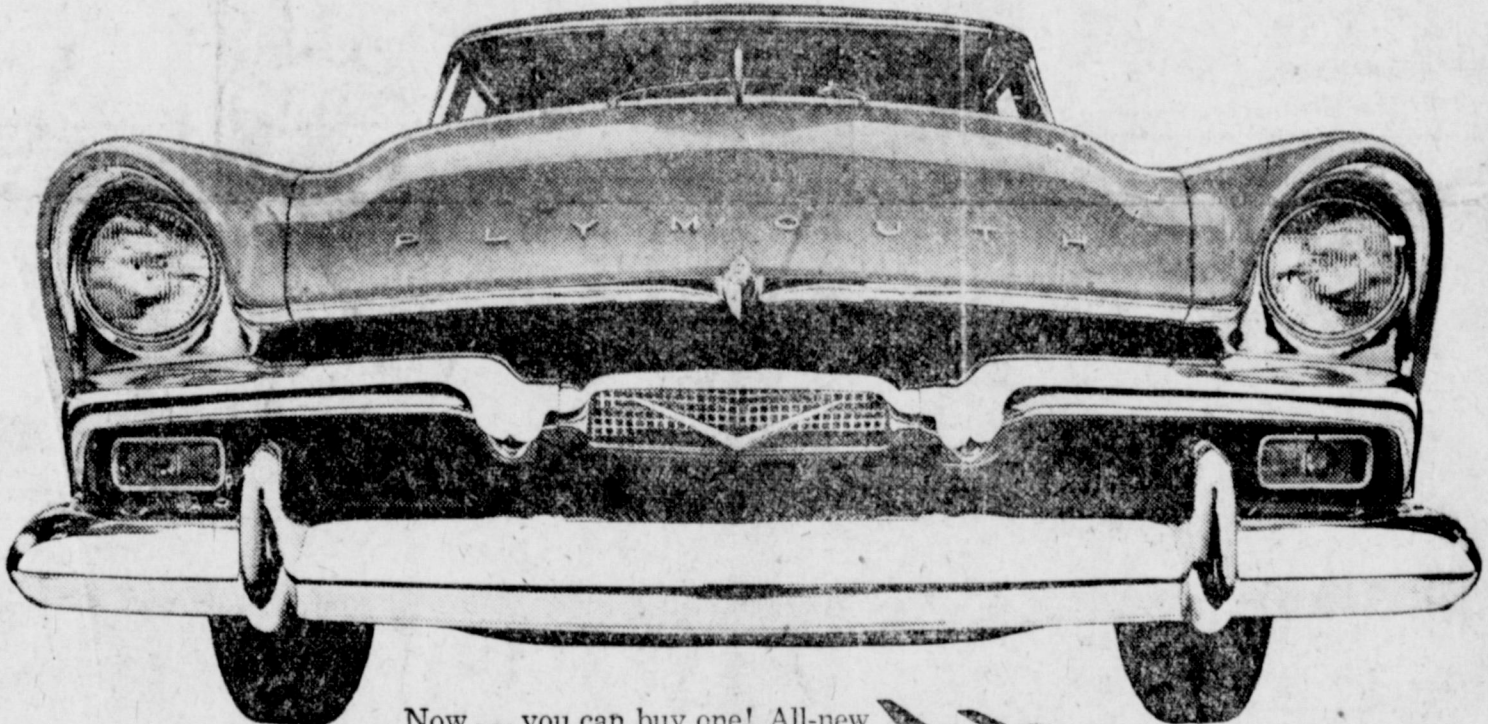

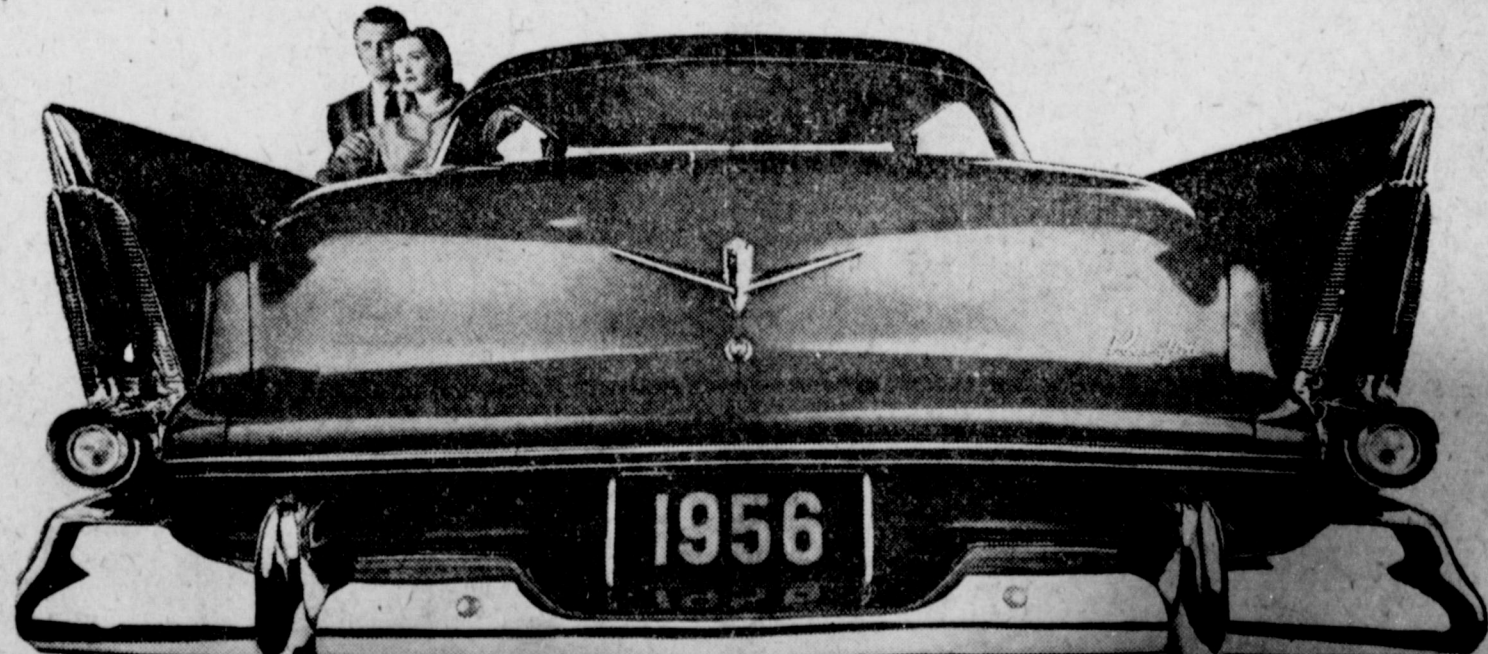

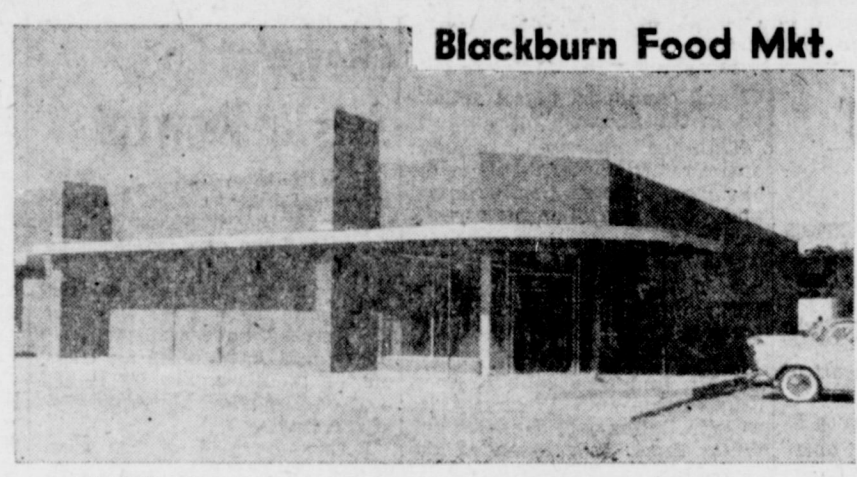

Safe Driving Day December 1; Plans Being Outlined

President Eisenhower has designated December 1 as the second annual S-D (Safe Driving) Day and will soon issue a proclamation to that effect. He has named Rear Admiral H. B. Miller as national director for S-D Day promotion.

In Texas, Governor Shivers has named S. Ross Carr, of Houston, as state director. Mr. Carr has scheduled organizational meetings in each of sixteen Department of Public Safety regions in Texas and the meeting for Region VI, which includes Bailey County, will be held in the assembly room of the Lubbock police department Oct. 25, at 2 p. m. Mr. Carr is anxious that the meeting receive the interest and attention of the people.

Veterans Land Purchase Program To Function Again After October 31

Earl Rudder, Commissioner of the General Land Office, announced from Austin that the Veterans' Land Board would accept requests for application forms to purchase land through the Veterans' Land Program beginning October 31, 1955. Rudder stressed that all requests must be by mail. Requests received before October 31, 1955, will not be honored, and will be returned.

Rudder continued that the requests received the five-day period of the first week, beginning Monday, October 31, will be placed in a locked box, and then be drawn and numbered. A limited number will be mailed application forms immediately. The remainder will be notified of their relative position. After that first week, requests for application forms will be numbered consecutively as received.

Rudder cautioned veterans on the following matters: (1) Old application forms will not be honored since entirely new forms have been written under the Amended Veterans Land Act. These application forms can be obtained by written request to the Veterans' Land Board only.

(2) The veteran should not send checks or cash with the request for application forms.

(3) The veteran's request must clearly set out his mailing address.

(4) The veteran should have the tract selected which he wishes to purchase before requesting

application forms, as veterans will have only 30 days from the date the forms are mailed from the veterans' land board to complete and return them.

Rudder concluded his announcement saying, "This system which we will use is designed to eliminate accumulation of paper work, enable the veteran and seller to conduct their business promptly, and to secure efficient utilization of the Veterans' Land Board personnel."

Glen Williams Refugee Relief Committee Man

The appointment of Glen Williams, County Judge of Bailey County, as local representative for the Governor's Committee for Refugee Relief Program has been announced by John H. Winters, Committee chairman. Judge Williams will act on behalf of the State Committee in Bailey County.

The Committee was appointed by Governor Allan Shivers at the request of President Eisenhower to inform the people of Texas on the Refugee Relief Program. In addition to Winters, who heads the State Department of Public Welfare in Austin, members are the Rev. Henry Herbst, pastor of St. Peter and Paul Church, New Braunfels; the Rev. A. O. Past, Executive Secretary of the Texas Lutheran Mission Board; Leonard L. Holloway of the Baptist General Convention of Texas; Sam W. Levy of Houston; and C. W. Pfleger, Jr., of Coupland.

Under the Refugee Relief Act of

1953, 214,000 displaced persons were declared admissible to this country. Recent figures show slightly over 43,000 have obtained sponsors and have migrated to the United States.

Of this number it is estimated that less than 500 have been brought to Texas.

To be successful in helping displaced persons get a new start in life, the Refugee Program will need assurance from 30,000 to 40,000 sponsors by early in 1956.

A sponsor is required to give assurance that the refugee will be provided with employment and housing and will not become a public charge.

The refugee's qualifications to fill the job provided him are certified by overseas officials. The Governor's Committee noted that a large percentage of the refugees are classified as agricultural workers who could be absorbed easily in the farming and ranching regions of Texas. Many skilled craftsmen are also looking for new homes in America.

"These refugees have escaped, in many instances, from prisons and concentration camps to wind up spending years in refugee camps waiting for resettlement," said Mr. Winters. "Texas is lagging in doing its part in this
