For several years following his father's death, the young Cass Edwards ranched in Tarrant county, but subsequently ranched successively in Brown, Shackleford, Crosby, and Lynn counties.

He brought a herd of 2,500 to 3. 060 cattle to Crosby county in 1879 and ran them on the Slaughter Brothers range. His was the second herd to come to that county. But a few years later, the Slaughters thought the grass rental in that section was too high and pulled up stakes and moved their herds to New Mexico. Cass Edwards, however, wanted to remain in this area Boyd and Frank Porter in 1883 had brought out a small herd of about 300 cattle to the springs at Double Lakes. Edwards liked this area, and bought out the Porters. taking charge in the spring of 1884.

T-Bar was the first major ranch tablished on the South Plains west of Crosby county. He immediately began leasing, buying and filing on land until he and his associates who composed his newly formed Tahoka Cattle Co. owned about 160 sections.

Cass Edwards in his life time has witnessed the entire span of the Texas cattle business. He gathered up longhorns out of the brush country in early days and drove them to Kansas. He saw the days of free grass, of leased grass, and finally, in order to hold out against the "nester", he had to file on and buy up sufficient acreage to graze his cattle. Though he made his start with the longhorn, he did not fail to see the advantage of blooded stock, and during the later years the herds were Hereford, headed by high quality Hereford bulls.

From the very founding of Edwards was a familiar figure on the streets of Tahoka, though he never spent much time in town except on business.

Honest and just in his business dealings, he enjoyed the confidence of all who had dealings with him. He was a plain, unpretentious man. possessed of those sterling virtues which make for good citizenship

Many Lynn county friends regret the passing of this colorful pioneer character.

FRIED CHICKEN

The most famous of chefs will bow in reverence before the old Southern negro nammy when the time comes to serve fried chicken -Southern style. But it's easy to serve this appetizing dish on your table. Just follow this recipe for

Southern Fried Chicken Select a young chicken from 11/2 to 2 pounds. Dress and disjoint. Chill. Sift flour (about 11/2 cups), add salt and pepper and roll each piece of chicken in flour mixture. Place in heavy frying pan with cottonseed oil margarine or shortening at least two inches deep. Always place larger pieces in first and on hottest part of frying pan.

Remember, it is important to have margarine or shortening very hot when the chicken is first dropped in, then lower the flame and keep covered to keep steam in. When done and a golden brown, remove and make gravy as follows: Pour from pan all the fat except 2 tablespoons, add to this 2 tablespoons flour, mix smooth and add one cup milk, stir until it boils and is thick and rich, add salt and pepper and pour in separate dish from chicken. (If plain gravy is desired, use hot water in

In announcing the new appeal policy and the plan to educate all registrants on the method of appealing decisions, National Headquarters said:

"There is an obligation upon all who come in contact with the registrant to make certain that he understands, not alone that he has the privilege of appeal but also when he must do it and how he must do it.

"The Selective Service System cannot afford to permit registrants who want to appeal to lose their opportunity merely because they do not understand the what, when and how of so doing. Furthermore, while National Headquarters does not want the appeal machinery clogged up with the claims of those who merely seek to delay their induction, it is equally important that no registrant be inducted until he has had ample opportunity to exercise all his legal rights."



tender in boiling water and 2 teaspoons salt. Drain and rinse in hot water, Turn on oven and set at moderately slow (350° F.). Cook onlon in bacon fat 5 minutes, then add rice, milk, pepper and remaining 36 teaspoon salt. Continue cooking until milk is absorbed, or about 5 minutes longer. Remove from heat about 5 minutes longer, Remove from heat, and cool. Then arrange mixture in center of ham slices, shaping into cylinder. Roll up and secure with tooth picks or string. Fut in greased baking pan, putting bits of butter on top. Bake 20 minutes, or until thoroughly heated. Serve at once with Creole Sauce (See below). Serves 6.

% cup Pet Milk

1/4 teaspoon pepper 12 slices ham, boiled tablespoons bacon fat or other short-ening

2 tablespoons butter or other shorten-ing

Wash and drain rice. Boil 30 minutes, or until tender in boiling water and 2 teaspoons salt. Drain and rinse in hot water. Turn on oven and set at moderately slow (350° F.). Cook onion in bacon fat 5 minutes, then add rice, milk, pepper and remaining 1/2 teaspoon salt. Continue cooking until milk is absorbed, or about 5 minutes longer. Remove from heat and cool. Then arrange mixture in center of ham slices, shaping into cylinder. Roll up and secure with tooth picks or string. Put in greased baking pan, putting bits of butter on top. Bake 20 minutes, or until thoroughly heated. Serve at once with Creole Sauce (See below).

## Creole Sauce

1/2 cup finely cut green pepper
3 tablespoons finely
cut onion

1014-oz. can con-densed tomato soup 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper % cup hot Pet Milk

Melt fat in saucepan. Add green pepper and onion and cook slowly 5 minutes. Stir in soup, salt and pepper and boil I minute, stirring occasionally. Then stir hot soup mixture into hot milk. Serve at once. Do not cook after mixing. Serve on Ham Rolls (See above),






