One of the first things that Hop Halsey did when the legislature convened last January was to introduce a redistricting bill, and although it met with much indifference and considerable opposition, he finally succeeded in pushing it through the house. There is also a shameful discrimination against portions of West Texas respecting representation in the state senate, though the senatorial districts were re-vamped following the 1930 census, but it's been eighteen years since we have had a new deal on Representative districts.

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

#### 18 Candidates Bear President's Approval?

The News on Wednesday morning received a Western Union message of more than 150 words sent out from Austin in which it is claimed that Lyndon Johnson has again received the endorsement of President Roosevelt for the Senate.

We quote: "A reporter asked at the President's press conference if the Administration had any comment on the Texas Senate race now that around 18 of the candidates were claiming Roosevelt support. Referring to his press conference several weeks ago at which he followed Johnson's announcement from the White House steps with a statement that the Congressman was his 'old and close friend' the President smilingly said he thought he had done a good job the first time and was quite certain the people of Texas understood him."

Ed. Note: We are running the above as a news item, though it is mere political propaganda rather than news. It contains at least one implication which we believe to be false. We do not believe that there are eighteen candidates in this race who are "claiming Roosevelt support". Lyndon Johnson is the only candidate who has made such claim so far as we have ever heard, and he is making frantic efforts to acquaint the people with the fact that he has received a favorable nod from the President. The People of Texas have great respect and admiration for President Roosevelt, but they will probably consider themselves competent to select their own senator on June 28 without any suggestions from Washington. In fact, they know that the President does not know any of the candidates with the possible exception of Johnson and Dies as well as the people of Texas themselves know them, and they will probably vote as their own judgement dictates.

Purchasing power of 4,435 standard rehabilitation borrowers in the 47 counties included in the survey vas increased by \$1,082,521.00.

The families are making satisfactory progress in the payment of their long-term loans. They have thus far paid \$3,555,622.00 into the Federal Treasury in loan installments out of \$6,668,577.00 borrowed, although much of the money does not fall due for four or five years.

Mr. Welch said the average FSA low-income borrower could not be considered a top ranking credit risk, since this agency makes loans only to families who cannot obtain adequate credit elsewhere.

"This repayment record is a tribute to the honesty and industry of needy farm people working with FSA," Mr. Welch declared. "There is ample evidence that the majority of them are getting back on their feet and becoming permanently self-sup-

In large measure, Mr. Welch explained, much of the progress is due to the advice and technical guidance in sound farm and home management which accompanies each Farm Security loan.

On the basis of last year's operations, the average FSA borrower in West Texas produced \$300,00 worth of goods for home consumation, as compared with \$155.00 before comng into the FSA program.

Home produced goods included 429 gallons of milk per family; 386 pounds of meat; and 225 quarts of regetables and fruit canned for the




